We Should Spotlight Ourselves . . .

Many intelligent men and women throw stones at advertising: they aver that advertising adds to the price of the advertised products bought by them. On the surface it may appear to be true that advertising adds to the consumer price of advertised products. Yet the consumer price would not be less if they were not advertised. On the contrary, it might be higher. This statement is capable of abundant proof.

Where many go astray is in assuming that a product's sales could be raised to and held at peak levels without advertising.
