



## The Unimpressed Mr. Gandhi...

Despatches from India over the week-end are concerned mainly with two new developments. First the Japanese are making preparations for a thrust into India proper and second Mahatma Gandhi is making preparations for a passive resistance campaign the objective of which is complete independence for India.

In other days one could argue the merits or demerits of the case for India's independence. One could belabour the sluggish movement of Britain's Indian policy. One could even publish sympathetic stories, complete with pictures, of India's inspired leader standing at the head) of the untutored masses of his country.

Today other responsible Indian leaders are attempting to weld their people into a united front of defense with the peoples of the United Nations. They, too, are fervently interested in India's independence; anti-imperialism is the substance of their political program. But these leaders realize that their hopes for India's independence will perish when the first Japanese soldier sets foot in Delhi. The new Japanese campaign will result, so they say in the "unity of the eastern races." The progressive leaders in India realize that this unity will be akin only to the unity of the shark with its prey; that Japanese "collaboration" will be the collaboration of the thug with his victim.

Meanwhile Mr. Gandhi continues to make the front page on all Japanese papers and to hold the top rating in all news broadcasts from Tokio, where he is rated second only to Hirohito himself as the saviour of the Indian

We do not believe that Gandhi will continue as a great influence in Indian politics or that his present campaign will be supported by his people. Consciously or unconsciously he is becoming India's number one Quisling. He refuses to be impressed by the imminent Japanese invasion. We think the Indian people will refuse to be impressed by Mr. Gandi's Nero-like attitude.



## Canadian Bacon For Britain

G. R. Paterson, Animal Products Trade Commissioner, London, England, has issued a report to the Department of Trade and Commerce outlining conditions in Great Britain in connection with Canadian bacon imports. It is of course well understood that the bulk of the United Kingdom's imports of bacon in normal times was from Denmark. Now these have been entirely cut off, and Canada holds a very strong place in the British market, and as a contributor towards the rations of the

Out of a total pre-war consumption 10,500,000 long cwts. (of 112 lbs.) per annum, Canada provided in 1938 only 1.507,656 cwts. Following the outbreak of war, it seemed reasonably certain that increased quantities of bacon would likely be required from Canada. When the European countries were overrun by the enemy, Canada immediately became the principal source of supply. The Dominion has increased her production to the point where during the present year she is supplying 5,357,143 cwts., the equivalent of approximately 5,000,000 hogs, in the form of Wiltshires, hams and a small amount of other cuts. It is stated that of the bacon now consumed by the United Kingdom, 67 per cent originated in Canada.

Mr. Paterson also has something to say about the suggestion that producers might be better advised to increase the weight of hogs delivered to the Canadian packing plants for processing and shipment as bacon to the United Kingdom. He does not agree with this suggestion in general. "While it may be reasonable and correct to say that the average weight of hogs might be increased slightly in order to prevent lightweight and unfinished pigs being delivered for processing," he states, "at the same time it must be borne in mind that once a hog has been finished at around 200-220 pounds live weight, it should, if it is the right type and has been properly fed, have attained the best weight at which it can be converted into the most desirable kind of Wiltshire. United Kingdom consumers have a very definite preserence for bacon from a Wiltshire of the proper weight. They do not favor overly fat bacon."

In conclusion Mr. Paterson says: Aside from these points, the postwar potentialities of this market as an outlet for a substantial volume of Canadian bacon must re- 2 main uppermost in the minds of all concerned."
