# AIR RAID ON JAPAN

of Accuracy of United States Planes in Hitting Targets

WASHINGTON D.C., May 20 (Canadian Press)-In a statement issued yesterday at the White House, where he was presented with the Congressional Medal of Honor by President Franklin D. Roosevelt for leading the exploit of bombing Japanese cities recently, Brigadier General James H. Doolittle said little trouble was experienced in reaching the objectives or from Japanese planes.

Doolittle said that one bombardier strewed incendiary bombs along a quarter of a mile of an aircraft factory near Nagoya. The squadron came in just over housetops flying so low that it was difficult to observe the result of bombs but "it appeared to us that practically every bomb reached the target for which it was intended."

#### Canada And Vichy . . .

There will be some, probably many, to disagree with the policy of the Canadian government, as stated by Prime Minister Mackenzie King in the House of Commons, not to change this Dominion's relations with the Vichy government of France whereby there is an exchange of diplomatic representation between the two countries. Canada is the only part of the Empire where such representation is maintained. Even United States has almost broken off.

While it truly might appear on the surface that Canada has no business being unduly friendly with Vichy, this Dominion is in rather a peculiar position for reasons that are obvious . . . No doubt, the Canadian government feels it has very good purpose for maintaining what probably is little more than an outward gesture of diplomatic relationship. There will, no doubt, be a point beyond which even this cannot be continued. It may be a mockery but there is, doubtless, a purpose behind it. It is to be hoped that some good may accrue from it.





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
