BRITISH ADVANCE

Move Forward 40 Miles on Axis Post in Libya to Inflict Casualties on Enemy

CAIRO, March 27.—British patrols have advanced forty miles in Libya to inflict casualties on Axis troops in a fortified post between El Machili and Tnimi, it was announced today.

BRITISH ON OFFENSIVE

Giant Royal Air Force Bombers Smashing at Germany—Krupp Plant Last Night's Objective.

LONDON, March 27.—Giant four-engine British bombers, perhaps 250 strong and carrying two-ton explosives, smashed at Germany's great Krupp munitions plant and other Nazi war foundries in the Ruhr last night, pressing the spring aerial offensive in one of the heaviest assaults of the war.

A.R.P. FUND ADVOCATED

Pattullo Urges Citizens To Get Busy Both Actively And Financially

Before leaving last night on his return to Victoria after a week's visit to his constituency here, T. D. Pattullo, M.L.A. for Prince Rupert, threw out the suggestion that the citizens here would be well advised to take steps immediately to build up an A. R. P. fund by local contribution to assist in financing civilian protection measures against the possibility of war action taking place here.

MORE MEN REQUIRED

### EDITORIAL

#### Prince Rupert and Alaska Highway . . .

Coming as it did in a roundabout way, the intimation contained in a Daily News dispatch from Edmonton yesterday that plans were being actively made for the connecting up of Prince Rupert with the new Alaska Highway was interesting enough. Of course, it is logical that Prince Rupert, the strategic position of which in the Pacific arena is becoming increasingly acknowledged, should be so connected. An alternative route to Alaska would thereby be provided with the short sea haul from here.

It is to be supposed that the impending activity in extending the Skeena River Highway eastward from Prince Rupert, surveys for which work are now being rushed, is primarily designed to connect Prince Rupert with the Alaska Highway. Where the road running east from Prince Rupert will make its connection with a northward branch to the Alaska Highway through the Peace River country is now being speculated upon. Possibly it will be northward from either Prince George or Vanderhoof. Hazelton, much as we might have liked it, appears now to be pretty well ruled out.

#### RADIO RECEPTION

Editor, Daily News: May I reply to my friend "Sofisticus" whose letter followed the epistle of mine a couple of weeks ago and also to "The Guy at the East End?"

I believe, "Sofisticus," that I am probably more of a pioneer than you are and have put up with the things we complain of since Shavlatans went off some ten or eleven years ago so I think I am entitled to one more service stripe than you are. Some seven or eight years ago, I tramped through the streets and back-lanes and slogged through the muskeg in all kinds

of batteries and a loop antennae with a pair of headphones clamped on my ears helping the then incumbent radio inspector to hunt interference. Often we met with rebuffs and did not get very much co-operation from the powers that be but we did manage to clear up a few troubles.

Now, "Sofisticus," at that time, we had a Radio Club, with a full set of non-operating officers (with the exception of the secretary). The Radio Club even had a bank balance, we also had a radio inspector (part time at \$15 per month) who had to fill in more forms than the job was worth. Where has all this gone? I would like to suggest to you that a Radio Association be formed (with an operating set of officers) for the purpose of working on our grievances. Some of our citizenry are very keen to do some kind of Social Service work—well, this could be a kind of war work. If they could clean up the ether a little by locating some of the various interferences and proving to the owners that they are causing them and then have them fixed either by voluntary or more stringent methods, would benefit both service and civilian. But perhaps some of the A.R.P. officials think that these noises are good for civilian training in A.R.P. work as by this time every radio fan of this city has gone through all the gamut of a first-class air raid simply by turning on his receiver—machine gunning, dive-bombers and shells whining are all yours to command at the touch of a button.

Our long-suffering "hams" who used to be blamed for every little peep that came in are now silent so we can't blame them any more. Perhaps now that they have time on their hands (also experience in their heads) we could coax them



upon efficiency but upon the greatest possible degree of freedom and consideration for the individual, then man must continue to work and fight for democracy and to sacrifice everything to wipe totalitarianism and dictatorship from the face of the earth.

An ancient philosopher had said that in every man there was a God and a beast chained together. Man could be honest, just, charitable and self-sacrificing even at great cost to himself. On the other hand, man had baser qualities in common with all beasts—the appetites, the passions, the greed, fear, cunning, suspicion and hate of animals. As man advanced in civilization he tried more and more to bring his animal self under subjection of the higher spiritual self. It was the fate of man to go down through the centuries trying to do good with evil present within him. The evil could not be banished but it could be controlled.

The Nazis said that man was just a beast, that the law of the jungles should prevail, that it was only necessary to keep him supplied with material things. Nazi belief was based on man's incapacity for evil.

Democracy, on the other hand, believed that man was something more than an animal and that the greatest good and happiness of man could only be attained by the exercise of the higher qualities which existed in an animal frame. Democracy was based in belief in man's capacity for good.

Pre-war democracy had been weakened, Major Sutherland said, because liberty had been confused with licence. People had been more interested in getting than giving. It was a fact that democracy and liberty must be governed by restrictions. Further a strong democracy must be imbued with a sense of personal responsibility to the state. A greater sense of right and wrong must be restored and a stricter line of distinction drawn between them. Democracy demanded a keen moral sense in its citizens. Success should be measured in service not in dollars and cents. Lack of fidelity to the true values of life had a great deal to do with the weakness of pre-war democracy.

"Enough of the spilled milk of the past," concluded the speaker. "The present is turmoil but we are learning to appreciate to some extent the inestimable value of freedom and our responsibilities for the preservation of that freedom which will be assured to us only by a democratic form of government. So we struggle and sacrifice not for the imperfect democracy of pre-war days but for its extended application, obliterating all special privilege and working for the greatest good of the people as a whole. That is the kind of democracy for which our men are fighting today."
