Moscow Charges Japan With Sinking of Soviet Steamer; Relations Become Strained

MOSCOW, June 26—Relations between Soviet Russia and Japan have become strained following the specific charge being made by Moscow that the Russian steamer Angarstroi was sunk by a Japanese submarine 32 miles off the coast of Japan on May 1. The attack is described by the Soviet as a deliberate and brazen violation of the anti-aggression pact betwten Russia and Japan.

The Janarese, after the incident, had hastily asserted that the United States was responsible for the sinking but Moscow now asserts that this accusation does not conform with the facts of the case.

The survivors of the Angarstroi are now on their way home to Russia by way of Manchuria.

Meanwhile, Melbourne reports another Soviet merchantman having been in battle with a Japanese submarine off the coast of Australia. The Russian ship, which has reached port at Sydney with damaged bridge and other marks of combat, is believed to have sunk the submarine.

BREMEN IS HEAVY HIT Royal Air Force Resumes Mass

Bombings of Germany With Effective Results

LONDON, June 26:-The great German port of Bremen was heavily raided by the Royal Air Force last night in a resumption of large scale aerial warfare. Over one thousand British planes blasted at the port and the proportion of the attack may be judged by the fact that fiftytwo planes were shot down. The attack was the largest since Cologne and Essen and great damage was done. Later reports today confirmed earlier indications that the British bombers had been over Germany in force and on a devastating scale.

Great fires were set, it was revealed today, in Bremen which was the principal target of the devastating assault which it is now said was probably the largest in the history of aerial warfare. Indications were that the number of planes participating exceeded the flight of 1,130 which laid Cologne in ruins on May 30. In addition to the bomber force of more than one thousand machines which attacked Bremen, the Air Ministry reported hundreds of other planes attacked air fields in the Low Countries.

While the fifty-two planes missing constitute the highest one night loss ever experienced by the Royal Air Force, informed sources said it was less than five percent of those involved.

We suppose that the way we are affected in the Daily News office by the mail service is a fair reflection of how it affects other business people of the place.

They may have improved our train service this past week or so but it has certainly resulted in a botch being made of the mails.

Why the through mails to and from the East and the mails of important intermediate points should be left for the freight trains to carry exclusively while the fast trains do not touch it at all seems strange enough.

The postal authorities should realize the present inconvenience of the service and should not need much inducement to bring about the obvious improvement.

To have a fast train come in on a Thursday evening without the mail which is brought in by the freight train late Friday night after two trains have left earlier on the Friday for the East with not another going until Monday night is a strange state of affairs. Another improvement that should obviously be made is the bringing in of the mail on the Saturday evening fast train instead of the Sunday night freight.

Also why should not fast trains leaving Wednesday and Friday mornings carry mail east as well as if not instead of the slow trains which leave the same nights?

The whole service is slowing up local business at a time when there was never a greater mail volume and when it is important, if ever it was, to have speed and efficiency.

If the business of Prince Rupert is important enough to warrant a better train service there is certainly no reason why it should result in the worst mail service we have ever had here.

We feel justified in insisting upon this matter of train service being rectified and at once by the making of arrangements whereby the fast trains should carry mail.

Co-ordination is one of the increasingly important factors of success in these highly technical and mechanical days. We should have had plenty of examples by now where effective co-ordination has beaten us to it from things of most inconsequential nature to matters of cardinal import ance. Efficiency can be a cruel weapon and it can be a great defence.

After July 1st no one will be able to purchase sugar for regular domestic use without turning in a ration coupon.

Application cards for coupon rationing for sugar have now been mailed to every household in Canada. But, in an undertaking so vast, some homes may have been missed, or some cards may have gone astray. So, no matter where you live, whether it is in areas served by letter carrier or not, if your application card is not already on its way to Recioning Headquarters, you should wait no longer.

After filling in the card, according to the instructions on the pamphlet which was delivered with it, just drop the card in the nearest mail box or post office. It needs no forwarding address.

IF YOU HAVE NOT RECEIVED AN APPLICATION CARD you should get one at the nearest Post Office at once.



The ration cards being issued for use July 1st are for sugar only, and good for 10 weeks. At

the end of that period a coupon ration book good for 6 months will be issued. Under the new system of coupon rationing, you are allowed the same



Secret Service Was Well Entrenched When France Fell

NEW YORK, June 28: (9) - The British - "fifth column" in France started to operate in the occupied territory, particularly in Paris itself, at the same time the Petain government was pulling the beaten French military machine out of the war.

Roy P. Porter, Paris correspondent for the Associated Press from 1937 until a few months ago when he left the occupied zone, knew some of these British agents and writes about them in his tragic eye-witness story about occupied France that make up the book "Uncensored France."

Back in the United States, Porter was able to write the true story of what he saw for the first time. After the German occupation his' dispatches reached the New York office of the Associated Press via Berlin. They were, he grumble mildly, "garbled" by the Nazis.

Volunteer Agents

Not even the British secret service will ever know how many Britons were serving as secret agents in France, Porter says. Many were self-appointed. Some had been caught inside the German lines during the smashing Nazi advance to the channel in May and June, 1940. Others had been living in France for years and spoke perfect French.

They recruited for Gen. de Gaulle's Free French forces, helped these recruits into the unoccupied territory, organized mass escapes from German prison camps and had a hand in sabotage. Even the Germans, masters of the fifth colwere causing confusion.
