TWO HURT, ONE HELD, IN STABBING

Hotelman and Taxi Driver in Hospital Following Defence Against Itinerant Defence Worker With Knife.

As a result of a stabbing affray in the lobby of a local hotel last night two men are in hospital, police are holding a third, and seeking a fourth. Victims of the stabbing are Martin Labelle, proprietor of the Knox Hotel, and Patrick Keogh, taxi driver. RAID ON JAVA ALLIED HEADQUARTERS IN SOUTH PACIFIC—A record raid was made by American planes on Surebaya, Java, when 27 tons of bombs were dropped. Australian ground forces are closing in on Setteburg, New Guinea.

GERMAN PEACE BALLOON LONDON—Dr. Schaet, Baron von Papen and Marshal von Brauschitsch, prominent Nazis, are expected to soon send up a peace balloon in Berlin.

ROUMANIA PULLING OUT GENEVA—Information from a "highly reliable" source says that Roumania is pulling its forces out of the war in Russia under an agreement between Adolf Hitler and Premier Antonescu whereby the Reich retains oil concessions in Roumania.

PETAINE IMPRISONED LONDON — It is reported that Marshal Petain has resigned as chief of state of Vichy France and has been imprisoned by the Nazis in a chateau.

NAZIS TO PACIFIC WASHINGTON—It was suggested today that the Germans may extend submarine warfare from the Atlantic to the Indian and Pacific Oceans in an effort to disperse the Allied naval strength.

To Bear Down On Japanese

LONDON, Nov. 20 (AP)—Great Britain is studying the equipment and transport needed to bring the maximum impact on the Japanese in the Pacific.

TO PROBE TERRACE SERVICE

Activated by a protest from the Prince Rupert Chamber of Commerce to W. R. Devenish, manager of Canadian National Railways western lines, against the discontinuation of the daily local train service between Prince Rupert and Terrace after November 27 an investigator is being sent here to look into the matter.

He is W. C. Owen, assistant general manager, Canadian National Railways, who is expected to arrive tonight from Jasper.

This was the substance of a telegram received today from Mr. Devenish by Arthur Brooks-bank, Chamber of Commerce secretary. The telegram explained that the railway's reason for cutting off the service was because it had been set up originally as a feeder for the construction camps along the Skeena highway and, since the highway work is largely finished and the contractors moved elsewhere, there is no justification for continuing it.

The protest was made by telegram shortly after the railroad announced on Wednesday that the service would soon be discontinued.

German Raiders Over England

LONDON, Nov. 20 (AP)—The Germans sent a few raiders over southeast England last night. Bombs were dropped at one place, causing a few casualties.

Argentine Bans Time Magazine And Also Others

BUENOS AIRES, Nov. 20 — Time is among eighteen United States publications which have been ordered banned in the Argentine. In all 57 foreign publications have been ruled out while some one hundred Argentinean magazines and other publications have been suppressed. The forbidden publications are, apparently, those with Labor or Liberal tendencies.

Turkish Envoy To Berlin Recalled

ANKARA, Nov. 20 (AP)—The Turkish ambassador to Berlin has returned to this Turkish capital city to confer with his government on conditions in Germany. The popular Istanbul newspaper Tanin has published an editorial which appeared to be a preliminary step to prepare the Turks for eventual war against the Axis. This was the editorial which said that recent talks between the Turkish foreign minister and British Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden were "obviously not merely informative."

Offensive In Pacific

Daring American Raids on Gilbert and Marshall Islands May Presage it

PEARL HARBOR, Nov. 20 (CP)—Daring raids against Japanese strongholds in the Gilbert and Marshall Islands in which carrier-borne planes were used are heightening the belief that preliminary blows of the promised mid-Pacific offensive of the Allies may have already been struck. New assaults against Tarawa, major enemy base in the Gilberts and Milil and Maloe-lap in the Marshall group to the north carried the current series of attacks into the sixth consecutive day.

ALLIES ARE GOING AHEAD

Both Fifth and Eighth Armies Advance in Italy Despite Weather and Opposition.

ALGIERS, Nov. 20 (AP)—Despite mud, floods and fierce Nazi opposition, both Allied Fifth and Eighth Armies have gained ground at several points on the Italian front in the last 24 hours.

British troops advanced five miles to capture Perano in the Sangro River valley and point of origin for recent German counter-attacks.

In the area 13 miles inland from the Adriatic the Fifth Army made slight gains on the American sector near Venafro.

AIR FORCE OUT AGAIN

Chemical Works Near Cologne Principal Objective Last Night

LONDON, Nov. 20 (AP)—Royal Air Force and Canadian bombers, returning to Germany for the third consecutive night, blasted Leverkusen and other Rhineland targets Friday night. Leverkusen is a chemical centre, where war gas is made, six miles north of Cologne.

Three Canadian and two Royal Air Force planes failed to return. Weather prevented observation of results.

Canada To Get First Choice

United States to Own and Operate Canol as Long as War Is on.

OTTAWA, Nov. 20 (AP)—Under exchanges of notes between the governments of Canada and the United States on the Canol oil and pipe line project in the Canadian northwest, it is provided that the United States government is to construct the project in the Northwest Territories, Yukon and Alaska and own and operate it for the duration. Thereafter the properties are to be valued and the Canadian government is to have first option of purchasing the pipe line between Fort Norman and Whitehorse and the refinery at Whitehorse at commercial valuation.

NEW PHONE SERVICE

EDMONTON—The land telephone line between Edmonton and Whitehorse has just been completed and there has been overland conversation for the first time between Alaska and the United States.

NAVY IN CONCERT

Fine Performance by Band of H.M.C.S. Chatham Last Night

Last night H.M.C.S. Chatham naval band gave the first of a series of public concerts in the Navy Drill Hall and part of the performance was broadcast over station CFPR by permission of Commander C. M. Cree. The concert celebrated the opening of Navy Week, November 21-27, across Canada and also the opening of the Navy League membership drive today.

Under the competent baton of Chief Petty Officer Sunderland, the trimly jaunty bandmaster, the program opened with "O Canada" followed by a Sousa favorite "The Thunderer." A Victor Herbert medley was next, featuring Yvonne Riffou's sweet young soprano voice in "I'm Falling in Love with Someone" and "Kiss Me Again."

while Lieutenant Paul Marsh sang the delightful "Gypsy Love Song." Choosing a number from their earlier Victory Loan program and one which I could enjoy over again in each and every one of their concerts, the band then played Morton Gould's "Pavanne." Their interpretation of this work brought out all the sinister gaiety behind this stately Spanish dance. Drigo's charming "Valse Bluette" was next on this varying program followed by a topnotch arrangement of Hoge Cammichael's popular favorite "Star Dust." Ending the broadcast section of the concert, "Colonel Bogey" was played with spirit and not a little gusto.

A dance band interlude was next. Colored lighting and clever seating arrangement gave the approved ballroom effect. Under the leadership of Bandsman George Harris the music opened to an original tune of Bandsman George Dutton, the pianist. There were a few earsplitting seconds when the instruments rose to a peak of pure noise until the public address system was tuned down to an enjoyment level. Playing such popular numbers as "In the Blue of Evening" featuring the band's soloist, George Corbett, Swooner Sinatra's "All or Nothing At All" they ended with "Kansas City Blues," a live number to end all live. It was an enjoyable interlude and went to prove why these boys are in so much demand at local dances.

The third part of the evening's program opened with the nautical theme song "Ship Ahoy." Following this was the only strictly classical offering, Safranek's beautiful "Atlantis Suite." This work, in four parts, depicts an evening in the lost country of Atlantis, a gavotte at a court function, a love idyl and then the dreadful overwhelming of the lost country when the elements rush for-

ward into a catastrophic climax of destruction.

Once again the resonant baritone voice of Lieutenant Paul Marsh gave pleasure with Romberg's "Stouthearted Men." Cole Porter's famous "Night and Day" showed the band at its best and Bennett's "Rhythms of Rio" gave full play to the wizardry of the drums. A comedy number "For He's a Jolly Good Fellow" was an amusing episode. It showed how a small town band, with but one piece in its repertoire, by a series of ingenious transpositions and arrangements, was able to perform for a march past, school operetta, skating party, the mayor's funeral and a minstrel show.

"When Irish Eyes Are Smiling" was next sung by Yvonne Riffou and this was followed by the closing number on the program—a highly diverting "Rag-time Wedding" in which several of the bandsmen turned thespians. The cast of this tasty little number was: bride, George Harris; groom, Pop Brooks; Minister, Art Shaw; father, Reid George; narrator, Bill Reid. Altogether it was an evening to be remembered and I felt it a privilege to be able to enjoy such splendid talent. I was also privileged to sit in about the hardest and shortest chair on record. In fact the place where the chair ended and I began will live long in my memory. But then, I'm temperamental!

Menace of Success . . .

It is the duty and the mark of great leadership to be less affected than humanity-in-the-mass either by the menace of disaster or promises of success. It would seem, indeed, that the leader must be capable of reassembling these phrases, and of perceiving the promise in disaster, the menace in success. From the day when Winston Churchill offered the British people only "blood, sweat, toil and tears," to the moment when he finished his speech at this year's Lord Mayor's banquet, he has exercised this instinct.

In their darkest moment, Mr. Churchill did not talk to the British people of some spectacular and fantastic victory to be achieved by some occult stroke of fortune. He only pointed out to them their opportunity, in victory or defeat, to conduct themselves in such away as to make that moment "their finest hour."

One may not agree with Churchill that peoples fighting for the cause of liberty and righteousness have no right to expect Providence to supply a sudden and even miraculous ending for their trials. But one must heartily agree that the wishful optimism now so often encountered needs the reminders of Mr. Churchill's speech. No one is in a better position than he to know what is going into the preparations for the final thrust against the Nazis. No one can know better the risks of the operation, the human costs that military leaders must write into their plans.

Mr. Churchill's endeavors to forestall the menace of success, to assure that the victory which is within reach will not be postponed because the peoples are unprepared to make the final payment.

London Lovely Now . . .

I doubt if we shall ever again see the centre of London as beautiful as it is now, says "A London Diary," New Statesman and Nation. Much that was ugly, as well as some that was irreplaceably lovely, has been destroyed. Bombs have created unexpected and delightful views: St. Paul's stands out as St. Peter's does in Rome and one can see it to great advantage from distant open spaces, notably from a spot in Fetter Lane. Many hideous buildings make quite respectable ruins. From the rubble, purple willow herb grows luxuriantly and in one place I know of bracken is sprouting out of sandbags. The innumerable lakes which Mr. Morrison has given us as safeguards against fire are an immense improvement on the houses whose places they take, and in one place at least have attracted wild ducks. Outside this building they are tame as in the farmyard, and in Victoria Street a brood of ducklings has grown up comfortably from a nest in the rubble. Above all, for the first time in our lives, there is a sense of space and air in London, and these are the first essentials of all fine town planning.

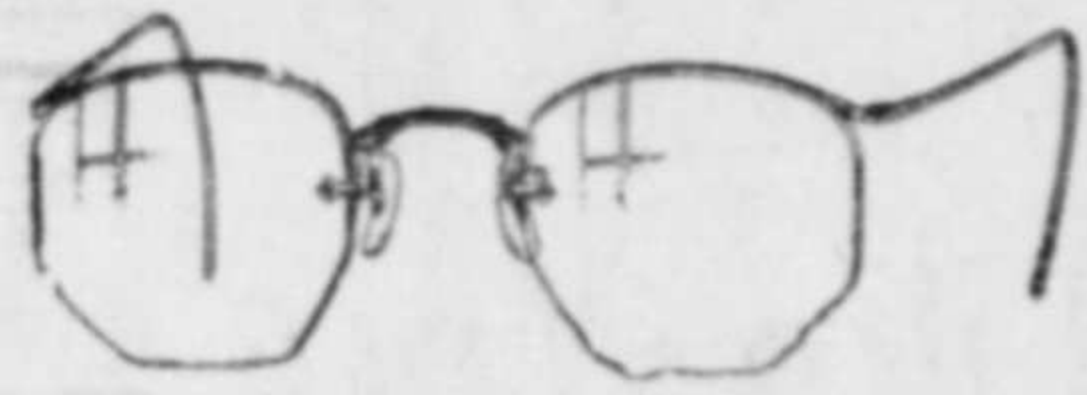

Waterfront Whiffs

Salmon Pack on Coast is Smallest
In Years—Chum Output in This
District Is Up

The total salmon pack on the British Columbia coast for the 1943 season up to a few days ago was 1,210,608 cases as compared with 1,752,314 cases up to a corresponding date last year. The pack for the coast this year has been the smallest in six years. There was a noticeable falling off in the sockeye pack which amounted to 164,926 cases as compared with 664,680 cases. While the packs of steelheads, bluebacks and coho have been off that of pinks, amounting to 529,197 1/2 cases, is substantially in excess of 269,222 1/2 cases in 1942. The pink pack for the coast, at 317,077 cases, is below last year's 580,986 1/2 cases but for Prince Rupert district this year the chum pack has been 171,553 cases, slightly in excess of 168,510 1/2 cases in 1942.
