Going to Winnipeg.

It has been decided by the branches of the Canadian Legion in British Columbia that there will be no provincial convention this year but that the province would concentrate on sending the strongest possible delegation to the Dominion convention to be held in Winnipeg. In this connection J. S. Wilson, third vice-president of the British Columbia command, was named as delegate from the branch.

Circulars contained reports of a very comprehensive review of a rehabilitation plan for ex-service men of this and previous wars. The provincial committee had done a tremendous amount of valuable work in this pressing matter.

Tighten Up on Liquor.

The branch also went on record as being strongly in favor of the full enforcement of the present liquor control regulations and the need for the prevention of the illegal sale of liquors.

The need for an overwhelming vote in favor of the forthcoming plebiscite was again stressed. The Legion will urge by every proper means that every individual get out and vote "yes." This was required for total war and victory.

Jack Preece was in the chair for the first part of the meeting and then turned over the proceedings to W. J. Rance on the election of the latter to the presidency.

INCREASE IN POLICE

This Is Suggestion of Gyro Club Regarding Conditions Now Prevailing in Prince Rupert.

As a means of meeting complaint made in a recent resolution of the Prince Rupert Rotary Club in regard to existing conditions here arising out of the use of liquor, the Prince Rupert Gyro Club, at its regular monthly business luncheon yesterday urged that there be an augmentation of the strength of the city police and armed service police patrols here. A resolution to this effect will be forwarded to the attorney-general's department, the city commissioner and the military authorities. The resolution will also be presented to other local organizations with a view to receiving their endorsement.

The local club was advised that, owing to the war, the usual international convention this year was being cancelled but, instead, there would be a session of the board of governors. As for the district convention to be held in Kamloops in June, it was left to the president and treasurer to go into the possibility of sending a delegate from here.

The Gyros agreed to change the meeting date of May 20 to May 18 in order to have President Hambro of Norway, who will be in the city at that time, as guest speaker. The entertainment committee and Dr. Jens Munthe will have charge of arrangements for a special open luncheon for the occasion.

President George L. Rorie was in the chair at yesterday's luncheon and there was a good attendance of Gyro members.

POSITION IMPROVED

Hopes of Japanese Drive in Burma Being Stopped Before Rainy Season Starts.

NEW DELHI, April 9:—United Nations in the Irrawaddy valley of Burma are reported to have taken up greatly improved positions and hope is expressed that they may be able to stop the Japanese advance before the rainy season sets in. The situation as far as the Allies is concerned, however, is described as anything but bright.

Los Angeles Has Blackout

Unidentified Planes Later Turn Out to Have Been Friendly.

LOS ANGELES, April 9:—Los Angeles had a two-hour blackout last night when unidentified planes approached and passed over. Later the coast artillery command announced that the aircraft had been identified as friendly. Then the blackout was called off.

George Bolton, Surveyor, Dies

Civil Engineer in Road Work Passes Away at Tye.

The death occurred yesterday at Tye of George Storey Bolton, civil engineer from West Vancouver. The late Mr. Bolton was born in England 62 years ago. He was in a survey party in connection with the building of the new Skeena highway. His family resides in Vancouver.

COLLAPSE AT BATAAN

General Wainwright's Forces Yield to Superior Enemy Strength.

WASHINGTON, April 9:—Secretary of War Henry L. Stimson reported today that Lieutenant-General Jonathan Wainwright's forces on the Philippines' Bataan Peninsula numbered 36,853 effective troops when resistance apparently collapsed. The secretary indicated at a press conference that the bulk of this force was either killed or captured.

President Franklin D. Roosevelt had authorized the Philippine's commander to make any decision deemed necessary, Stimson said, adding that latest reports indicated Corregidor and other fortifications guarding the entrance to Manila Bay still stood.

Hordes of Japanese troops, aided by naval forces and dive bombers, finally wore down the American and Filipino defenders on Bataan and as early as last night it was admitted that "only a miracle" could save them.

DEFENCES OF COAST

Better Than He Expected But Not as Good as He Would Have Liked, Says Ralston.

OTTAWA, April 9:—The defences of the Pacific Coast are better than he expected but not as good as he would like, said Col. J. L. Ralston, minister of national defence, yesterday following his return to Ottawa after his visit to British Columbia.

Speaking further of the guerrilla units which are being organized as part of the British Columbia defence program, Col. Ralston said they would be located at points where there is no defence army. The size of the units will vary.

ENEMY ARE CAPTURED

Number of Axis Soldiers Taken in Libyan Desert Yesterday as British Move to Meet New Threat.

CAIRO, April 9:—British headquarters announced today that a number of Axis soldiers were captured from a detachment which "was trying to establish a strong point between Tmimi and Ain El Gazala" in the Libyan Desert.

The communique also said that "one of our columns is engaging the enemy at Sidi Bregisch," indicating swift counter-action to meet the threat of a new Axis drive.

General Erwin Rommel's Axis forces launched an attack along a sixty-mile front west of Tobruk yesterday but it turned out to be not very heavy.

Geo. Grosvenor Passes Suddenly

George Grosvenor, caretaker of the Masonic Temple and a resident of Prince Rupert, died suddenly this afternoon at his home on Sixth Avenue East after a brief illness. He was a native of England and is survived by a widow and family who will have the sympathy of many friends in their bereavement.

TO LAUNCH OFFENSIVE

Significance Attached to Visit of United States Army Chief to Britain.

LONDON, April 9:—There is speculation as to the opening of a second front in western Europe by an Allied invasion of the continent arising out of the visit to England of General George C. Marshall, chief of staff of the United States Army, and Harry Hopkins, lease-lend administrator, who arrived yesterday.

Marshal said that "soldiers and sailors, not production alone, will win the war." This was taken to mean that some sort of a new offensive was to be launched by the United Nations. The general, who saw Prime Minister Winston Churchill yesterday said he was on "an urgent and confidential" mission on behalf of President Franklin D. Roosevelt.

UNHURT BY IMMERSION

Capt. A. McKinnon and Miss Catherine Mohr Suffer No Ill-Effects From Plunge Into Francois Lake.

FRANCOIS LAKE, April 9:—Capt. A. McKinnon and Miss Catherine Mohr have suffered no serious after-effects as a result of a recent immersion in Francois Lake when they went through the rotting ice as they were crossing the lake. Although the temperature of the water made swimming anything but pleasant, both took the incident in good humor and are none the worse.

Andrew Anderson, mail carrier from Burns Lake, brought the mail and passengers to the landing in his truck. Norman Schreiber, mail carrier from Ootsa Lake and Wistaria, came over to meet the mail with a boat on sleighs so that, if the ice was too rotten to hold, the boat would float. Sleigh and boat were pulled by dog team. The outfit came across safely but, on the way back, the extra weight on the sleighs was too much for the ice to hold and down it went. Capt. McKinnon and Miss Mohr were both thrown into the water. Although the captain was wearing a heavy overcoat, he managed to struggle to the boat and dragged Miss Mohr with him to safety.

Capt. McKinnon, who had been to Vancouver to attend the wedding of his daughter, had an exciting enough trip all around. He went to Vancouver by dog team, sleigh, car and train and came back by airplane to Prince George, train to Burns Lake, truck to Francois Lake, on foot part of the way over the ice, swimming a short distance and finishing the trip by rowboat.

NEW MOVE RECEPTIVE

United States Effect on Negotiations in New Delhi Is Seen.

NEW DELHI, April 9:—United States endorsement of Britain's promise of self-government to India and expression of confidence in Allied victory, as expressed by Lewis Johnson, special representative of President Franklin D. Roosevelt, is believed to have had its effect in improving the All-India Congress attitude toward an agreement with Britain on the question of support of the war against Japan. There is still a possibility of an agreement on the vexed question of defence command.

OFFENSIVE BY ALLIES

Germans Are Thrown Back With Heavy Losses in Crimea—Enormous Casualties—Many Planes Lost.

MOSCOW, April 9:—A strong German attack with tanks supported by dive bombers on Russian positions in the Crimea was smashed with heavy losses to the enemy yesterday. It is in this area on the southern end of the Russo-German front that it has been expected the Nazis would concentrate in their spring offensive with the oil fields of the Caucasus as the ultimate objective.

With heavy fighting in the Donets Basin and along the central front to the west of Moscow, the Russians still hold the initiative along the entire front. Smolensk is claimed to have been by-passed by the Red forces.

It is claimed here that 137,000 Germans were killed and 400,000 wounded during the fighting in February and March, this not including prisoners and victims of frostbite.

Meanwhile the air war yesterday cost the Germans 55 more planes, making their total loss 668 for eleven days.

OSHAWA IN PUCK FINAL

Defeated Montreal Generals Last Night—Western Canada Series Continues.

TORONTO, April 9:—Oshawa Generals for the fourth time in five years have won the eastern Canada finals in the Memorial Cup junior hockey championship series. They won their fourth straight game last night over Montreal Generals by a score of 6 to 4 and qualified to meet either Portage la Prairie Terriers or Edmonton Maple Leafs in the final.

Last night in Winnipeg Portage la Prairie won over Edmonton Maple Leafs by a score of 6 to 4 in the second game of the western Canada play-offs.

Voluntary System Bringing Enough Overseas Material

Vancouver, April 9:—Col. James Mess, director of civilian recruiting from Ottawa, who is paying a two-day visit to the coast, says that the system of voluntary recruiting has been producing sufficient men for overseas service to date.

Victoria Officer Prisoner of War

Lieut. Commander Gunn Is Alive After Being Reported Missing and Believed Dead.

VICTORIA, April 9:—Lieut. Commander Gunn, previously reported missing and believed dead, is a prisoner of war at Hong Kong, his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Hugh Gunn of this city, have been advised.

HAMBURG ATTACKED

Bad Weather Did Not Prevent Royal Air Force From Pounding Away at Northwest Germany.

LONDON, April 9:—A strong force of Royal Air Force bombers dared bad weather last night to attack Hamburg and other objectives in northwest Germany.

Two British Cruisers Sunk By Jap Bombers; One Italian Is Lost

Sinking of Cornwall and Dorsetshire in Bay of Bengal Is Blow to Strength in That Area—1100 Men Saved.

LONDON, April 9: (CP)—Two British eight-inch gun cruisers—the 10,000-ton Cornwall and the 9,975-ton Dorsetshire, whose torpedoes finished off the German battleship Bismarck in the Atlantic less than a year ago—have been sunk by Japanese bombers ranging in the Bay of Bengal, the Admiralty announced today. Shock of the sinking of the Cornwall and Dorsetshire is a blow to British naval strength immediately available to cope with Japanese aircraft carriers and warships which are reported to be increasing their activities around India.

Japanese broadcasts claim, in addition, that Japanese forces have sunk twenty-one Allied merchantmen in the Bay of Bengal up to last Tuesday and badly damaged twenty-three other ships.

Eleven hundred survivors of the Dorsetshire and Cornwall have been picked up.

GUERRILLAS IN NORTH

Prospectors, Trappers, Loggers and Others Should Fit Into Scheme.

Prospectors, trappers, loggers and other rugged bushmen of the far-flung and sparsely settled area of central and northern British Columbia of Prince Rupert is the centre have been interesting themselves in a more or less active but unofficial way in military training for months. By then the announcement yesterday by Col. J. L. Ralston, minister of national defence, of the plan to organize guerrilla units in British Columbia for bush fighting will, doubtless, be received with much interest. Stewart, one of the principal mining areas in the district, is an instance. Here a home guard has been drilling for a couple of years. It should be able to provide adequate material to be incorporated in such a local guerrilla fighting force.

Smithers, important railway centre 226 miles inland from Prince Rupert, is another point where interest has been taken and organization already started along these lines.

In Prince Rupert city proper there will probably be no guerrilla force as this is a reserve army point.

There are, however, many other small communities at more or less isolated points that should fit naturally into the guerrilla movement, particularly since the men thereabouts are well accustomed to roughing it in the bush, are experienced and ingenious woodsmen, well used to handling firearms and keen for action.

OFFENSIVE UNDER WAY

Move to Recapture New Guinea and New Britain Seen as Possibility.

CANBERRA, April 9:—War activity to the north of Australia continues light. Yesterday a small air raid was staged by the Japanese on Port Moresby, New Guinea. There was but slight damage.

Growing air strength of the United Nations to the north of the commonwealth continues to hamper the enemy who have lost 160 planes between Timor and New Guinea.

Further reinforcements have reached Australia and a conference held yesterday by General Douglas MacArthur, commander-in-chief of United Nations forces in the Pacific, it was suggested might be a prelude to a move to recapture New Guinea and New Britain.

JAPANESE FISHING VESSELS

The Japanese Fishing Vessels Disposal Committee was constituted by Order-in-Council P. C. 283, January 13th, 1942, for the purpose of implementing an effective plan to transfer impounded Japanese fishing vessels to new owners, who must be Canadian citizens, of other than Japanese origin.

Prospective purchasers should be experienced fishermen, who propose using the vessels in the fishing industry of British Columbia. They should negotiate directly with the Japanese owner of the ship they wish to buy, or with his representative.

Descriptive details of vessels are available in the offices of the Committee, which may be freely examined by those interested.

When an agreement for sale and purchase has been made by the Japanese owner and the buyer, details of the transaction should be submitted to the Committee, and if approved, the transfer of the vessel can be promptly completed.

If an agreement cannot be reached between the vendor and the purchaser, the Committee will arbitrate the differences. IF THE VENDOR DOES NOT AGREE TO ARBITRATE, THE COMMITTEE WILL SET A PRICE AT WHICH THE VESSEL MUST BE SOLD.

Only outright sales, enabling transfer of title of vessel, will be approved by the Committee. In the event of a purchase involving term payments to the seller, the balance to be paid must be secured by mortgage.

PERMITS FOR INSPECTION OF VESSELS CAN NOW BE OBTAINED:

- (a) AT THE COMMITTEE'S OFFICES, 1528 MARINE BUILDING, VANCOUVER.
- (b) IN THE CASE OF RESIDENTS OF NEW WESTMINSTER OR VICINITY, BY APPLYING BY LETTER, TELEPHONE OR TELEGRAPH TO THE OFFICE OF THE COMMITTEE, WHO WILL ARRANGE THAT PERMITS WILL BE ISSUED BY THE NAVAL OFFICE, PACIFIC COAST TERMINALS, NEW WESTMINSTER, ON PRODUCTION OF THE PROPER CREDENTIALS AND REGISTRATION CARDS.

To prospective purchasers living at a distance from Vancouver, the following procedure is suggested:

When a specifically desired vessel is known, as well as the name and address of the owner, direct negotiations should be carried out in accordance with the procedure outlined above.

Where the vessel is known, but not the owner or his whereabouts, the Committee's office will assist in supplying the information. THE PROCEDURE WILL THEN BE THAT OUTLINED IN ABOVE PARAGRAPHS.

In the case of fishermen not having any specific vessel in mind, but desiring to purchase one or more of the impounded vessels for active fishing service in British Columbia waters, he should write this office, giving the following information:

- (a) Type and size of vessel required.
- (b) The class of fishing he primarily proposes, and the probable general fishing location.
- (c) Amount of cash payment he is prepared to make.
- (d) What terms are required for the balance of total purchase price.

With this information on hand, this office will endeavour to have Japanese owners, OR ACCREDITED REPRESENTATIVES, communicate with the prospective purchaser. IF THIS CONTACT CANNOT BE ESTABLISHED, THE PURCHASER SHALL BE INFORMED, AND HE SHOULD THEN CALL ON THE COMMITTEE OR SEND HIS ACCREDITED AGENT WITH AUTHORITY TO PURCHASE; AND EITHER PARTY WILL THEN RECEIVE FULL ASSISTANCE FROM THE COMMITTEE.


