

# Allies Are Moving Toward Mainland

## Americans Don't Think Near End, Survey Shows

PRINCETON, N.J., Aug. 20—The United States government's campaign against over-optimism regarding the war should more properly be directed toward leaders in Washington rather than the people of the country. Despite the rapid success of Allied arms in Sicily, the American people are actually taking no more optimistic a view about the length of the war than they did before Mussolini fell and Italy began to crack up.

## Thousands Of Italian Desertions

BERNE, Switzerland, Aug. 20—The Italian armies, according to travellers arriving here, are breaking up with thousands of deserters. Peace demonstrations and disorders are spreading rapidly throughout the country. Open hostility against the Germans is becoming more apparent.

## Liquor Was Unstamped

Domestic Problem Aired at Police Court Hearing

Appearing in city police court charged with possessing liquor which did not have a government stamp, Louis Kocis said that he had brought the liquor with him on his return from a recent trip to Winnipeg. The liquor produced as evidence included several bottles of grain alcohol and rye whiskey. He had not brought the liquor for himself, he said, but for his wife whom he revealed as a woman of constant infidelity and many aliases. In returning to Prince Rupert it had been his intention to try and reconstruct his life with her but recent happenings had convinced him of its impossibility. Before sentencing Kocis to what under the act was a minimum sentence of \$50 fine or one month in jail, Magistrate Vance suggested that an investigation by the police into the activities of the woman mentioned would be in order.

## DEFEND MERCHANT SHIPS

LONDON, Aug. 20—The Norwegian merchant fleet now has its own Merchant Marine Defence, staffed with gunners trained by the Norwegian Navy.

## War Aims of Church Announced

British Clerical Leaders Issue Statement of Principles For a "Just and Durable Peace"

LONDON, Aug. 20—International control of armed power, mobilization of the world's resources to achieve freedom from want and immediate clarification of the United Nations' post-war aims beyond defeat of the Axis are suggested by the Churches' Peace Aims Group of Britain. The suggestions were contained in a statement airing the group's views on a "just and durable peace."

The statement set forth six main principles which the group deemed necessary for "real victory" and for a Christian basis for post-war reconstruction. It was drawn up as a reply to similar views expressed by the Federal Council of Churches of America.

It is signed by the Archbishop of Canterbury and York, the Moderator of the Church of Scotland, the Moderator of the Free Church Council, secretaries of Congregational and Baptist unions and Rev. W. J. Noble, former president of the Methodist conference. Other signatories include Very Rev. J. Hutchingson Cockburn, Master of Balliol College, Sir Richard Livingstone and Sir J. Hope Simpson.

## Conflict of Faiths

"The present war is more than a conflict of nations—it is a conflict of faiths," the statement said. "Real victory depends on the clarity of our aims beyond the military defeat of the enemy and on the completeness and sincerity of our dedication to those aims."

It then listed the following principles for "real victory":  
"1. We agree that the peace must provide the political framework for a continuing collaboration of the United Nations and in due course of neutral and enemy nations. We hold also that the achievement of such a world political organization will only be possible if it is the expression of a unity of action wrought out in facing the complex problems of world reconstruction."

We shall be confronted with certain immediate and urgent needs, supreme among which will be the feeding of hungry people and the restoration of order. Moreover, we attach great importance to a vigorous dealing with the question of security, assuring to all peoples freedom from fear. . . . The acceptance of responsibility by the United Nations should be preparatory to the inclusion of the neutral and vanquished nations in this corporate system of world order as soon as political and psychological considerations permit.

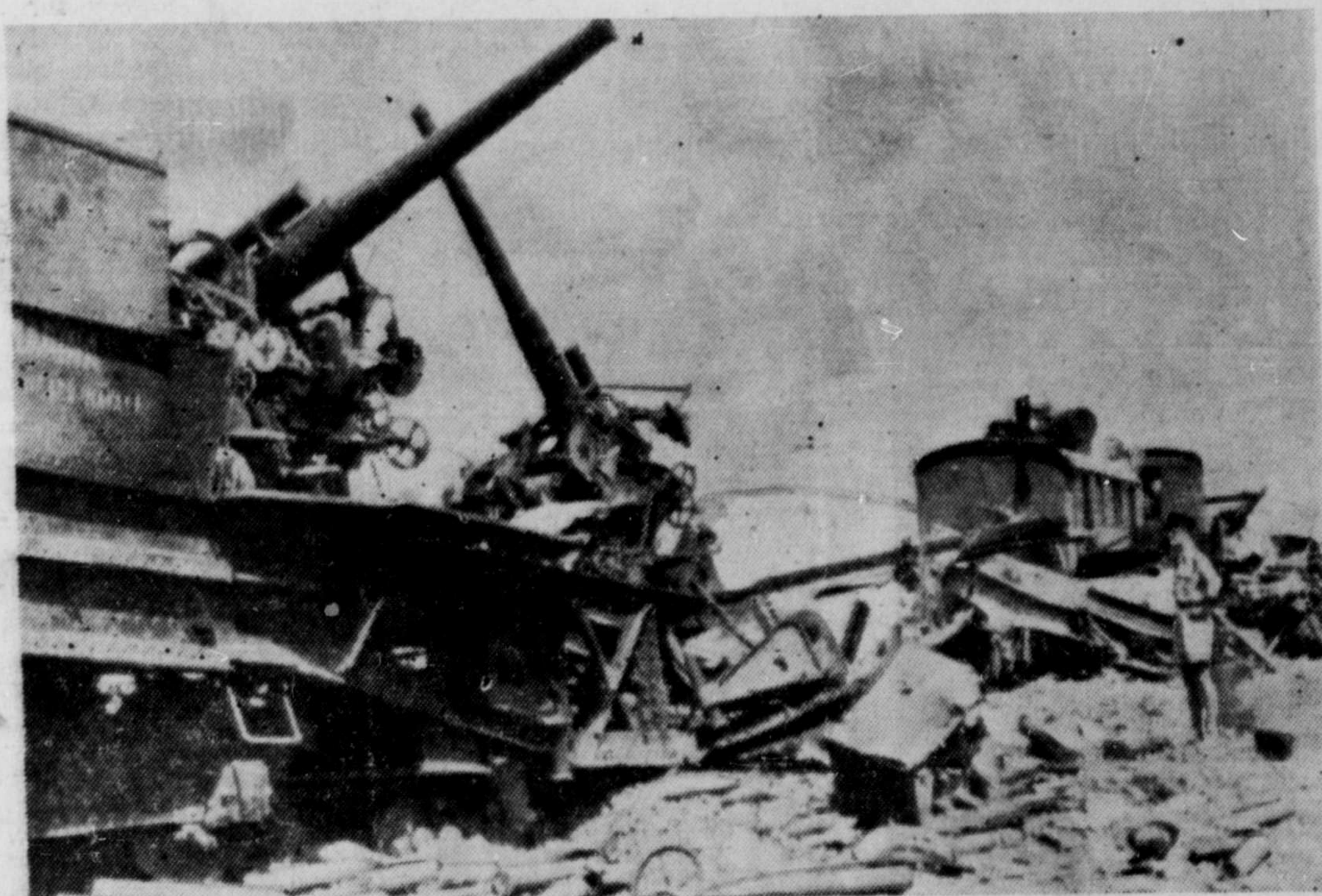
## Develop Earth's Resources

"2. We . . . consider that a permanent aim of the nations of the world should be to develop and mobilize the resources of the earth with a view to achieving for all peoples freedom from want."

"3. We doubt the feasibility of establishing a special mechanism for the revision of treaties, but we hope that a continuing co-operation in economic tasks and in the maintenance of world order may create a readiness to negotiate together such as would enable the world structure to be responsive to the need for change."

"4. We agree that not only good government, but self-government should be the goal for all men and that the progress of backward or subject people towards complete responsibility

## EXPLOSION IN FACTORY

Three Known Dead at Kearney, New Jersey — Missing Estimated at Forty-nine

KEARNEY, New Jersey, Aug. 20—Explosion and fire destroyed three buildings of the high Congoleum-Nairn Incorporation plant on Thursday night, leaving a toll of three known dead and 15 injured eight critically. A company explosion said that eight others were missing.

Fire Chief Charles Burnett of Newark estimates that the missing will total 49. He said that, apparently an explosion of cork and linoleum dust, which created the blast, was "more terrific than dynamite."

## Nazi Doom Is Sealed

Only One Avenue of Escape From Kharkov Now

LONDON, Aug. 20—The Russians, sealing off Kharkov for annihilation, gained from three to seven miles Thursday on three sides of the city, killing 2,400 Germans who were hurled against the Soviet forces in vain counter-attacks, Moscow announced. Only one railway escape now remains open to the Nazis' Kharkov garrison. Thirty villages fell Thursday to the Russians on the west, northwest and southwest of Kharkov.

In the drive against Bryansk to the north more than 20 villages were seized by the Russians.

## School Boys Not Subject

Will Not Be Affected by New Compulsory Service Order

OTTAWA, Aug. 20—Boys who are attending school will not be subject to the new compulsory service order.

The fact that Herbert Guillemette could talk French was responsible for him getting an invitation into a city home on Wednesday night. The fact that he lacked the usual Gallic ability to master quantities of wine got him a summons into city police court yesterday morning. Invited into their home by the two ladies so that he could speak French to their children, he thought to return their hospitality by bringing with him a quantity of wine. But somehow he got tangled up in his own efforts at hospitality and, under the influence of the loganberry juice, became rowdy and wanted to fight. Whether he selected the women or the children as his sparring partners was not made clear but one of the ladies phoned in a complaint to the police.

With the arrival of a constable, Guillemette found a handy and capable opponent and, following a short scuffle, he was lodged in the civic bastille. Yesterday morning in police court Magistrate Vance fined him \$25 with an option of seven days in jail.

## ACTION AND NOT WORDS

British Minister of Information Says Plans Being Made to Exterminate Those Responsible for War

OVER WEEK-END  
QUEBEC, Aug. 20 (CP)—The war conference here between Prime Minister Winston Churchill, President Franklin D. Roosevelt and other British and American leaders is expected to continue at least over the week-end.

QUEBEC, Aug. 20—The British Minister of Information, Brendan Bracken, made a statement last night in regard to the deliberations of the Quebec war conference at which Prime Minister Winston Churchill and President Franklin D. Roosevelt of the United States are the central figures.

Military plans being prepared, he said, are designed to "burn, bomb and ruthlessly destroy in every way available to us the German and Japanese war machines and the people responsible for this war." The nature of the plans being drafted at the conference would be disclosed to the enemy only on the battlefield and in the action of generals, admirals and air marshals.

The war was going well but it would be long and hard, Mr. Bracken said. After Hitler and Germany had been rounded up and beaten the whole might of the British Empire would be concentrated on beating the Japanese who were a cruel and ruthless enemy. Bracken announced military decisions of vital importance are being made.

## Berlin Is Hit Again

Air Fields and Railways on Continent Are Other Targets—Fifty Enemy Planes Downed

LONDON, Aug. 20—Royal Air Force Mosquito bombers attacked Berlin last night. Fighters struck at air fields and railway targets on the continent.

The night raids followed blows by Allied planes, including a Royal Canadian Air Force fighter wing, at four of Germany's most important air bases in Holland and France Thursday.

Fifty enemy aircraft were shot down yesterday.

## Capture Italian Islands

Allies in Control of Aeolian Group—strong resistance on Southern Mainland

ALLIED HEADQUARTERS IN NORTH AFRICA, Aug. 20—Lipari and Stromboli islands on the Tyrrhenian Sea northwest of Messina have surrendered to a United States naval expedition. Lipari and Stromboli are the main islands of the Aeolian group. Their capture places the entire group at the disposal of the Allies.

Cairo reported Royal Air Force and American bombers were out in force Wednesday night and Thursday, bombing Port Crotone on the arch of the Italian boot, Crete and Foggia, near the eastern coast of Italy, northeast of Naples.

Concentrated anti-aircraft fire encountered by attacking Allied bombers indicates that the Axis is still strongly entrenched around Reggio Calabria in southern Italy.

Thirty-four enemy fighters were shot down in the Foggia action which was one of the greatest raids of the Mediterranean war. Five more Axis planes were destroyed over southern Italy. Seventeen Allied planes were lost.

## CHILDREN IMMUNIZED

Large Number of Canners, Youngsters Treated Against Catching Diseases

A total of six hundred and sixty children have been treated for immunization for diphtheria, whooping cough and small-pox at six canneries along the Skeena River in the past few weeks, according to Dr. R. G. Knipe, director of the Prince Rupert Health Unit.

Many of the children were treated against more than one of the ailments and the total number of treatments given were 906.

A total of 660 children were immunized from diphtheria and 94 for whooping cough. They were 554 successful vaccination against smallpox.

This work is done free by the health unit which operates under the Provincial Board of Health, Dr. Knipe revealed, and in terms of cost to the children's parents, had the work been done by private practitioners, it would have exceeded \$700.

Dr. Knipe emphasizes that the prevention of communicable diseases by immunization is the only sure method of assuring a healthy childhood and that the old adage that a ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure is more true than ever in these days of stress and shifting population.

The United Shipyards launched four ten thousand ton freighters Thursday. Three of them were launched on the same occasion. It was the first triple launching to take place in Canada.

He told how, like the Canadian Red Cross, it was an agency for delivery of medicines and comforts to prisoners of war in enemy countries. He also spoke of another Red Cross personal service, often taking the form, to American soldiers on active service.

Robert Herrick was warmly thanked by President A. C. McNeil.

The Rotary president requested as many members of the club as possible to volunteer their services in connection with the operation of the Civic Centre Carnival next week.

Selling rowing to the public compares with selling electric fans to the Eskimos. And if Henry Burgoyne of St. Catharines, Ont., is seen headed toward the Arctic with an electric fan sample under his arm, it will be because the last sport fans has been sold on rowing by this wizard financier. When Burgoyne, publisher of the St. Catharines Standard, was talked into accepting presidency of the Henley Aquatic Association at Port Dalhousie, Ont., 21 years ago, prospects of the Canadian Henley were no brighter than Mussolini's are now. The kitty was bare and the association was obligated to give Canadian Association of Amateur Oarsmen \$1,000 annually to conduct a regatta. And, as if to celebrate Burgoyne's acceptance, the bleacher grandstand at the re-

gatta course was dumped into the canal by a cyclone. After spending \$1,100 to rescue the grandstand, the boathouse collapsed and the association almost disappeared under the rain of bills. Burgoyne saved it by putting the bee on city council and anyone else who failed to skip town in time.

The president maintained the hot financial pace for the next 21 years. He signed promissory notes to raise money for improvements, hoping he'd find the money later. This he always did. Stock for a \$40,000 concrete grandstand was sold and the stand built. Burgoyne sold admission tickets on a five-year plan at \$30 a shot. Even people who thought sculling was only a quaint form of head surgery bought tickets under Burgoyne's urging. The C.A.A.O. got its \$1,000 every year and Burgoyne became president of that organization. Things are rolling a bit more smoothly in the rowing game now but Burgoyne still has his problems. There was \$15,000 outstanding on the concrete grandstand last year but times were good and Burgoyne raised the money from his neighbors. Andy Lytle of the Toronto Star comments: "I wasn't surprised to be told that Burgoyne is now chairman for Canada of the 'Aid to China' fund. If they'd turn this guy loose in a big way, he'd ultimately retire the national debt."

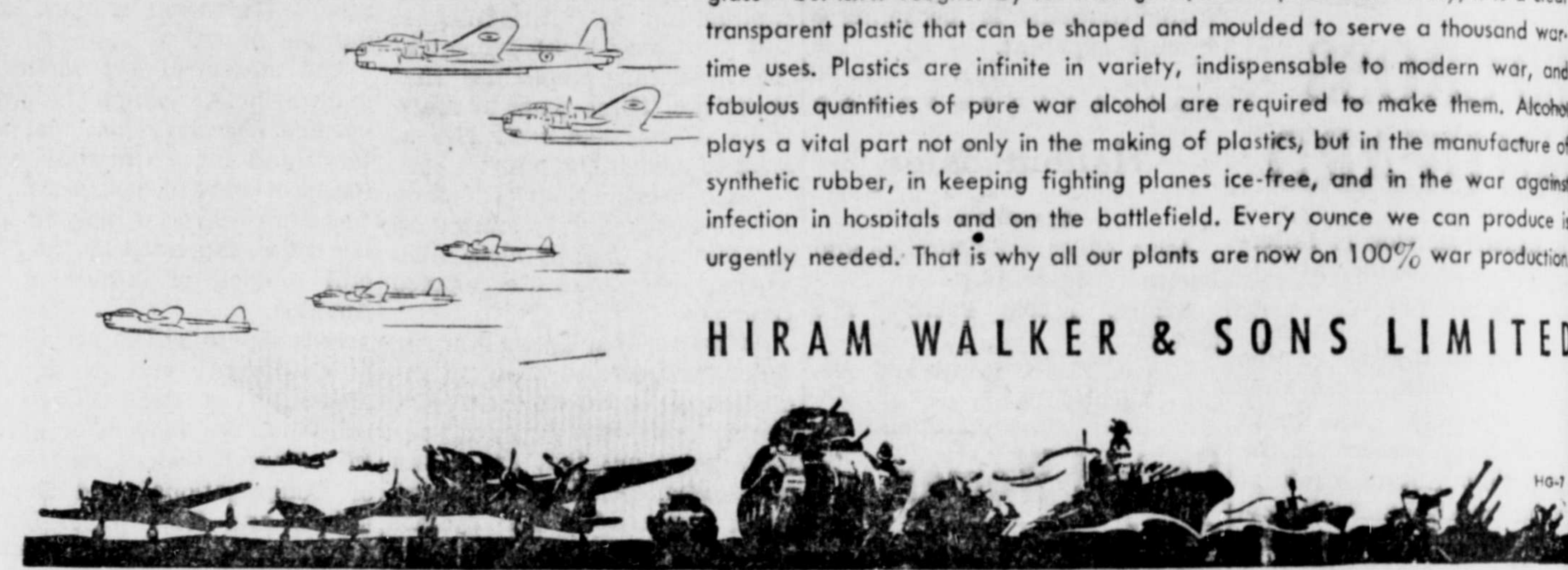
### Chinese War Relief . . .

In the skies over China's wartime capital and on the almost defenceless earth beneath, another bombing season is on, in Chungking. Throughout the summer and into the fall, residents of this Chinese city, most bombed spot on earth, can expect daily visits by waves of Japanese bombers. Relief is brought to them by the Chinese war relief fund.

Canadian admiration for China and for the Chinese people is unbounded. Now, through the first national appeal of the Chinese War Relief Fund, that admiration can be turned into a dollar-and-cents assistance for the people who have stood up against Japanese fury, superior arms, famine and disease for six years.

The money now being contributed from coast to coast in this Dominion will help to raise China's countless war orphans, to educate the thousands of young men and women in whose intelligent hands lies much of China's future, to buy medical supplies which will be flown to China by bomber through arrangement of the British authorities with the Chinese Government. A com-

mittee has been set up in China to dispense Canadian aid, according to the need and to emergencies that may arise. On that committee are Madame Chiang Kai-shek, wife of the Chinese Generalissimo, and Major-General Victor Odlum, Canada's first minister to China.

The Chinese War Relief Fund has set an objective of one million dollars for this, its first, national appeal. British Columbia is asked to raise \$100,000—Prince Rupert, \$5,000.

Canadian generosity and Canadian feeling towards China and the Chinese will see these objectives reached—and passed.

There will be no house-to-house canvass in Prince Rupert.

You are asked to make generous voluntary subscriptions.

Subscriptions will be received at any of the banks or at the Victory Loan Hut from next Monday until the end of the month, daily 2 to 5 p.m. and 6:30 to 8:30 p.m.


