Gov't Is Hard Hit

Mackenzie King Loses Four Seats in Four By-elections Monday

OTTAWA, Aug. 10 (CP) — Four federal by-elections on Monday saw Co-operative Commonwealth Federation candidates win in Selkirk, Manitoba and Humboldt, Saskatchewan; a Bloc Populaire victory in Stanstead, Quebec, and Labor Progressive win in Montreal-Cartier. The Liberals formerly held all four seats. The Progressive-Conservatives did not contest any of the by-elections.
In Selkirk William Bryce, C.C.F., defeated the Liberal, C. E. Fillmore, and a Social Creditor, Miss Salome Halldorson.
In Humboldt Joseph Burton, C.C.F., won by a wide margin over the Liberal, Frank Krenn, and the Social Creditor, Theodore Langdenhoff.
In Stanstead Armand Chequette of the Bloc Populaire, newly formed party of Maxime Raymond, M.P. for Beauharnois-La Prairie, won a tightly contested battle with Liberal and C.C.F. candidates.
In Montreal-Cartier Fred Rose, Labor Progressive, won but had only a small margin over the Bloc Populaire nominee, Liberal and C.C.F. candidates ran third and fourth respectively with the Independent far behind and last.
The loss of four former Liberal seats left the Liberals with 170 members of 245 seats in the House of Commons. The 173 excludes three Liberal Progressives and three Independent Liberals.
The Progressive-Conservative total remains at 39.
Bloc Populaire now has four members in Parliament.

Wreckage of Canadian Pacific Plane Missing Since December Sighted

Scattered Remnants Are Viewed From Air—Provincial Police Making Way to Mountain Top—Evidently All Died Instantly

VANCOUVER, Aug. 10 (CP) — The wrecked Canadian Pacific airliner which disappeared on the night of December 20 a few minutes before it was to land in Vancouver from Prince George with 13 passengers aboard has been sighted high in a mountain 75 miles southeast of Vancouver. Scattered wreckage has been viewed from the air. Evidently death came instantly to all the occupants of the plane. The police are making their way on foot over rugged terrain to the scene.
The wreckage was sighted shortly after noon yesterday by a Canadian Pacific air liner which circled overhead to make observations.
The ill-fated plane evidently hit a mountain peak 50 feet below the summit while in full flight.

The town hall caretaker found it on the doorstep one night when he went to answer a knock. There was nobody in sight.

North African Mailing Heavy

LONDON, August 10 — Answering complaints about mail delivery to forces in North Africa, Lord Croft, under-secretary for war, told the House of Lords that 1,500,000 letters and parcels are being sent there weekly. The average time for an airgraph was nine days, he said, and for surface letters 15 days plus the interval between the sailings of convoys. Lord Farrington had complained that there had been cases of accumulations of letters being delivered months after they were written.

The truck driver, Alex Konkin, is charged with manslaughter.

Polish Artist Escaped Nazis

Three Years Enroute Arrived In Canada with Wife After Many Adventures

WINNIPEG, August 10 — Mountains, streams and other devious routes were the byways to escape from tyrannical Nazi rule for the Polish artist, Rafal Malczewski and his wife, both being here now.
Travelling by night through the Carpathian Mountains, they left Poland behind for temporary safety in Czechoslovakia. December 1939. They halted there briefly and then headed for the mountain streams on the Hungarian border. These they waded.
They went to Paris from Hungary and were in France at the time of capitulation in June 1940. Their next retreat was Lourdes, then Vichy, both in unoccupied France.
The Brazilian ambassador in Vichy gave them their visa, and while telling of this incident, Mrs. Malczewski said: "When the war is over, Polish refugees want to erect a monument to the Brazilian ambassador, who has given more than 1,000 visas to Poles."
The artist and his wife arrived in Canada last November, after they had been through Spain, Portugal, Brazil and Rio de Janeiro.
Mr. Malczewski's watercolors of Canadian and Brazilian scenes are now on display in the Winnipeg Art Gallery.

Jap Bases Being Hit

Improved Weather Permits Allied Bombers to Strike Heavily In Southwest Pacific

ALLIED HEADQUARTERS IN SOUTHWEST PACIFIC, August 10 — Improved weather conditions allowed Allied bombers to strike heavily on Monday at Japanese bases over the entire southwest Pacific battlefield.
A particularly strong attack was made against Salamaua, big Japanese base on the north-east New Guinea coast with 103 tons of explosives causing heavy damage and fires.
The air offensive yesterday extended for a length of 2000 miles from the Solomons to the Netherlands East Indies.

Roosevelt In Canada

WASHINGTON, D.C., Aug. 10 — President Franklin D. Roosevelt returned to Washington yesterday after a fishing trip to Birch Island in Lake Huron. While away he was constantly in touch with affairs, mail being brought by fighter planes while special telephone and telegraph wires installed to the resort for his use.

RUPERT IS DISCUSSED

Local Radio Situation Coming Up at Session of Board of Governors in Vancouver

VANCOUVER, August 10 — The future of station CFPR at Prince Rupert in relation to the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation will be discussed at a conference of the governors of the corporation which opened here today and will continue in Victoria tomorrow and Thursday.
This is the first time that the board of governors has been able to visit British Columbia in a body.
One of the principal matters under discussion is to be extension of service.
Members of the board in attendance include Dr. James S. Thompson, general manager; Rene Morin, chairman; Mrs. T. W. Sutherland of Regina, and R. Rowe Holland of Vancouver Executive Assistant Donald Manson is also present as well as Mrs. Nellie McClung, a former member.
Besides the day and evening business sessions, a number of social functions have been arranged. The regional representative, Ira Dilworth, will entertain members of the board at an informal dinner this evening in Vancouver and Wednesday in Victoria. They will attend a luncheon on Friday, tendered by the Park Board, at Stanley Park Pavilion, Vancouver. The governors were entertained at an informal dinner last night by George Chandler, member of the Board of Directors of the Canadian Association of Broadcasters.

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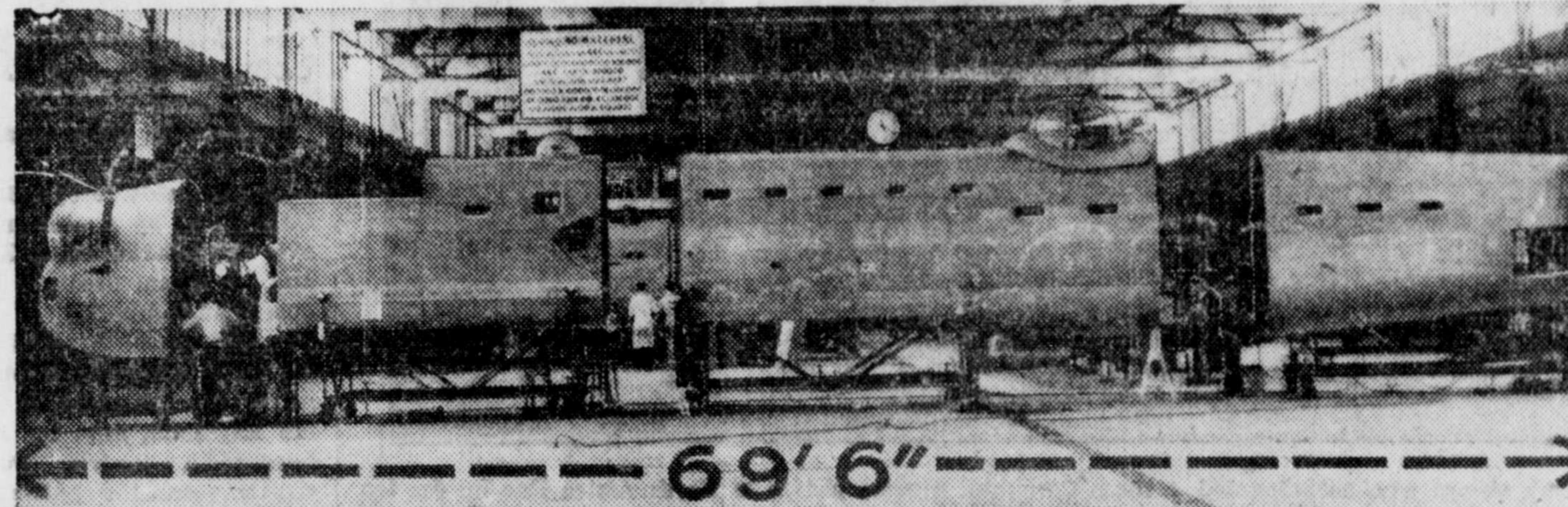
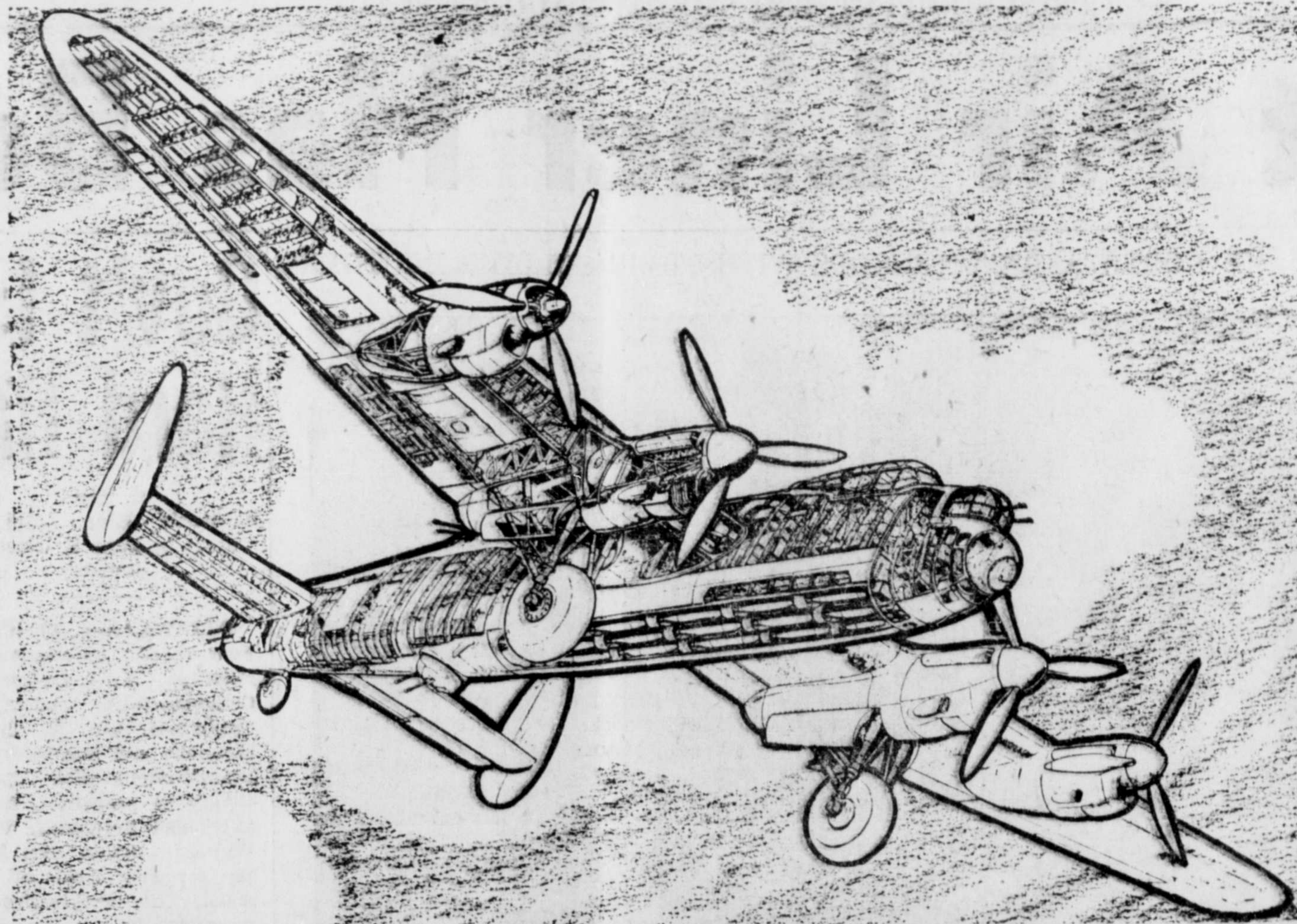

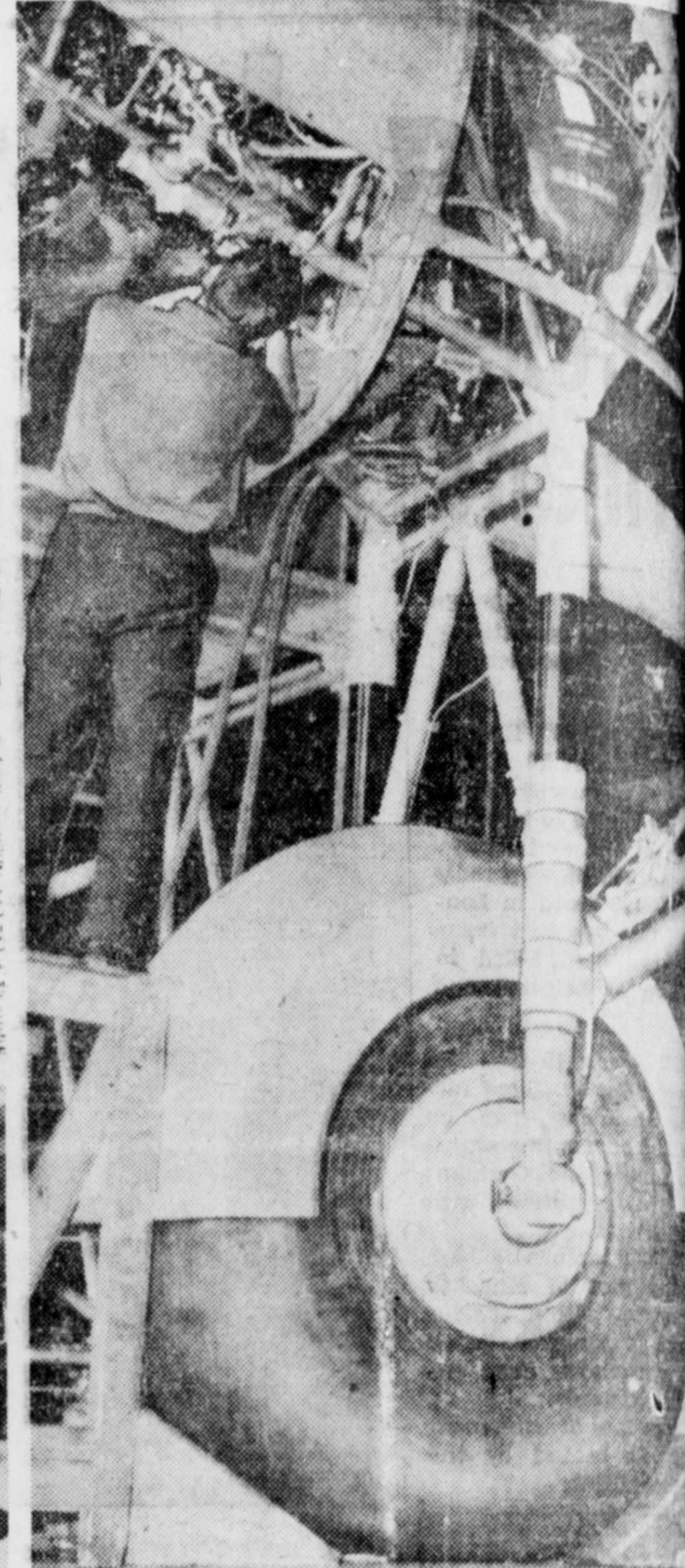

The Fall of Dictators . . .

The assumption of control in Germany from Adolf Hitler by a military triumvirate will, we are told by authoritative observers, make little difference to war policy of the Reich. Indeed, it is said, Hitler has been actually out of the picture for some months. Be that as it may, the change in control is no sign of strength and presents no implications which we need to feel much concern about.

Two dictators who, no doubt, were personally guilty in large measure of precipitating war have now been relieved of power. Even if these developments do not have immediate results in changing the general course of the war policies of Germany and Italy, they are ample token of our enemies realizing that the tide of battle has turned against them and that desperate measures are necessary.

Battle of Sicily Ending . . .

Latest dispatches indicate clearly that the Battle of Sicily is approaching its conclusion and may be over within the next few days with the Allies completely in possession of the great Italian island. Thus control of the Mediterranean is more completely ours than it has been since the war began.

There will be speculation on the question of what next after Sicily. It is logical to suppose that there may be a pause—probably not long—for consolidation of the island's possession. Where military strategy in connection with the Battle of Europe may call for the next move is a matter of debate. It might or might not be a landing on Italy proper although, if Badoglio continues to temporize as he is doing, Italy is reasonably certain to be subjected to increased Allied air attack.

Battle of Pacific . . .

General Douglas MacArthur declares that the final outcome of the Battle of the Pacific has already been decided. Of course that does not mean that the Japanese, even though they now be placed on the defensive, may not make thrusts, possibly quite powerful ones, in unexpected directions. The issue of the Battle of the Pacific may be decided, as MacArthur suggests, but the battle has not been won and there is every reason to believe that a lot of fighting must yet be done before it is won.

Battle of Russia . . .

The Battle of Russia is still the largest and one of the most important phases of the global war. If there had been any doubt as to where the initiative rested, it must now be dispelled. The retreat of the Nazis has taken on an aspect that makes it clear that it is being definitely planned. The Germans are now endeavouring to elude the great Red offensive rather than to resist it. The question is how far this retreat will go before another stand is made.

There have been large changes in the picture of the Russo-German front and we who watch the war have not yet been able to adjust ourselves to the new perspective.

Federal By-Elections . . .

The loss by the Mackenzie government of four seats in four by-elections yesterday needs little commentary—the significance being so obvious. There is certainly little comfort to be derived by the government. The growing strength of the socialist movement is again the outstanding feature through the election of C.C.F. candidates in Manitoba and Saskatchewan and an independent Laborite in one of the two Quebec seats. The dissatisfaction of Quebec is also apparent.

It is safe to assume now that there will be no general election this year.

NIGERIAS OILSEED

CAIRO August 10 —To help increase food production Nigeria is to grow more Beniseed—of Sesame—a plant which produces an oilseed having a six percent higher oil content than the groundnut.

LONDON, August 10 —The government proposes to give special training to 200,000 men in the first three years after the war to meet shortage of labor in the building industry, it was announced at a conference organized by the Building Industries National Council.

Sport Chat

Knight's Daughter, a royal filly which once all but reached the auction block through a lack of promise, bids fair to emerge as Britain's best two-year old of the season. Giving 10 pounds to all but one rival up Newmarket way, the Daughter romped to her third successive triumph in winning the five-furlong Balsham Stakes for the King. If it hadn't been for the temperamental filly, His Majesty's tables would show no victories this year.

Lord Derby's Bobby Trap, who provided one of the biggest upsets of the Derby by finishing last in the large field, finally won a race. He took an apprentice handicap affair at Newmarket. Optimists who took another chance on Bobby Trap after his dismal Derby display were pleasantly shocked when bookmaker paid off at 10-1. Incidentally, the one-day race meet, featuring eight races,

started at 11:30 in the morning. The latest acquisition to riding ranks is, no kidding, Donald Goose. A 14-year old stable boy, he rode in a Newmarket apprentice race but didn't finish in the money. Trainer Harvey Leader one of Britain's best believes young Goose has the makings of a good jockey.

About Dogs: Things like this just aren't done in rationed Britain, so a trainer who fed racing greyhounds with fresh milk was fined \$900. A milkman was fined \$28 for supplying the milk and charging an excessive price. The days when favorites for greyhound Derbys had police guards and top-notch races were rushed about the country by automobile to compete in big events ceased when the first air raid siren wailed. Nowadays even the most valuable dogs travel in the baggage coach of trains with only a boy or girl to look after them.

Take Arnold Johnston for instance. At the age of 15 he's kennelman for Trainer Sidney Orton. When he made his first trip out of London recently with two dogs valued at more than

\$13,000 he first had to get his mother's permission.

Boxing Buz: Jake Kilrain of Glasgow, former British welter-weight champion, was punched into submission by Pat O'Connor, rising young Eire middle-weight, in a London bout. The referee stopped the fight in the sixth round with Kilrain on his knees. Deputizing for Cpl. Harry Hurst of Montreal, classy Montrealer who was unable to get leave, Jimmy Bray of Liverpool was knocked out in the last minute of a bout with Harry Lazas of London. Bray was ahead on points when his chin collided with a right hook.

MIDLANDS

Rifleman "Bud" Bevan, son of Mr. and Mrs. Clarence Bevan of Cobourg, has been transferred by the Japanese from a prison camp in Hong Kong to Tokyo, according to word received by his parents through the International Red Cross.

Pte. Herb Martin of Cobourg had one of the toughest assignments in Sicily when with six other Canadian soldiers he escorted 750 Axis prisoners of war 20 miles down the line in the heat and dust—as there were no vehicles available for the purpose.

Fern Boldgett Sunde, formerly of Cobourg and now a wireless telegrapher in the merchant marine, was decorated with a Norwegian war medal, the St.

Olav Medal with Oak Leaves, by the Norwegian King, for having successfully crossed the Atlantic 51 times, with food for Britain.



HELP TO BRITAIN

Women's Group in England in Children's Service Earned Warm Praise

LONDON, Aug. 10 — British mothers will always remember with gratitude all Canada has done for their children during these war years. They will recall not only the care and kindness shown them in Canada but also the work done by 11 women who volunteered to come to England to help with the problems caused by evacuation from bombed areas.

Through wartime demands Britain was short of trained social workers and with the necessity to send children to less vulnerable parts of the country the need for trained social science workers became more and more acute.

In 1941, when the blitz was still on, the Canadian National Committee for Mental Hygiene offered the Ministry of Health the services of trained and experienced social workers from Canada. The offer was considered a blessing from heaven.

Dr. W. E. Blatz, Toronto, Dr. G. M. Hinks, General Director of the National Committee for Mental Hygiene, Toronto, and Dr. Stuart Jaffary, Director of Toronto School of Social Workers, came to England to discuss plans with the Ministry of Health. Then they returned to Canada to get recruits and funds for the venture.

In August, 1942, these Canadian women arrived in England in their smart blue uniforms similar to those worn by army nursing sisters but in a lighter blue, and low down on their sleeves a badge bearing the words Canadian Children's Service.

Where Needed Most

After two or three months making tours of observation to settlements and welfare-centres and working with English welfare workers in reception areas they were sent to the local authorities who were most badly in need of their knowledge and experience. Now it was no longer necessary that they should be dependent on funds received from Canada because they were under the control of the local governments.

Two of these Canadian women, Isabel A. Munroe, Edmonton, and Isabel A. Ratter, Vancouver, were lent to the Mental Health Emergency Committee who were short of psychiatric workers. One now is working for the Devonshire County Council.

Briefs From Britain

Police in some country districts of England are being issued with wooden soled shoes.

For maliciously killing a cow, an English soldier was sentenced to three years' penal servitude.

The War Secretary of the United Kingdom has before him an appeal to allow kilts to the Scottish Home Guard.

Eight Birmingham doctors have closed their surgeries, pooled their practices and set up a central health service.

Two British firms are experimenting with a plan that would abolish inner tubes from light car tires. It came from America.

Britain's amended fire prevention regulations permit local authorities to register all persons working in their areas for fireguard duties there.

Worthing hospital (England) swiftly cashed in on the news from Italy chalked notices in the town saying: "Mussolini goes—please give us a thank-offering."

School children of the Bahamas have sent \$450 to the Overseas League as an Empire Day gift to the tobacco fund for the troops.

The Royal Norwegian government information office in London hears that optimism is so high in Oslo now that the people there greet each other with "Good invasion!"

A Conservative M.P. has tabled a motion that the term commonwealth be used as the official designation of the Empire and that the title Protector be revived and added to the King's titles.

Bees are so sensitive to atmosphere that an air raid warning has been known to kill an entire swarm of 60,000 through their efforts to protect their queen J. B. Palfram, Yorkshire, England beekeeper, reported.

Even the robins are helping in this war. In the village of Little Berkhamstead in Hertfordshire, England, the village blacksmith, F. G. Mudge, raised \$45 for the Red Cross from "peeps" at robins' nests in his smithy.

Workers in a British aircraft factory gave up a week-end to assemble a Wellington bomber in the fastest time they could. They aimed at 30 hours and did it in five less. They gave their week-end bonus to the Aid for Russia fund.
