Allied Bombers Attack Aircraft Installations at Paris and Elsewhere in France

BERLIN HIT AGAIN LONDON, Sept. 16: (Canadian Press)-Berlin was bombed last night in a wide-spread aerial assault which included a heavy raid on Mont Lucon in France and followed evening attacks on Paris aircraft plants and surrounding French air fields. It was the first attack on Berlin since September 4 and presumably was carried out by swift Mosquito bombers of the Royal Air Force which pummelled the German capital between saturation attacks of the four-engined craft.

LONDON, Sept. 16: — The British Eighth Army tonight reached Sapri, 39 miles from the embattled Fifth Army on the Salerno front in Italy. At the same time, General Clark, commander of the Fifth Army, said that a British and American counter-attack had blunted the wedge which the Germans had driven into the Allied line. Clark announced that "our beachhead is secure and we are here to stay." The force of the Eighth Army would soon be felt. At Washington United States Secretary of War said Allied forces at Salerno were in a "serious position."

Election in P. E. I...

The result of the election in Prince Edward Island ing? Well, I don't just know how yesterday presents no surprise. As a matter of fact, it was pretty much as might have been expected. The Liberal government is still in office with a commanding majority.

The Conservative Progressives have, apparently, won eight or ten seats out of a house of thirty, gaining from the sole three they had in the last house. This should be a matter of some satisfaction to the party which is endeavoring to rejuvenate itself.

The C. C. F., which entered the campaign late and was not expected to make much of a showing, failed to elect any of its nine candidates.

New Military Policy ...

The reduction of Canada's home defence operational military force by some twenty thousand men, as announced this week by Col. J. L. Ralston, minister of national defence, in a move which involves the disbanding of the seventh and eighth divisions and partial disbandment of the sixth division, is but another indication of the shifting tide of war. It marks a notable change in military policy whereby the high category men of the active forces are to be put into speedy and intensive training for overseas service while the less fit will be eliminated and sent back to civilian occupations where they can be employed to better advantage in the industrial war effort.

The move implies acceptance of the premise that the war will be concluded by offensive action abroad rather than by defensive measures at home. It does not mean that there will be any lessening in the need or demand for first class men for the fighting forces. The war must be over before it will be safe to make any assumption like that.

Local Radio Situation . . . We had been led to believe that well before this time the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation would have finally acquired the local broadcasting station and connected it up directly with the national network. That was the assurance that Ira Dilworth, regional director, gave us last December when he came here and announced that the C.B.C. had "come to

BLOOD DONORS- For those who make regular deposits in Boston Red Cross blood banks, Marion Philadelphia Harlow of nutrition service comes up with a suggestion for the proper foods to maintain the blood count at the level required of a blood donor.

Donors should eat green vegetables and whole grain cereal daily; three or four eggs week, and a generous serving of liver, heart or kidney once a week, oftener if possible.

Provided the proper foods are eaten regularly, donors may give blood at three-month intervals without suffering any ill effects, Miss Harlow says.


RATION TIPS-Now that the new No. 3 ration books are in circulation, Byrne Sanders, director of the prices board's consumer branch, has issued the following reminders to the women of Canada.

Ration books should not be loaned to friends. The purchase rationed goods without stamps encourages "black markets," and it is wrong to ask retailers to sell goods in return for ration stamps which 1 have expired. No one except immediate household concerned should use books for the purchase of rationed articles.


Anyone who finds a ration book should return it to the nearest local ration board at once. Retailers should not accept unused stamps. These should be removed from ration books and destroyed. Finally. says Miss Sanders, no one should attempt to make purchases with loose ration stamps
