BATTLE OF SOLOMONS

Yanks Still Holding Guadalcanal Air Field-Thirty-three More Jap Planes Shot Down

JAPS STILL STRONG WASHINGTON, Oct. 20 (CP)-Secretary of the Navy Frank Knox said today that he believed the Japanese had "by no means as yet" used their maximum force in the Battle of the Solomons. "It is still a good, stiff, hard fight," he told a press conference. Col. Knox said he had no information to add to the most recent navy communique which told last night of American warships suddenly reappearing in the Solomons.

WASHINGTON, D.C., Oct. 20: -The smoke of battle still screens action in the Solomon Islands between United States and apanese forces of land, sea and air but the Stars and Stripes still fly over the vital Guadalcanal air field. Thirty-one more Japanese planes were shot down yesterday. making an estimated 340 the number of planes the enemy has lost so far in the Solomons, a greater number than at Midway Island.

While the United States Navy pounds away at Japanese targets at various points, Japanese warships are still shelling United JAPS HIT but no land offensive or further enemy landings are reported.

The enemy are reported to have 250,000 troops concentrated on nearby Caroline Islands to be used, no doubt, in following up any successes that may be obtained in the Solomons.




