

Menace of Success . . .

It is the duty and the mark of great leadership to be less affected than humanity-in-the-mass either by the menace of disaster or promises of success. It would seem, indeed, that the leader must be capable of reassembling these phrases, and of perceiving the promise in disaster, the menace in success. From the day when Winston Churchill offered the British people only "blood, sweat, toil and tears," to the moment when he finished his speech at this year's Lord Mayor's banquet, he has exercised this instinct.

In their darkest moment, Mr. Churchill did not stalk to the British people of some spectacular and fan-*tastic victory to be achieved by some occult stroke of fortune. He only pointed out to them their opportun--ity, in victory or defeat, to conduct themselves in such away as to make that moment "their finest hour."

One may not agree with Churchill that peoples fighting for the cause of liberty and righteousness have no right to expect Providence to supply a sudden and even miraculous ending for their trials. But one must heartily agree that the wishful optimism now so often encountered needs the reminders of Mr. Churchill's speech. No one is in a better position than he to know what is going into the preparations for the final thrust against the Nazis. No one can l know better the risks of the operation, the human costs that military leaders must write into their plans.

Mr. Churchill's endeavors to forestall the menace of success, to assure that the victory which is within reach will not be postponed because the peoples are unprepared to make the final payment.

London Lovely Now . . .

I doubt if we shall ever again see the centre of London as beautiful as it is now, says "A London Diary," New Statesman and Nation. Much that was ugly, as well as some that was irreplaceably lovely. has been destroyed. Bombs have created unexpected and delightful views: St. Paul's stands out as St. Peter's does in Rome and one can see it to great advantage from distant onen spaces, notably from a spot in Fetter Lane. Many hideous buildings make emite respectable ruins. From the rubble, purple willow herb grows luxuriantly and in one place I know of bracken is sprouting out of sandbags. The innumerable lakes which Mr. Morrison has given us as safeouards against fire are an immense improvement on the houses whose places they take, and in one place at least have attracted wild ducks. Outside this building they are tame as in the farmyard, and in Victoria Street a brood of ducklings has grown in comfortably from a nest in the rubble. Above all. for the first time in our lives, there is a sense of space and air in London, and these are the first essentials of all fine town planning.
