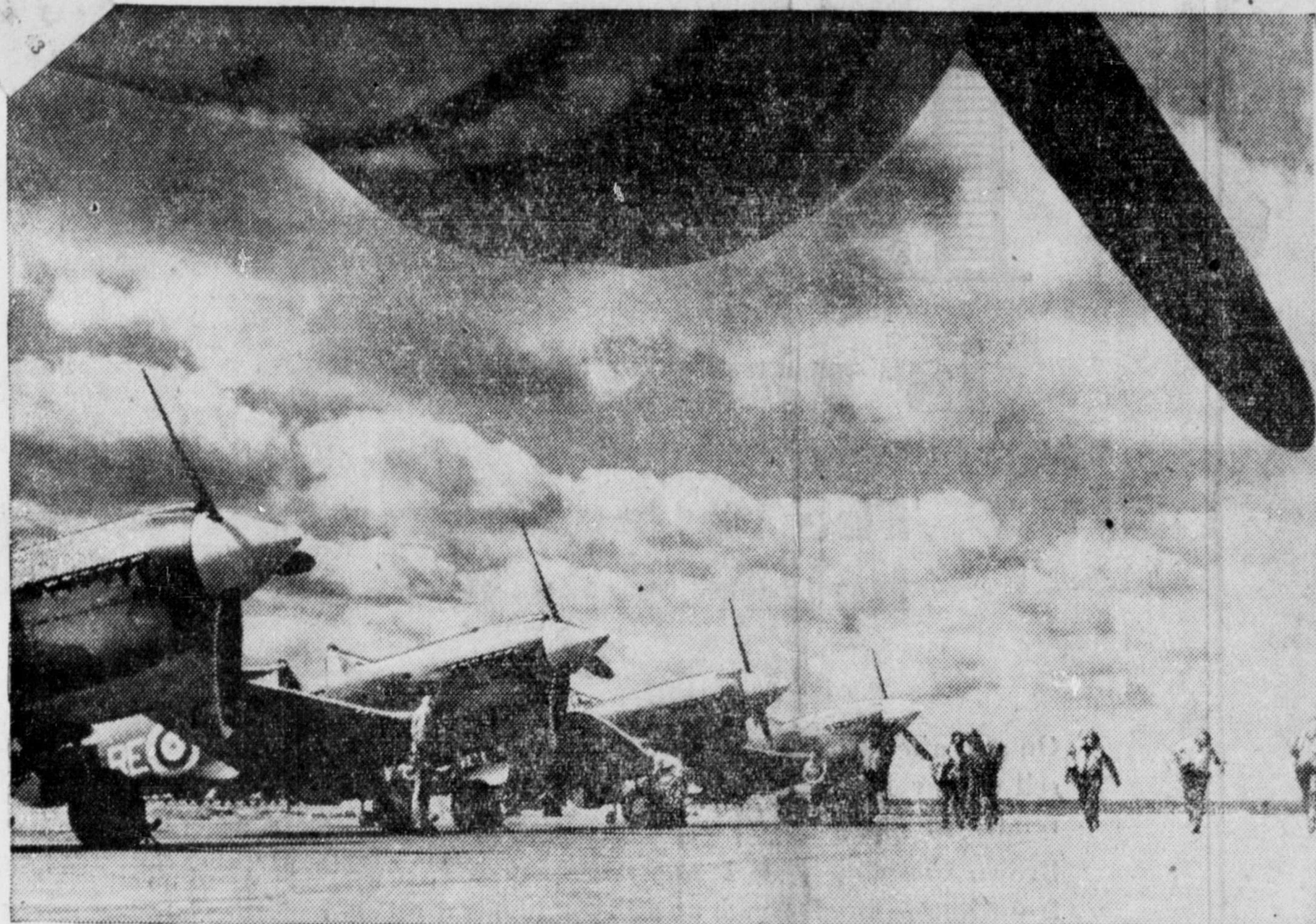


Germans Are In Headlong Retreat

Main Action In Russia Is Centered in Region around Don River Bend

Nazis Continue Falling Back in Direction of Rostov—More Towns Liberated and Thousands of Enemy Killed and Captured

MOSCOW, Dec. 23 (CP)—Main action on the Russo-German front is reported today in the Don River bend area where the Nazis, "beaten and falling back in disorder," are retreating as rapidly as possible, fighting only rearguard action. The German retreat is in the direction of the important city of Rostov. Several dozen more towns have been liberated and 13,700 enemy soldiers have been killed or captured.

German resistance, which had been marked by increasing counter-attacks stiffened for a while yesterday against the Red Army but the Russians are again making headway in the middle Don drive which has resulted in the capture of another large town in the smash on southwestward toward the Black Sea port of Rostov. The name of the town was not named. Yesterday the capture of Millerovo, important railway junction 120-odd miles from Rostov, was reported.

The Germans are rushing reserves to the middle Don front in an attempt to halt Russian legions which have stormed to Millerovo. The front southwest of Stalingrad is also boiling anew as the Germans bring heavier pressure against a Russian thrust along the Kalmyk steppes.

DROWNED ON DOCK

C. W. Jackson Loses His Life At Local Shipyards Tuesday Afternoon

C. W. Jackson, 28, former resident of Saskatoon, lost his life Monday afternoon as the result of a fall while working at the dry dock here. Although a coroner's inquiry has not been held, Jackson is believed to have drowned.

The accident occurred when Jackson slipped on a pile of wet boards and fell 15 feet into the water. The body was recovered by fellow workmen within a few minutes. Efforts to revive the victim with the aid of an inhalator were unsuccessful although members of the fire department kept trying for an hour and fifteen minutes.

Jackson leaves his father and a younger brother, both living in Prince Rupert.

Members of the dry dock staff who recovered the body from the water and aided in the attempt to revive the victim were D. S. Negrich, H. J. Graham, Thomas Boulter, Lloyd Stevens and Alfred Stanley. The coroner's inquiry was expected to be completed late this afternoon.

PLANE IS UNFOUND

Suggestion That Canadian Pacific Transport May Be Down in Mountains Near Chilliwack

VANCOUVER, Dec. 23—In spite of a continuing widespread search by air and land, the Canadian Pacific Airways transport plane, which disappeared Sunday evening while nearing Vancouver on a flight from Prince George, is still not found. There were three crew members and ten passengers on board.

The search, in which Royal Canadian Air Force planes and soldiers from Chilliwack are taking part, has been concentrating in the Chilliwack area. Residents there yesterday reported having seen what they thought was the outline of a plane on a slope of the Elk Mountains south of Chilliwack. What might have been signal fires were also suggested.

Newspapers To Be Published On Boxing Day

VANCOUVER, Dec. 23—The newspapers will take the usual Christmas Day holiday this Friday but will publish on Saturday, Boxing Day.

V.C. Prisoner Tells of Life

Among Other Things There's a Naval Brass Band for Entertainment

LONDON, Dec. 23—Lt. Cmdr. S. H. Beattie, who won the Victoria Cross in the combined operations on St. Nazaire last March, has described parts of his life in a German prison camp in letters to his wife.

Cmdr. Beattie, who commanded the destroyer Campbelltown which rammed the dock gate at 20 knots with its bow filled with high explosives, wrote that apart from mustering three times a day the time of the men in the camp is their own.

"I am enjoying myself here a lot," he wrote. "Smoking like a chimney and eating very well. Plenty of parcels seem to get through. My chaps have formed a naval brass band and play in the evenings. All sort of home-made instruments have been invented; there is only one mouth-organ, but that is only what you might call 'outside influence.'"

King's Christmas Day Address Will Be Emitted Here

There will be special rebroadcasts of the King's Christmas Day address to the Empire over station CPTP of Prince Rupert at 1 o'clock Christmas afternoon and 10:05 in the evening it is announced. SHIP NO POTATOES

Lower Mainland Farmers Decide To Hold Out, Even on Government

VANCOUVER, Dec. 23—Two thousand farmers of the Lower Mainland, meeting here last night, decided to halt all further deliveries to market, including those to the Department of Munitions and Supply, after January 1 unless some action is taken to review the price situation. The farmers are insisting on a minimum price of \$48 per ton.

ORGANIZING OF RESERVE

Lieut. Col. G. C. Oswell to be Administrative Commander of Local Militia Unit

Lieut. Col. G. C. Oswell of Kelowna, former officer commanding of the British Columbia Dragoons (now the Ninth Armored Regiment) of Kamloops and more recently area camp commandant at Victoria, has been appointed administrative commander of the local reserve unit which is being organized under Col. J. W. Nicholls, it is announced. With the arrival here at the start of the year, recruiting and full organization of the local reserve unit, to be known as the Prince Rupert Machine Gun Regiment, will proceed. It will be of full battalion strength and it will be trained and fully equipped with powerful armament for fighting only in Prince Rupert if necessary. The full-time staff of the new local unit will consist of two officers and three non-commissioned officers. The rest of the personnel will be merely of militia status although fully uniformed and equipped. There will be the regular militia form of training.

Whipping Cream Is Being Banned

All Sales to be Prohibited After January 1

VANCOUVER, Dec. 23—All sales of whipping cream to consumers must be discontinued as from January 1, 1943. It is announced by the Wartime Prices and Trade Board.

This will not apply to sales by a primary producer to a dairy, creamery, milk distributor, or any industrial user of cream, or to sales of cream from one milk distributor to another milk distributor or manufacturer.

Found guilty on a shoplifting charge in Magistrate W. D. Vance's court Monday afternoon, August Harryluk was fined \$50 or thirty days in jail. Harryluk was arrested by local police after taking several pieces of merchandise from the Variety Store. When apprehended the stolen articles were found in his possession.

Jap Sub Is Sunk

SEATTLE, Dec. 23—Canadian fighting aircraft and United States naval vessels are reported to have disposed of a Japanese submarine off the Aleutian Islands. A Canadian bombing plane damaged the undersea craft and American naval vessels came up and finished the submersible off. The bombing had made it impossible for the enemy vessel to submerge.

TO BOLSTER UP GERMANS

Found Necessary for Dr. Goebbels And His Satellites to do Some Explaining

LONDON, Dec. 23—Minister of Propaganda Joseph Goebbels and parties of his satellites are to tour the Reich for the purposes of explaining recent Nazi reverses on the various war fronts. It is deemed necessary to do this in order to maintain morale which has been deteriorating of late.

Pittsburg Bus Hit By Slide

At Least Twenty Persons Are Known to be Dead as a Result

PITTSBURG, Dec. 23—At least twenty are known dead as a result of a bus heavily laden with passengers having been caught under a slide on a road near here and virtually flattened out.

UNABLE TO BREAK TIE

Boston Bruins and Toronto Maple Leafs Play to Four-all Deadlock

BOSTON, Dec. 23—The position of Boston Bruins and Toronto Maple Leafs, leaders and runner-up in the National Hockey League, remains unchanged as a result of last night's crucial game here when the teams played to a four-all draw. They had already played a draw in Toronto last Saturday night. On Saturday night they will meet again in Toronto. Christmas night games will be Chicago at Montreal and New York at Detroit.

Thousands Dead In Earthquake

Full Details of Catastrophe in Turkey Are Slow in Reaching Outside World

BERLIN, Dec. 23—Berlin radio now says that it is feared thousands of persons perished in a violent earthquake in north-eastern Anatolia, Turkey. Full details of the catastrophe are slow in reaching the outside world.

Coastal Ships Get Gifts Of Navy League

Ditty bags containing such welcome articles as socks, scarves, gloves, sweaters, smokes, candies and articles which the Navy League of Canada is responsible for distributing among men of the navy and the merchant marine at this season have been delivered to British Columbia coasting vessels. One captain, arriving in port, reported that these welcome gifts covering every member of his crew had arrived and much appreciation had been expressed by all.

Lieut. Col. S. D. Johnston M. C., V. D., commanding staff officer of fixed defences at Vancouver and former area commandant at Prince Rupert, arrived in the city this morning from Vancouver to spend Christmas on leave visiting at his home here.

British and Australians Are Drowned

CHUNGKING, Dec. 23—Between 500 and 1,000 British and Australian prisoners of war were lost when the Japanese steamer Lisbon Maru was torpedoed and sunk off the coast of China in October, according to word received here. It was at first believed that Canadians were aboard the vessel but this was later denied.

CLOSING ON JAPS

Americans and Australians Continue to Make Progress on New Guinea Island

MELBOURNE, Dec. 23—The American and Australian forces are continuing to steadily close in on the remaining Japanese forces on New Guinea, particularly around Buna Mission. The Americans and Australians have reached points but a mile and a half near Buna. A Japanese cargo ship has been destroyed by Allied aircraft off New Britain and Timor has been bombed.

READY FOR OFFENSIVE

Land Fighting in Tunisia in Spite of Rain—Air Fighting Lightens Up

LONDON, Dec. 23—In spite of torrential rain, land action continues along the Tunisian front as the Allies appear to be preparing for an offensive against Bizerte and Tunisia. Air action has been light owing to the bad weather.

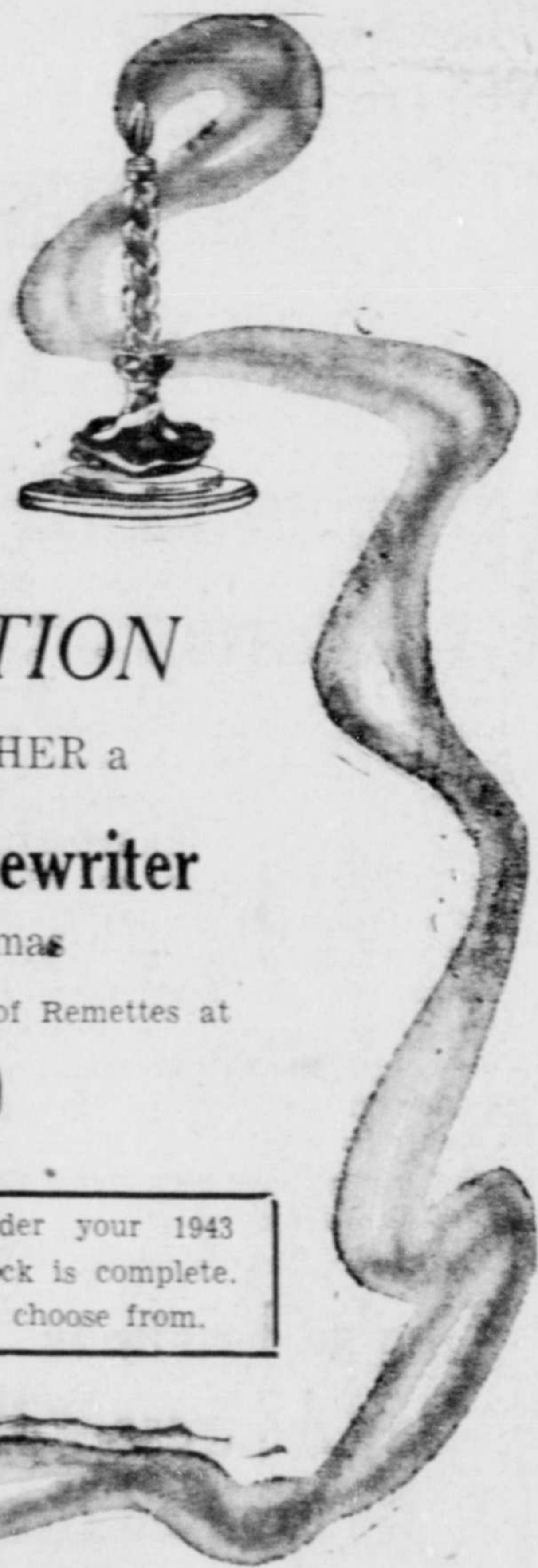
**EDITORIAL**

**Prince Rupert's Growth . . .**

Prince Rupert is having a sort of mushroom growth as far as building development goes. The panorama is changing rapidly as the older sections of the city with their already established services rapidly fill up. The type of construction that is going up is something that might well be taken heed of. Is it going to represent a lasting improvement or is it really going to result in the deterioration before so very long in the areas where it is located? There is difference of opinion on this question. These differences of opinion may to some extent be founded on personal interest. However, it is something that should be looked upon sensibly.

Much of the construction now going on is of a war emergency nature. It is questionable if much of it will be permanently beneficial to the areas in which it is located, this depending to a large extent, of course, on what care is taken of the property. Certainly, a lot of it is of the type that, if not taken care of, will rapidly deteriorate.

Before so many years, if the city continues the progress in peacetime that has been given its birth in war, it is not inconceivable that new business and new residential sections will be developed along permanent lines. This is something to be considered in planning for the future. Future possibilities should not be lost sight of even as immediate efforts are concentrated upon meeting the exigencies of an emergent condition.

**EFFECTIVE NOW**

**BUTTER**

**is rationed by coupon**

**The ration is one-half pound of butter per person, per week**

On and after December 21st it is unlawful to sell or buy butter at retail without the surrender of the proper coupons.

Brown Coupons, Nos. 1 to 11, "Spare 'C'" from Ration Book No. 1 now in the hands of the public, are to be used for this purpose.

Each Brown coupon, Nos. 1 to 11, "Spare 'C'" entitles the holder to buy one week's supply. Only Brown coupons, Nos. 1 to 11

"Spare 'C'" can be used for the purchase of butter.

Each coupon becomes good on a definite date and expires on a definite date . . . and can be used only within its prescribed period as given below.

The system for butter is different from that applying to Tea, Coffee and Sugar, where coupons have no specified expiry date.

**Dates When Butter Coupons Become Usable---and Expire**

Coupon Number	Good for Purchase beginning on -	Not Good for Purchase After
1	December 21	January 3
2	December 28	January 3
3 and 4	January 4	January 17
5 and 6	January 18	January 31
7 and 8	February 1	February 14
9 and 10	February 15	February 28
11	March 1	March 14

NOTE: Brown Coupon No. 2, "Spare 'C'" will be good for use only during a 7-day period—December 28 to January 3. Brown Coupons Nos. 1, and 3 to 11, "Spare 'C'", can be used within 2-week periods.

Coupons for butter, like those for Sugar, Coffee and Tea (the red and green coupons) must be detached by, or in the presence of any seller of butter or his employee. If desired, consumers may

lodge their butter coupon sheets with their retailers, so that the latter may detach the required coupons when delivering.

**Temporary Ration Cards**

All Brown Coupons on Temporary Ration Cards issued to members of the armed forces on leave, visitors to Canada, etc., are good after December 21.

**Butter Holdings Exceeding More Than One Pound per Person Must Be Reported and Coupons Surrendered**

Consumers or non-registered boarding houses having in their possession the equivalent of more than one pound of butter for each person in the household, must before January 3, 1943, report their holdings to the nearest office of this Board. They must forward with their reports the number of butter coupons representing their

butter holdings. If the quantity of butter in possession of such persons represents more than the eleven Brown coupons in Ration Book No. 1, which will be good for butter, they must in their reports undertake to detach from future ration books, additional butter coupons equal to the remainder of the surplus.

**Special Notice To Retailers**

On and after December 28, retailers must establish their right to purchase new supplies of butter from their suppliers by turning over to the supplier currently valid ration coupons equivalent to the poundage of butter ordered from the suppliers. A Bulletin giving instructions to retailers has been mailed to reach you today. Please watch for it.

We are doing our best to give service to as many people as possible with the equipment which we have; but the volume of calling must be reduced so that the more essential calls will not be delayed.
