Japanese Suffering Further Losses

ALLIES ARE CONVERGING UPON AXIS

Three Tough Armies Moving in On Enemy in North Africa—Opening Contact Made

LONDON, Nov. 20.—Three of the toughest armies assembled by the United Nations since the start of the war converged on the Bizerte-Tripoli-Bengasi triangle yesterday in fighting contact with Axis forces while Allied planes and parachute troopers built up air power in preparation for a final assault to wipe out the Germans and Italians from North Africa. Berlin admits that the British advance has reached into Tunisia.

As British and United States troops squeezed the last Axis footholds in Tunisia from east and west, a motorized column of fighting French was reported still driving up from a Lake Chad base, 1200 miles to the south.

Sweeping back outlying Axis patrols, Lieut. General Kenneth Anderson's First Army drove on into Tunisia from Algeria at several points in a sweep intended to crush an Axis airborne army reported digging in at Tunis and Bizerte.

Leaping ahead of Anderson's ground forces, Allied paratroopers were seizing vital air fields. From the east the British Eighth Army moved to a point about fifteen miles south of Bengasi and fifty miles from the eastern shore of the Gulf of Sirte overlooking the main coastal road between Bengasi and Agababia. A Cairo communiqué said these forces had made contact with the enemy south of Bengasi while Allied bombers pounded the Libyan port.

The advance indicated that at least a part of the Eighth Army had by-passed Bengasi and threatened the only avenue of escape by land for the hold-out garrison that Marshal Erwin Rommel might leave in that port. No less than 120 landing grounds and 559 tanks have been captured.

The first clash of tanks in Tunisia is reported to have resulted in the destruction of eight of thirty German tanks by the Allies. Strong patrols on either side met in northern Tunisia yesterday. In spite of French colonial resistance, the Germans have been able to effect landings of heavy tanks at Bizerte and seized a fort near there.

Meanwhile British and Allied units of Anderson's First Army have smashed to within thirty-five miles by air and 50 miles by road of Bizerte. Both Tunis and Bizerte have been bombed.

OTTAWA, Nov. 20.—Announcement of the appointment of three new senators was made last night by Prime Minister William Lyon Mackenzie King. They are: P. R. Du Tremblay, K. C. of Montreal and Sorel, member of the Quebec Legislative Council.

W. Rupert Davies, publisher of the Kingston Whig Standard, Joseph Bench K. C., prominent barrister of St. Catherine's, Ontario.

This makes the standing in the Senate now as follows: Liberals, 47. Conservatives, 38. Vacant, 11.

LONDON, Nov. 20.—"Wings for Victory" weeks, a nation-wide savings campaign similar to War Weapons Weeks and Warship Weeks, will open March 5 and continue to July 3.

WAR NEWS

JAPS MOVE ON CHINA
CHUNGKING—In the course of their apparent preparations to drive into Yunnan Province of southwest China, Japanese transports have appeared off the Indo-China coast. Crossing by the enemy of the Solwin River is another indication of impending attack.

NAZIS ARE HEADED OFF
MOSCOW—Nazi divisions evidently heading for a drive on Georgian Pass and the Grozny oil fields have been routed. Five thousand of the enemy have been killed and a great amount of equipment and booty has been captured by the Russians including 140 tanks. There have been six new attacks by the Germans on the industrial section of broken Stalingrad but all were repulsed with heavy losses to the enemy.

MEXICO AND RUSSIA
MEXICO—After thirteen years, Mexico has resumed diplomatic relations with Soviet Russia. All the United Nations now have relations with Russia.

FRANCO'S WARNING

If Any Side Acts Against Spain, He Will Take Aid From Other

MADRID, Nov. 20 (CP)—General Francisco Franco of Spain has issued a warning that, if either side—the Allies or the Axis—moves in on Spanish air or sea bases, Spain will accept help from the other side. This would be done immediately. Germany is reported to have already asked Spain for the use of the Mediterranean coast and the Balearic Islands.

New Road To Alaska Open

KLUANE LAKE, Yukon Territory, Nov. 20.—Formal opening ceremonies of the new 1600-mile Alaska Highway took place today and soon after a convoy of trucks proceeded to Fairbanks.

HE WANTED CZAR POWER

So Says Minister of Labor in Regard to Retiring Director of Selective Service

OTTAWA, Nov. 20.—Hon. Humphrey Mitchell, minister of labor, in a statement last night in regard to the resignation of Elliott M. Little as director of national selective service, said that Mr. Little, prior to the resignation, had presented proposals which would have virtually given him the powers of a czar in the direction of Canadian manpower.

The statement of the minister came as Mr. Mitchell solved the task of finding a successor for Mr. Little by appointing Arthur McNamara, deputy minister of labor, to take charge of national selective service.

The resignation of Mr. Little, as announced yesterday, was accompanied by his statement that he had experienced "friction and obstruction" resulting in "virtual paralysis" of the organization. A letter made public by Mr. Little voiced blunt criticism of the government, of Mitchell and the war services department.

Mr. Mitchell at first issued a brief statement accepting the resignation effective immediately, the fuller explanation following later.

TIME OFF TO TRAIN

South African Firms Release Employees for Army Work Saturday Mornings

CAPE TOWN, Nov. 20.—Brig. Borain, new Cape fortress commander, has appealed to business firms to allow all members of part-time military units Saturday off to make the whole day available for compulsory training "in the type of warfare we can expect in an emergency."

Representatives of 500 Capetown manufacturers have agreed to support the appeal, and it is expected the Saturday training will start shortly.

One thousand Italian war prisoners will work on construction of important roads in the union. It is the policy of the National Roads Board to concentrate on strategic roads only.

To retain African coast trade resulting from the war, and to develop it after the war, the South African Federated Chamber of Industries has recommended the encouragement of regular shipping services. It has been suggested that it be done by a government subsidies scheme if necessary.

Further Gas Cut

Basic petrol ration will probably be reduced until it is available for essential needs only. Acting Minister of Defence F. C. Sturrock has announced. Great additions to petrol storage capacity in the union are being prepared.

Cape brandy is finding a ready market in the United States, the National Association of Alcoholic Beverage Importers of America reports. Former French market for the liquor has been taken over by the Cape.

An emergency regulation passed here increases the penalty for the unlawful sale of liquor to imprisonment not exceeding one year, in addition to, or in place of the fine provided under the Liquor Act.

Insurance Costs

South African insurance companies have agreed as from December 1 to allow a wartime discount of 10 percent on private car insurance premiums, where claims experience or other circumstances warrant. This decision has been made because of restrictions on private motoring through rationing of petrol and rubber.

No special trains will be run for civilians during the December and January holidays, with only limited increase in service for scholars travelling home on vacation.

The largest and most valuable diamond ever cut and polished in South Africa has been completed in a Johannesburg factory. The 21 carat stone, found in the Kimberley River area, measures one inch by a half-inch and is worth \$134,000. It now is in the possession of Peter Vermeij, a Johannesburg diamond merchant.

Fishing Industry Getting Supplies In Spite of War

Products which formerly came from the occupied countries are now being supplied from other sources. NOT SINGLE PLANE LOST

Royal Air Force Raid on Turin Wednesday Night Was Complete Success

LONDON, Nov. 20.—It was officially announced yesterday that not a single Royal Air Force plane was lost in pounding Turin Wednesday night in the fifth big raid on Italian war centres this month. A 1000-mile round trip was completed in successfully bombing Turin which is the chief seat of industry in Italy.

DEATH TOLL IS NOW 47

Cockroach Powder Got Into Eggs But How is Unknown

SALEM, Ore., Nov. 20.—The death list from poisoned eggs in the Oregon State Hospital has now increased to forty-seven, according to the latest count. It is now ascertained that the poison was a chemical used for killing cockroaches but how it got into the eggs is not known.

Less News Still to be Published About Canadian Military Areas

OTTAWA, Nov. 20.—There is to be further tightening up of censorship in the military areas of British Columbia, the Maritimes and Newfoundland, it is announced. Information has been published, it is claimed, which might be of value to the enemy.

FUNERAL TRIBUTE IS PAID

Dean Gibson Describes H. F. Pullen as One of Finest Citizens Prince Rupert Has Had

"He was one of the finest citizens Prince Rupert has ever had." Such was the tribute of Very Rev. James B. Gibson, dean of St. Andrew's Anglican Cathedral, at the funeral service yesterday afternoon for the late Henry F. Pullen. He had finished the course, kept the faith and had done his duty as he saw it. Dean Gibson referred to the essential difficulties of the newspaperman who was always in the public eye. Too often the kindly things were not said when they might be whereas the unkind thing was emphasized.

The deceased had been kindly, thoughtful and considerate. His passing made a real gap in civic life. There would be sorrow and sympathy for those who were bereaved.

Mr. Gibson drew a parallel between the work of the newspaperman who gathered, sorted out and presented that which was for the best and that of every person in gathering and sorting out the better things of life. Upon the sorting depended character. If the duty of life was well done then there would be reward from God after the course of life had been completed and the inevitable end came.

The hymns were "Rock of Ages" and "Abide With Me," Miss M. A. Way presiding at the organ.

Following the service in the B. C. Undertakers' Grenville Court Chapel interment was made in Fairview Cemetery, the elements of an autumnal storm adding a note of solemnity to the final scene.

Additional Ships Of Enemy Are Being Sunk In South Pacific Area

Five More Vessels Go Down and Three Damaged Off Solomons—Allied Bombers Dispose of Cruiser And Destroyer

WASHINGTON, Nov. 20.—The Japanese have suffered additional serious naval losses in the southwest Pacific. On another naval battle last Saturday off the Solomon Islands, disclosure of which had just been made, five ships were sunk and three damaged, bringing the total of enemy vessels lost in the series of recent battles to twenty-eight with ten damaged.

Nichi Nichi, Tokyo newspaper, admits that the Japanese losses have been by no means light. Meanwhile off Buna, New Guinea, Allied bombers have sunk a Japanese cruiser and a destroyer. One direct hit sank the cruiser and a 500-pound bomb broke the destroyer in two.

On land in New Guinea Allied troops have now reached and are fighting on the outskirts of Buna. The Australians and Americans continue to close in on this important base.

Enlistment of Miss Marie Janze, 23, of Hazelton in the Canadian Women's Army Corps is also announced.

HEADQUARTERS OF THE ALASKA DEFENCES COMMAND, Nov. 20.—United States Army aerial reconnaissance disclosed apparent renewed Japanese air activity at Attu Island near the end of Alutian chain. The island was occupied once this summer by the invaders but later was abandoned.

SWEDEN WILL FIGHT STOCKHOLM, Nov. 20.—Sweden's Prince Wilhelm, speaking to voluntary defence groups, said his country is "prepared to fight to the utmost if necessary."

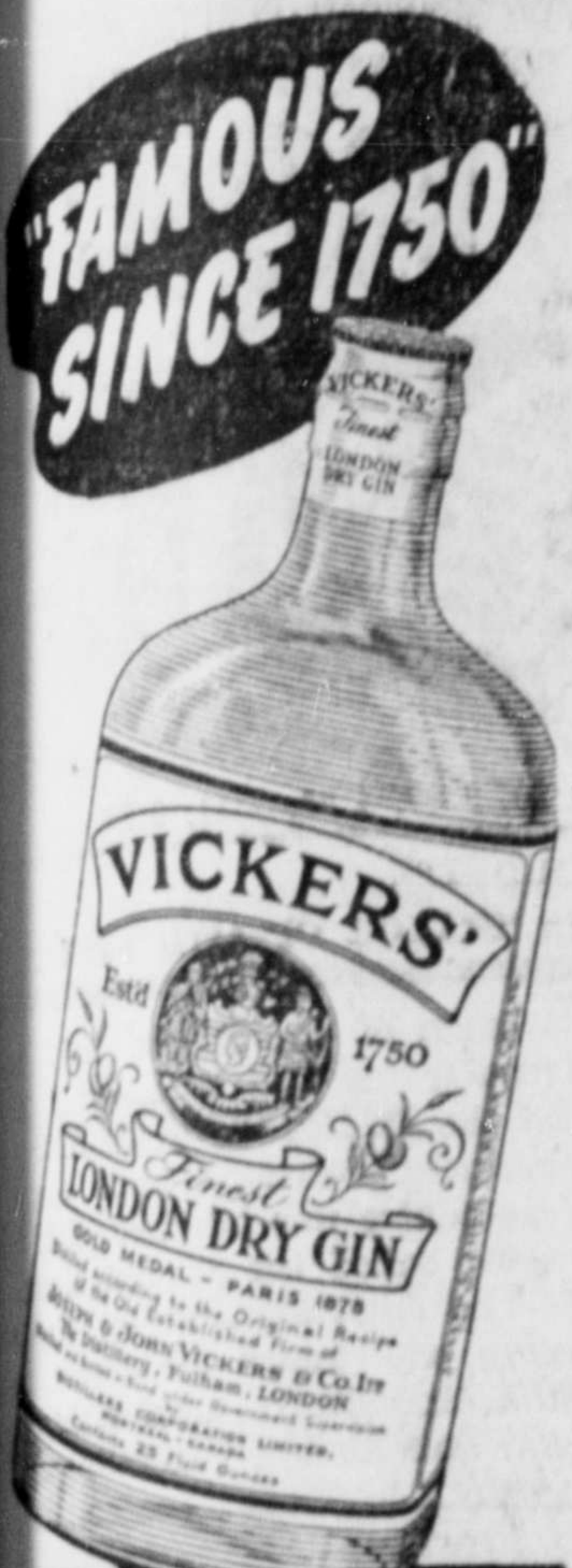
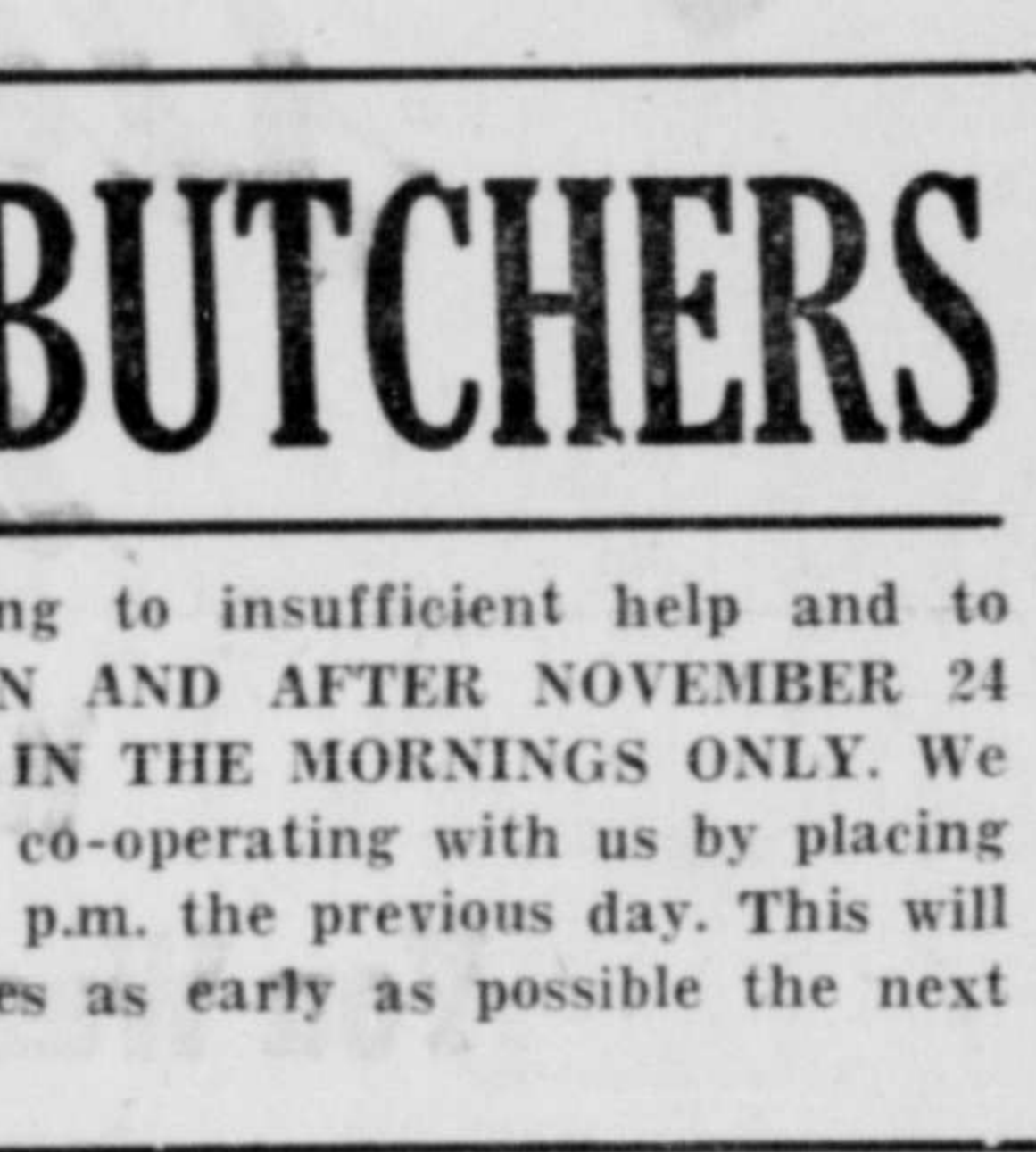

**Washing Statues
 Breeds Affection**

It Needs Finesse and Wartime Expert of Old London Tells About It
 LONDON, Nov. 20 (C)—War or no war the statues must be kept clean and the job of official statue-washer is still sound wartime employment. Many London statues have been removed to places of greater safety in the provinces but the statue-washers go out every so often to look after them.
 One of the official washers is Oliver Oldfield who says washing statues in wartime is no different than in peace time. He explained that after you've been washing a statue for years you get to know all its moods and idiosyncrasies and develop a kind of affection for it, just like the nurse who washes someone else's baby.
 In peacetime the statue of Peter Pan was cleaned every day and had an elaborate treatment with beeswax and turpentine twice a month. Oldfield said once he found a bar of chocolate beside Peter Pan every day for a week. Chil-

dren had left it there for Peter to eat at night.
 Before the war there were 13 official statue washers who cleaned the 240 famous statues in London belonging to the crown. Now there are only a few left. Not everybody, incidentally, can wash a statue, says Oldfield. It takes three years to become a skilled washer and the men originally were chosen from among the most promising of the builders' laborers working for the Office of Works.

**Quaint Memorial
 Recalls Darnley**

Monument Placed in Park For Peer's Toe
 GRAVESEND, Eng., Nov. 20 (C)—In the midst of nearby Cobham park stands Britain's quaintest monument—recalling a peer's lost toe. On that spot 107 years ago the Earl of Darnley became dissatisfied with the way a woodcutter was wielding an axe. The Earl took the axe and lunged at the tree, but the blade struck a glancing blow and when it bounced severed one of his toes.
 A few days later the Earl died of blood poisoning from the injury and the monument—a family mausoleum which has never been used—was erected on the spot in his memory.
