Battle Of Desert Is Livening Up

MEASURE IS GOING THRU

Conscription Bill is Up for Third Reading Today—King and Hanson Speak

OTTAWA, July 23.—The government's conscription bill is up for third reading today and is expected to be put through with little delay although one Quebec member has intimated his intention of speaking against the measure.

Prime Minister William Lyon Mackenzie King, who had previously said that the government would come back to Parliament for a vote of confidence if conscription for overseas service were put into effect, announced yesterday that the government would not seek further authority from Parliament to implement the bill.

WINS FOR CHINESE

Japanese Invaders Do Not Appear To Be Doing So Well in That Area Just Now

CHUNGKING, July 23.—Further gains against the Japanese are being made by the Chinese in southeast China. Guerrilla activities are making it very difficult for the invaders to control the Chekiang-Hankow Railway.

United States army planes are continuing attacks on Japanese shipping.

YUGOSLAVS FIGHT BACK

Guerrilla Patriots Reported To Have Killed or Captured Ten Thousand Nazis

LONDON, July 23.—Yugoslav guerrilla patriots continue fighting Axis troops throughout Yugoslavia. They have, it is said, killed or captured 10,000 Nazis and have suffered heavy losses themselves. A German rescue expedition is reported to have been sent down the Danube River.

Communists Make Demand To Open Up Second Front

LONDON, July 23.—The British Communist party staged a demonstration yesterday demanding the immediate opening up of a second front to aid Russia. Another such demonstration is called for Sunday.

DECORATED FOR COURAGE

LONDON, July 23.—FO. Bernard Wickstead, former Fleet Street newspaper man, has been awarded the D. F. C. On his first operational encounter with the enemy, the Beaufighter in which he and P. O. A. B. Harvey were flying was damaged in shooting down a Heinkel and crashed. They took turns swimming behind their dinghy until they reached shore 30 miles away. Harvey won the D. S. O.

INTERN GRUMBLERS

LONDON, July 23.—Germans classified as "grumblers" or defectors and offenders against the food regulations are to be sent to special camps, according to a Rome report quoted by Reuters.

TAXATION APPROVED

Federal Parliament of Australia Upheld in Important Decision Made Today

MELBOURNE, July 23.—In one of the most important legal decisions in Australia's history, the high court ruled today that federal parliament acted within its power in adopting a Dominion-wide uniform taxation plan. Four states had attacked the plan as usurping constitutional rights.

HOLDING SECRET

British government Not Being Drawn Out in Regard To Second Front

LONDON, July 23.—Any plans the government may have for the opening of a second front in western Europe are being kept a tightly guarded secret. No revealing statement is forthcoming in spite of widespread agitation.

Sir Stafford Cripps, government leader in the House of Commons, implied in the House today that the government has in mind some operation toward opening a second European front to relieve the German pressure in Russia. Cripps, however, told the House that the government would not "entrust the secret even to 615 people"—the members of Parliament.

LANDING IS MADE

Japanese Put Force of 2500 Ashore On New Guinea Closer To Port Moresby

MELBOURNE, July 23.—The Japanese have effected a new landing with a force of 2500 men on New Guinea in closer proximity to Port Moresby. It was in the operation of this landing that the loss of a transport to Allied bombers, as announced yesterday, occurred.

PATRIOTIC PENSIONER

LONDON, July 23.—John William Christmas, awarded a disability pension after the last war, voluntarily gave it up while the present war lasts and joined the Royal Air Force as an aircraftsman.

EAST COAST TOWN HIT
LONDON—A number of civilians were killed by a single German plane which dropped a stick of bombs on an east coast town in a low daylight raid. One direct hit wiped out a family of six.

NEW GUINEA LANDING
ALLIED HEADQUARTERS IN AUSTRALIA—The Japanese put ashore a force of between 1500 and 2500 men at Gona Mission on the Pupun Coast in the first aggressive thrust toward Australia since the smashing Coral Sea defeat. This is a distance of 100 miles across from the Allied outpost of Port Moresby on New Guinea. The landings cost the Japanese heavily in casualties.

INCOME TAX CHANGES
OTTAWA—Two changes proposed in income tax of the new budget were brought in yesterday by Hon. J. L. Hsley, minister of finance. One would insure that the net income of a commissioned officer would not fall below that of a warrant officer. Another makes alimony subject to income tax.

GANDHI SPEAKS
BOMBAY—Mahatma Gandhi regards Japanese occupation of India as inconceivable as long as Allied troops are in the country. If the Japanese should, however, occupy India his policy would still be non-co-operation. He would rather be shot, he says, than co-operate with the Japanese or any other power.

AID FOR CHINA
WASHINGTON—Aid for China was the principal subject of discussion at a meeting of the Pacific War Council yesterday. It is known definitely what China needs. The question is how to get it there.

Kitchen Fats For Munitions

Big Salvage Campaign Planned in United States

CHICAGO, July 23.—Two pounds of waste fat furnish enough glycerine to fire five anti-tank shells. That's why collecting grease from the kitchen puts it out of the frying pan into the firing line. Ten pounds of fat make 2 1/4 pounds of glycerine, and 800 pounds of glycerine make one ton of nitroglycerine. It takes about three pounds of nitroglycerine to make four pounds of dynamite. The government is undertaking the salvage of fats to collect 500,000,000.

URGES ALASKA ROAD
WASHINGTON—Frederic Delano, following a recent trip west, recommends to President Roosevelt the construction of a railway from Prince George to Fairbanks. It is deemed a valuable post-war project even if the war was over before it could be completed.

THREE MORE SINKINGS
WASHINGTON—Three more Allied ships have been sunk in the western Atlantic. One is a Norwegian vessel.

CANADIAN REPATRIATES
WASHINGTON—A ship, carrying 924 repatriates—40 Canadians—from Japan to North America, has arrived at Portuguese East Africa.

NAZI U-BOAT SUNK
WASHINGTON—A German submarine has been sunk by a United States destroyer off the Virginia coast. It has been revealed. Bodies of some of the Germans were recovered and a military funeral was accorded.

RUBBER TO GERMANY
LONDON—Japan is reported to be supplying Germany with a trickle of rubber which is being shipped by way of Cape Horn.

AKYAB BOMBED
NEW DELHI—British planes operating from India bombed Akyab and other enemy installations on the Burma coast.

LIFT COMMUNIST BAN
OTTAWA—The Defence of Canada regulations committee of the House of Commons recommends to Parliament that the present ban on the Communist Party of Canada should be lifted. The committee also recommends that seven other organizations, now held to be illegal, be taken out of that category.

Royal Air Force Is Still Active

Ranged Up and Down German-Occupied Coast of Europe Yesterday

LONDON, July 23.—The Royal Air Force ranged up and down the German-occupied coast of Europe by daylight yesterday, striking at shipping and port installations. Unfavorable weather kept the Royal Air Force at home last night.

DANGER IS VERY REAL

No Lessening in Menace of Nazi Advance Toward Vital Cities Of Russia

GRAVEST CRISIS
MOSCOW, July 23: (CP)—Russia, facing its gravest crisis in the thirteen-month old war with Nazi armored columns, is closing in for a second Battle of Rostov. The Nazis are headed toward Stalingrad and are pressing upon the lower Don between Stalingrad and Rostov in an effort to isolate the Caucasus. Rostov, at the mouth of the Don, is menaced from three sides with the nearest German forces at Novochebassk, twenty miles northeast of the city.

MOSCOW, July 23:—It is acknowledged by Soviet military authorities that the threat to Rostov and Stalingrad has greatly increased.

The enemy are now only twenty-five miles from Rostov and are in a position to strike at the city from three sides or by-pass it. Alarming progress is also being made by the Nazis toward Stalingrad. They have reached the big bend of the lower Don River only 125 miles distant from Stalingrad. (Berlin reports to Stockholm said Stalingrad was already being attacked).

However, there is some encouragement in the statement that the Russians are now moving up a new army which has been trained in the Urals. The Russians are still inching the Germans back from the approaches to Voronezh in the upper Don area.

BROKE NECK, NOW MOTHER

Leeds Woman Recovers From Serious Injury—"Walking Miracle"

LEEDS, England, July 23.—Mrs. Ada Mawn is known as Britain's "walking miracle." She is a 34-year-old wife of a Leeds soldier, a war worker who broke her neck, lived for months in a steel frame and then became the mother of a healthy boy. She broke her neck as she hurried to her factory canteen for lunch, slipped and fell.

First she was put into a plaster jacket but her condition made that unsuitable so she was fixed into a steel frame, stitched at the sides of the skull and kept in position by a 50-pound weight.

Twice her hair had to be shaved off completely. She could not move her hands or feet. She was fed through a rubber tube. But a fortnight before her baby was born, Mrs. Mawn was recovered sufficiently to sit for a time in a chair. The baby weighed six pounds, five ounces.

Her other son, seven-year-old Jack, didn't see her while she was in hospital. Mrs. Mawn wouldn't let him—"I looked so awful I didn't want to frighten him."

Now about Mr. Mawn. Home on leave for the baby's birth and filled with anxiety for the wife he had seen in a steel frame and surrounded by countless surgical gadgets, he cloaked his real feelings with the query: "Is the baby a real 'un or a tin 'un?"

TRAIN FIRE GUARDS
NEWCASTLE, Eng., July 23:—Compulsory training for fire guards has been announced by Helen Wilkinson, Parliamentary Secretary to the Ministry of Home Security. The training will take place during the 48 hours' part-time service a month.

OPTIMISTIC FOR EGYPT

British Military Experts Think Auchinleck Has Good Chance Now

CAIRO, July 23 (CP)—The British Army of the Nile is reported to have driven back the Axis centre with simultaneous attacks on other sectors of the El Alamein front. The British troops are reported to have made attacks on all three sectors—north, centre and south—of the thirty-five mile front.

Enemy forces are reported pushed from some of their positions on El Raweisat Ridge and gains have been consolidated by the British.

The battle is still raging inconclusively to the north and south in a see-saw melee, no details of which are as yet available.

British military experts in London say it is obvious General Sir Claude Auchinleck has been heavily reinforced in armor and artillery and is moving forward to a decisive battle. These experts appeared optimistic of the outcome.

Meanwhile the Royal Air Force continues its pounding of enemy objectives, sweeping over the battlefields and smashing motorized equipment of the Axis.

NAZI BOMBS IN ENGLAND

Scattered Raids Cause Some Casualties and Damage—Operations Not Extensive

LONDON, July 23.—A lone German raider came over an east coast town by daylight and caused some casualties and damage. An entire family was killed when the shopping district was attacked.

The enemy were also over an east Midlands town and a hotel in a town fifty miles from London was bombed.

SABOTAGE IN NORGE

Activities Against Invaders Is Becoming More Widespread

STOCKHOLM, July 23.—Another German troop train is reported to have been wrecked in Norway as sabotage against the invaders becomes even more widespread in that country.

Second Front Demanded By Beaverbrook

LONDON, July 23.—Lord Beaverbrook's newspaper, the Evening Standard, calls for quick action in the opening up of a second front to aid Russia.

DRIVER WAS SMART

CANVEY, Eng., July 23.—It was exciting to everyone but the driver when a bus with several passengers aboard caught fire. The driver drove back to a fire station and the flames were put out in no time.

WINS HIGH HONOR

LONDON, July 23:—Prime Minister J. C. Smuts of South Africa, has been awarded the Albert Medal of the Royal Empire Society for 1942. The medal was inscribed: "statesman, soldier, scientist, philosopher."

Looks Like Bad Winter For Europe

LONDON, July 23.—Germany and Nazi-controlled Europe will harvest a crop fifteen to twenty percent below normal this year, British and American experts say. Shortage of farmhands and rainy weather may make the deficit still greater. There are early indications that Europe will be facing a difficult winter from the food standpoint.

MUST HAVE SACRIFICE

Simpler Mode of Living Essential To Win War, Declares Official

"Our standard of living has probably been the highest in the world but we have got to get down to a simpler mode of living until this job is finished," declared J. V. Scrivener, local representative of the Wartime Prices and Trade Board in addressing the Prince Rupert Gyro Club yesterday on the purposes and functions of the board. "Total war and a high standard of living do not go hand in hand. Can we achieve by voluntary methods and action the harsh discipline and sacrifices of comfort which are necessary to alter our standard of living? Whether we can or cannot may have a bearing on the final result. Let each of us think it over."

"Canada's price control legislation is the most forward legislation on the statute books of any country," asserted Mr. Scrivener in his talk. He explained how the over-all retail ceiling plan of price control had been adopted in Canada as being the most easily administered and the fairest to everybody, from September 15 to October 11 last having been taken as the basic period for the price ceiling. Mr. Scrivener told how the Board was responsible for rationing of sugar and rubber but not of gasoline.

There are many snags and difficulties to overcome," Mr. Scrivener said "but a sure sense of the inevitability of the alternative (disastrous inflation) give those in authority the courage to carry on. Price control is worth working for and must not fail. We must prevent inflation from happening even though we may be called upon to make tremendous sacrifices. Inflation wherein the people, with more money to spend and less goods to buy, would compete against themselves and against the government for goods and services, means ruin. The government, the Wartime Prices and Trade Board and other bodies cannot defeat inflation but they can give leadership and direction. It is you and I who can make or mar the success of this great undertaking."

Prescribing what the people could do to play their part in supporting price control and preventing inflation, Mr. Scrivener suggested that prices be watched closely and cases of overcharging or disregard of the regulations be reported, that purchasing of luxuries or non-essential things be refrained from, that hoarding be avoided, that the regulations be strictly lived up to and anticipated as well as merely observed, that all ways and means of practising economies be adopted and that everything be taken care of and made last.

Mr. Scrivener also urged that heed be paid to the appeal for salvaging of rubber and tin of which there was such a scarcity and of which Canada was in such dire need.

The Situation In Russia . . .

There is little enough to feel cheerful about in the Russian picture today. The Red Army has fought valiantly and continues to do so. More than a year ago Adolf Hitler promised his people the defeat of Russia in six weeks. Yet Russia still fights on and, although it has suffered sorely, there is no sign of yielding. Rostov and Stalingrad, the Soviet itself admits, are in grave danger. They may or they may not fall but if they do, hard as the blow may be, that would not constitute the defeat of Russia. Hard pressed as Russia may be, there is little yet to suggest a collapse. Meanwhile Germany's lines are stretching further and further out. Gains must be consolidated if they are to be held. All of this takes time and the Russian winter, of which Hitler has already had one bitter experience, will be on the invaders again ere long.


