DIEPPE IS HIT AGAIN

Surprisingly Little Resistance From Air Is Met By Canadian Bombers

LONDON August 24—Canadian planes returned to the attack on Dieppe Saturday and met with little opposition, indicating that air power of the Axis is becoming depleted.

MORE NAZI RAIDS DUE

Air Secretary Thinks Temp Over Britain Will Be Increased Reich To Get It To

LONDON August 24—Sir Archibald Sinclair, secretary for air expects much more activity by the enemy this winter in the way of air attacks upon Britain but he promises that thousands of British planes will keep up the attack upon the Reich, continuing such devastation as that wrought upon Cologne and other great German cities.

Egypt Front Still Quiet

Only Patrol Activity on Land—British Planes Range Over Axis Supply Lines

CAIRO, August 24—There is only patrol activity as far as land fighting is concerned on the Egyptian desert. British bombing planes continue to range over enemy supply lines and bases.

Schools Open Next Tuesday

Local Educational Authorities Have No Instructions Regarding Delay in Date

Local school authorities stated today that, so far at least, no instructions had been received changing the date of September 1, next Tuesday, for the reopening of public and high schools. Arrangements are proceeding with a view to the reopening of schools at that time.

Howard Hughes Helps Kaiser

Noted Moving Picture Producer Places His Resources at Disposal Of Aerial Freighter Maker

HOLLYWOOD, August 24—Howard Hughes, moving picture producer and airplane manufacturer, has offered to place his resources for the manufacture of aircraft at the disposal of Henry J. Kaiser, Portland shipbuilder, in connection with his plan for the making of aerial freighters as a means of meeting the submarine menace to surface craft.

Situation Of Portugal Now Is Considered

LISBON, August 24—An extraordinary meeting of the cabinet of Portugal has been held to consider the position of this country following the declaration of war between Brazil and the Axis.

BEEF PRICE IS DROPPED

Welcome News For Housewives From Wartime Prices And Trade Board

A note of cheer for housewives is sounded by the Wartime Prices and Trade Board in announcing that a further reduction in the price of beef is effective from today.

This will be the third successive drop in prices since the board put into effect its new policy governing the domestic supply of beef.

First reduction came on July 13, the second on August 3.

The B. C. regional office of the board, Vancouver, states that a cut of one cent a pound comes into effect within the next few days. This will apply on all carcasses and quarters of beef of highest quality under the Dominion government beef grading standards.

Retailers are allowed one week from August 24 in which to adjust their figures to the new wholesale prices.

This new reduction brings best quality beef to the average ceiling prices of the packing houses for the basic period of September 15 to October 11, 1941 and is a total reduction of three cents a pound on wholesale prices since July 13. In view of the fact that the 19 1/2 cent price of June and July caused best steaks and roasts to soar beyond the limits of the average purse, the new price range should bring welcome relief to many householders now that they are able to buy the best steaks and roasts at the level of last September and October.

As an example of the cheaper rates, ceiling price for a sirloin steak should drop at one big store in Vancouver from 41c to 32c a pound and at another typical shop from 45c to 35c a pound. These are the ceiling prices and not special sale prices.

On September 13 a further reduction in beef will come into effect.

Board officers are keeping a check on wholesalers and retailers to see that the reductions are passed on to the consumer.

MORE GUNS MADE HERE

Production of Brens Being Doubled And That of Others Quadrupled

OTTAWA, Aug. 24 (P)—Hon. Charles D. Howe, minister of munitions and supply, announced today that facilities are now being provided to double the production of Bren guns in Canada and that production of other guns is being quadrupled.

Bylaw Covers Restaurants

Regulations Regarding Inspection And Sanitation Are To Be Enacted Tomorrow

A bylaw providing for the tightening up of inspection and sanitation of restaurants and eating places in the city is to be introduced at a special meeting of the city council to be held tomorrow morning. The bylaw has been drafted by the newly constituted health authorities here.

JOHANNESBURG, August 24—A new method to enable anti aircraft and field guns to range targets immediately on sighting is claimed by a Witwatersrand inventor, J. D. Van Der Berg and the South African defence Department is investigating.

PT. DARWIN IS RAIDED

But Japanese Bombers Did Little Damage and Four Were Brought Down

MELBOURNE, August 24—Forty-seven Japanese bombers and fighters staged another raid on Port Darwin shipping installations yesterday but only slight damage was done. Anti-aircraft defences functioned with good effect, keeping the enemy at a distance and bringing four of the raiding aircraft down.

AIR RAIDS EXCHANGED

Three Germans Shot Down Over Britain—Wellington Bombers Hit Emden

LONDON, Aug. 24 (P)—Three German bombers of a small number of enemy aircraft were destroyed over Britain during the night. The raiders came in over East Anglia and spread widely over the Midlands and as far as northwest England.

During the day yesterday two Wellington bombers broke through the clouds over the German naval base at Emden and hits were scored among buildings in the dock area.

30,000 INQUESTS

LONDON, August 24 (P)—Sir Walter Schroeder, Central London Coroner who held more than 30,000 inquests, is dead at 87. He held the inquest into the death of Belle Elmore, music-hall artist murdered by her husband, Dr. Crippen, arrested fleeing to Canada in 1910.

CURATE-PILOT KILLED

LEIGH-ON-SEA, Eng., August 24: (P)—PO. Gordon Harris, former Anglican curate here, who joined the Royal Air Force as a combatant rather than a chaplain, is presumed killed. He was a Blenheim pilot.

FOUR MORE JAPS SUNK

Another Vessel Disposed of By American Submarine, It is Learned

WASHINGTON August 24—Four more Japanese ships have been sunk by American submarines in the Pacific, one in the Aleutians.

MAY START NEW FRONT

Separate Command is Being Formed for Iraq and Iran

LONDON, August 24—Following the visit of Prime Minister Winston Churchill to Russia and the Near East, the formation of a separate military command for Iraq and Iran under General Sir Henry Maitland-Wilson is announced. It is suggested that this has been done with the expectation of another front being opened in connection with the German drive through the Caucasus.

There are also separate commands in Egypt and India.

CONVOY IS LARGE ONE

Largest Single Movement of War Materials and Fighting Men Across Atlantic

LONDON, August 24—The greatest convoy ever to cross the Atlantic has reached Britain. It brought vast quantities of war materials and thousands of fighting men from the United States. So numerous were the ships that they had to be unloaded at many British ports. The troops were quickly dispersed to various camps in the country. As a result of the convoy, American air strength from many huge United States bases in this country is greatly increased.

Six cadets of a Swedish infantry regiment were killed by the accidental explosion of a land mine during manoeuvres at Karlsberg.

Shipbuilding Speed Record

PORTLAND, Ore., August 24—The Henry J. Kaiser shipyard here has made another shipbuilding speed record with the launching yesterday of another freighter thirty-five days after the laying of the keel. The manager of the yard says that it will soon be turning out ships thirty days after their commencement.

CANADIANS ARE BURIED

Bodies of Forty-one Canadian Soldiers Interred—Further Casualty Lists Issued

LONDON, August 24—Forty-one Canadians who lost their lives as a result of the Dieppe commando raid last week were buried in Britain yesterday. Two of them were unidentified, the first unknown soldiers of the present war. Bands and guards of honor of seven regiments which took part in the raids participated in the rites. The soldiers buried included some whose bodies were brought back from the raid and others who died of injuries following their return.

The fifth Canadian casualty list following Dieppe was issued yesterday following the fourth list on the same day. Seventy-nine have now been listed as killed, 313 wounded and 36 missing. Brigadier Sherwood Lett of Vancouver has been listed as severely wounded. Brigadier W. W. Southam, who was at first announced as missing, is now listed as a prisoner of war.

REDS STILL FALL BACK

Germans Still Advancing Into Caucasus Are Forty Miles From Stalingrad

MOSCOW August 24—The Russians are falling back further towards the Gronzy oil fields of the Caucasus and the Black Sea. The enemy have reached a point forty miles from Stalingrad.

The Russians battled resolutely today in the narrow, flat corridor between the Don and Volga Rivers in the endeavor to halt German forces which finally consolidated their river crossing and struck out for Stalingrad, only forty miles away. Another thrust at the great industrial city moved slowly ahead at terrific cost on the Kotelnikovski sector, southwest of Stalingrad along the railway leading from the Black Sea.

A mid-day communique reported a violent struggle southeast of Kletskaia where the Germans had reached the east bank of the Don. Tanks ferried across the river constituted the greatest threat to Stalingrad.

URUGUAY FOR WAR

Another South American Nation Is Expected To Follow Example Of Brazil

MONTEVIDEO, August 24—Uruguay may soon follow Brazil in declaring war upon the Axis. "We are absolutely accompanying Brazil," declared the Uruguayan foreign minister.

Brazil did not declare war upon Japan but only so far on Germany, Italy and junior Axis powers.

Neither Argentina or Chili have shown any indication of changing their relations with the Axis.

India's Tea Needs Canada's Plywoods

Dominion's Agent Reporting on Market Says Prices Have Been Obstacle

OTTAWA, Aug. 24 (P)—Paul Sykes, Canadian Trade Commissioner in India, reported to the Department of Trade and Commerce that there is a substantial market for plywood in India, and said the Canadian plywood industry would be justified in trying to meet the Indian demand. So far Canada has supplied only a small part of the Indian requirement.

One big market for plywood is the tea trade, for use in the chests. Mr. Sykes said leading representatives of the trade had assured him of their interest in offers from Canadian suppliers and their readiness to purchase Canadian stocks whenever they are reasonably comparable in quality and price with those from other sources.

"The greatest obstacle to the development of the business has been price," Mr. Sykes said. "Baltic birch plywood for use in tea chests has been cheaper than Canadian stocks and is regarded by the trade as of superior quality."

"In the case of other plywood for use as building or manufacturing material, Scandinavian and Japanese prices have been invariably more favorable than Canadian offers."

STOVES JUST IN CASE

LONDON August 24 (P)—An emergency stove in every street in the country is the object of a plan prepared by the Food Ministry. The stoves would be used if gas and electricity services are interrupted.

Norma Shearer Married Again

Famous Canadian - Born Screen Actress Is Wedded to Ski Instructor

HOLLYWOOD, August 24—Norma Shearer, famous Canadian-born moving picture actress, was married yesterday to a ski instructor. The same ring was used in the ceremony with which Miss Shearer was wedded to her former husband, the late Irving Thalberg.

Miss Shearer appears as the star in "Her Cardboard Lover," current offering at the Capitol Theatre here.

MAKE RAID ON RABAU

Japanese - Held Base On New Britain Given Attention By Allied Planes

MELBOURNE August 24—American and Australian bombing planes raided the Japanese held port of Rabaul on New Britain and dropped eight tons of bombs on runways and hangars of the air base there, unquestionably doing a great deal of damage.

EDITORIAL

Keep Up The Habit . . .

It is a known fact that one's abilities, natural or acquired, decline unless kept alive through use. The man with a burning desire to paint, to become a good public speaker, or to write, or become an authority on some particular subject, can—and will lose the inclination by persistent non-indulgence of his desire.

Some abilities and appetites ought not to be allowed to die—even in these wartime days when most of us have jobs that seem to require every spare minute we can muster—abilities, for example, which can contribute to our own pleasure and relaxation now and in the future.

Thus a liking for good reading should never be allowed to die. On the contrary, it should be indulged, purposefully, daily, if it be at all possible. Similarly, if one has a hankering for some hobby or form of self-expression then one ought to indulge his desire faithfully—conquering the foes of disinclination, or unfavorable circumstances.

Some abilities and appetites die—perhaps should die. But those we want to keep alive, must be resolutely used and indulged.

In India, non-violence is rioting, stoning, burning and striking!

Wise Men Learn . . .

Sooner or later a man, if he is wise, discovers that life is a mixture of good days and bad, victory and defeat, give and take. He learns that it doesn't pay to be a sensitive soul; that he should let some things go over his head like water off a duck's back. He learns that he who loses his temper usually loses out. He learns that all men have burnt toast for breakfast now and then, and that he shouldn't take the other fellow's grouch too seriously.

He learns that carrying a chip on his shoulder is the easiest way to get into a fight. He learns that buck-passing always turns out to be a boomerang and that it never pays. He learns that it doesn't matter who gets the credit so long as the business shows a profit.

He learns that everybody is human and that it does not do any harm to smile and say "Good morning" even if it is raining. He learns that most of the other fellows are as ambitious as he is, that they have brains that are as good or better, and that hard work and not cleverness is the secret of success.

He learns that no man ever got to first base alone, and that it is only through co-operative effort that we move on to better things. He learns that folks are not any harder to get along with in one place than another, and that the "getting along" depends about ninety-eight per cent on his own behaviour.

NEWS FROM EDMONTON

Assurance was given western delegates that the Dominion government was considering steps to meet the shortage of farm labor brought about by enlistments and for other reasons, Hon. E. C. Manning, minister of trade and industry and chairman of the regional war labor board, on his return from Ottawa where he attended a conference with Hon. Humphrey Mitchell, minister of labor. The Alberta delegation urged upon the government the desirability of carrying on as much war work as possible in this part of Western Canada.

The biggest track and field meet held in Edmonton in years took place on Tuesday, of this week at the manning depot on the Edmonton Exhibition when 270 young men competed. In the 100-yard dash alone there were fifty-eight participants.

The thirty-fourth annual flower show of the Edmonton Horticultural Association was held last week. It drew a good attendance and there were more than one thousand entries. Dr. Robert Newton, president of the University of Alberta and himself an enthusiastic gardener opened the show.

NEWS FOR MIDLANDS

An office of the Unemployment Insurance Commission and the National Selective Service has been opened in Cobourg, B. M. Kennedy of Peterborough being in charge pending the appointment of a permanent staff. Premises for the office have been secured in the City Hall.

The Ontario Training School for girls is being removed from Galt to Cobourg. Workmen are now engaged in renovating the old McCook house on King street which will be used for the school, part of the staff of which will be removed with the girl inmates.

The Cobourg Oddfellows' Lodge held its annual decoration day when graves in two cemeteries were decorated. Rev. W. C. Watson of Champlain, New York, a former Cobourg boy, was the principal speaker and the service was attended by brethren Port Hope, Orono, Lindsay and other centres. The Cobourg Kiltie Band participated.

The sale of war savings stamps in stores of the Cobourg area is to be intensified. F. J. Slade of Cobourg heads a county-wide committee which is taking charge of the campaign.

OTTAWA August, 24.—Prices now prevailing in the United Kingdom for spirits and wines produced in Scotland are almost double those charged prior to the war. G. B. Johnson Canadian trade commissioner to Scotland reported to the department of trade and commerce. Whether the demand falls off due to sharp increase in duties imposed by the chancellor of the exchequer remains to be seen, Mr. Johnson stated. "Supplies have been short owing to the reduction in distilling and the increased demand," he added.

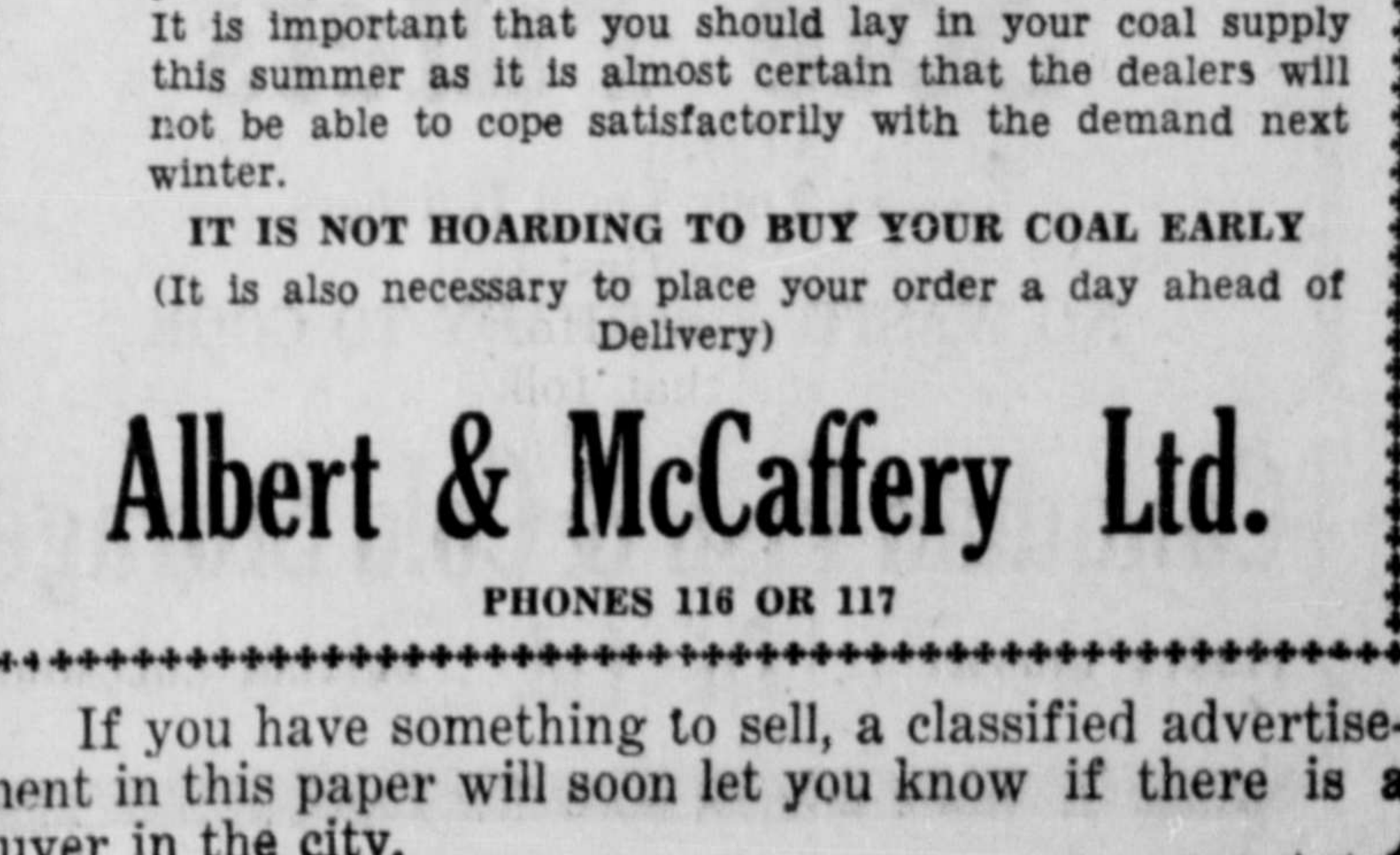
