Eighteen Year Olds and Married Men up to Thirty Are Now Liable

OTTAWA, August 16 (CP)— Men reaching eighteen years of age this year and married men up to thirty are now subject to call for compulsory military service under an extension of the callable classes announced by Hon. Humphrey Mitchell, minister of labor.

The new order drops the minimum callable age from nineteen to eighteen years of age but provides that men shall not be served with notice Messages From until they have reached the

The extension makes married men between twenty-seven and thirty years of age subject to call for the first time. Previously married men to twenty-five years of age were callable.

She told of a letter she had received from another part of the country telling of how fruit was going to waste because there was no one to bick it. "Really," she said "it seems to me there ought to be something done about such things as this. I myself have often thought if there is not something I myself could do."

That girl's views reflected those of the most of people who think about the economic situation and the war effort. They realize that something is wrong, feel that something should be done about it and wonder what they could do themselves. All of which resolves itself down to a sense of futility which may well be traced to lack of leadership and direction in the utilization of the manpower resources of the country.

People know that we have the resources and they are coming to realize that those resources are not being co-ordinated properly with the requirements of the people. There are not only the food resources but also the fuel resources, the building materials and other things. There is the feeling that there is much lacking in the direction not only of production but also of distribution. As the situation becomes tighter, and it is tightening rapidly enough, there will be a rising cry for better direction—a direction which may involve a changing of ways for many but which will have to be accepted if some less pleasant alternative is not to ensue.

It is a healthy sign that the young people as well "as the possibly more mature should be thinking of problems like this. It is a sign that more people are realizing the seriousness of the situation. And the more people that realize the situation, the more likely are we to get speedy and effective action.

The action must come from the national authorities. One of the first acts will have to be simplification of methods and the adoption of more direct measures—measures that will bring quick results.

The people are showing their impatience. The government we have is competent and has the power to meet the situation if it has the will. The re is handwriting on the political wall. The handwriting on the wall is not the danger, however, but is merely the warning. The danger lies in failing to heed the handwriting.

The federal government itself must realize the dangers that might be involved by a national political upheaval in these serious days of war when we must keep our ship of state on an even keel and steady course in the troublous seas.

Here in Canada we have in many ways been making a wonderful war effort—an effort that has evoked the commendation of our friends everywhere and commanded the respect of our enemies. But. because there has been some slowness in taking hold of the problem of manpower and making the best utilization of it, waste of natural resources is to be seen on one hand and shortages of goods on the other and the people are becoming discontented and threatening revolt politically to run the risk of making things worse by taking a chance that they might be better.

As for the government, the time has come for determined and decisive action irrespective of political effect. The people, it is obvious, are calling for strong action and will be satisfied with nothing else. When even the young people start talking about it, it is a real sign of the times.



A nutritionally valuable dish you can prepare the day before and complete in 30 minutes the next day

Busy wartime housewives are coming more and more to ask for recipes that permit pre-preparation. Now drain the kidney, remove tubes and membranes and cut into 1/2-inch

cubes. Add meats to the browning onion and brown well on all sides. Cover with boiling water or stock. Add 1 teaspoon Worcester Saucepinch of thyme, savoury, marjoram or poultry dressing—salt and pepper. Simmer covered for two hours. Thicken liquid with flour blended


