### How to Live More Than 7 Years . . .

Most retail stores-75 percent of them-do not last longer than seven years under the same ownership. They tern Air Command: may not go bankrupt; most just fold up because their owners' capital has been used up. Poor management is one explanation of retailer mortality; another is the failure to get new customers to replace inevitable customer wastage.

Every business needs new customers, and new customers are found only by seeking them; they are not won; otherwise. Plain as is this truth, the fact remains that most retailers, in every community, do not definitely seek new customers; they make no visible, forceful and continuing effort to attract new customers. A retail store which stays unlighted by newspaper advertising gets fewer customers than it would otherwise get.

It is life insurance for a retail business when it seeks new customers by means of newspaper advertising. Therefore, if you, a retailer, want your business to live long and to grow, be diligent in seeking new customers.

## Buy Now What You Can...

Buy now those enduring goods and services which the law permits you to buy. Buy furniture and furnishings, clothes and other enduring things which sooner or (e) later you will be needing.
