BATTLE OF NAPLES ON

Allied and German forces are at grips in bitter battle in the passes of mountains overlooking the Plains of Naples. The Nazis are now evacuating the burning city. Twenty planes with evacuees have been shot down. The British Eighth Army is advancing rapidly inside the east coast, meeting with little opposition, and appears to have Foggia, with its important air field, almost in its grasp, being only 25 miles away. Allied bombers have delivered heavy blows on important northern Italian cities including Bologna where Benito Mussolini has set up his puppet government. Allied troops have entered Bastia, enemy escape port on Corsica.

AT GATES OF KIEV

The Red Army has smashed into the suburbs of Kiev, capital of the Ukraine, from which the Germans are fleeing. They are in a workers' settlement across the river from the main city. Kiev has been in possession of the Nazis since September 1941. The Soviet forces are driving the Nazis beyond Smolensk. It is reported that units of the Red Army have already crossed the Dnieper River at some points. The Russians have now driven half way from Stalingrad to Berlin, having reached to White Russia and 100 miles from Poland. "The gates to the west are now open," says newspaper Pravda.

RHEIMS BOMB OBJECTIVE

LONDON-American Flying Fortresses were out over France yesterday, their principal target being Rheims air field and airplane parts factory. The Royal Air Force and Royal Canadian Air Force were also out over western Europe yesterday and last night.

CLASH OF NAVAL CRAFT

LONDON-The Admiralty announced today that at least one German e-boat was sunk and several others were damaged Saturday in a clash which developed when British light naval forces intercepted a flotilla of Nazi ships off the British east coast. The British trawler Franctireur was sunk.

### More Than Strategic Withdrawal..

Monday, Sept. 27, 1943.

With Smolensk and Kiev, the most important points they ever held in Russia, now gone or going and the Reds still smash forward the reverse movement of the Nazis all along the Soviet front is obviously more than a strategic withdrawal as Berlin would have the world, and particularly the German people themselves, believe. The next question is whether the wide Dnieper River will hold the Russians back. Conceivably it might until winter comes but it is not to be supposed it will after the great stream is frozen over. To picture the Nazis driven out of Russia entirely and fighting in their o'n territory on the eastern front is now much more than a wishful thinking possibility. It appears now to be a very likely probability and that before a great deal more time is passed. The Reds are really under way now and it looks like nothing the Germans have is going to stop them.

#### Russian Frontier Territory . . .

One of the buffers of the Reich appears to be pretty well crumbled now. Possibly the others, on the south and the west particularly, may be more effective. However, it was not so long ago that some realistic thinkers were saying that it would take a miracle to accomplish the fantastic possibility of the Russians driving the Germans completely off their own territory. What is happening to the Germans in Russia today may also be accomplished in Italy and France although the auspices for its accomplishment may not be as favorable as in Russia where the Soviets have their own and their entire strength solidly behind them. However, these things cannot be carried out unless there is large cost in lives and equipment. That is why responsible men on our side, while admitting that we are well on the. way to victory, think there is still a titanic struggle ahead.




