

## Nazis Stopped North of Stalingrad . . .

MOSCOW-The Nazis drove still deeper into Russian lines along he southern front but their attack on Soviet positions north of Stalingrad has again been thrown back.

A British truck convoy, moving up to the front with supplies near El Alamein, in Egypt, is closely guarded by planes to prevent raids by Axis aircraft. One fighter plane is shown here as it swooped low over the convoy. In the desert battle for Egypt, even water has to be transported many miles. Convoys of both sides take terrific batterings, but the United Nations have won air superiority here.
