

Britain and Russia Are In Accord

Battle of Tunisia is Raging On

Further Advance Made by Germans In Centre—Allies in Lesser Wins

ALLIED HEADQUARTERS IN NORTH AFRICA, Feb. 22 — A strong German armored force thrust twelve miles northwestward through Kasserine gap in the direction of Thala early today and engaged a British tank unit in a violent battle while American combat troops turned back to lesser thrusts northeastward toward Siba.

British and United States forces knocked out fourteen Nazi tanks during heavy fighting yesterday and last night under a bright moon but one German column of more than seventy tanks thrust to within eight miles of Thala, junction of the Allied lines.

Rommel is gambling desperately in an effort to score a knockout against the British First Army before the Eighth Army can neutralize the Mareth line and push into the central Tunisia theatre.

TUG MEN ARRESTED

Sequel to Fatal Capsizing in Columbia River Earlier in Month

PORTLAND, Feb. 23 — Owner and pilot of the tugboat May which capsized on the Columbia River February 10 with loss of nine lives were arrested on federal charges of negligence. The owner is Lewis S. Russell jr. The pilot was Clarence Harvey.

The pair are charged with failing to outfit the tug with adequate safety devices.

BURGLARY WORK OF EXPERTS

R. W. Cameron's Jewelry Store Visited Saturday Night—Much Stock and Cash Taken

Watches, jewelry and cash were taken from Cameron's jewelry store between 9 and 11 o'clock Saturday night in a burglary which bore all the signs of being the work of experts. Mr. Cameron, up to this morning, had not exactly estimated the extent of his loss which is quite heavy.

Mr. and Mrs. Cameron left their store about 9 p.m. to attend the show. Returning about 11 p.m., they found that the burglary had taken place.

Entry was made by forcing up a rear window and departure was made simply by opening the rear door from inside.

The main door of the safe was defective and the dial had not been turned. The lock of the inner safe door was opened by drilling.

The living quarters of Mr. and Mrs. Cameron upstairs were also ransacked.

The police investigation is continuing but no arrests had been made up to noon today.

Also Saturday night a 50-pound sack of brown sugar was taken from the rear of Van's Bakery.

Supplies have been dropped and those on board the plane are preparing a runway over which it is hoped to take off.

Tight Ration Of Liquor Is Being Set In Alberta

EDMONTON, Feb. 22 — Liquor purchases in Alberta are to be limited to a 26-ounce bottle per person per month. One 40-ounce bottle may be bought as long as they last.

COMMANDER IS SPEAKER

Many Out-of-Town Members Are Guests at Toc H Meeting

On Friday evening the Prince Rupert Group of Toc H held a very interesting get-together at their rooms to welcome out-of-town members and others interested in Toc H. These included Lieut.-Commander Leslie Harrison R.C.N. of Kelowna Branch Toc H; Lieut. John Osborn, out-of-town member; Rev. Ivan Edwards, naval chaplain; Breen Melvin of the Y.M.C.A. and Petty Officer Arthur Dell R.C.N.

A very interesting address by Lieut.-Commander Harrison on "What Toc H Can Do to Help Build a Better World After the War" evoked much interest and discussion. The speaker said: "To help in this important work we must take as our guide the fourth point of Toc H compass 'To Build Bravely'.

To achieve this we must lay our course by the other three points 'To Love Widely,' 'To Think Fairly,' 'To Witness Humbly.' Let the Toc H compass be our guide. We must insist on the right of the individual to think independently, in contrast to the Nazi idea of mass thinking. Endeavour to combine the Spiritual, ideal and practical in this better world, for ever keeping as our guide the teaching and example of Jesus Christ."

"Toc H must," the speaker continued, "by the influence of its individual members, do its part in re-shaping the thinking of the people along these lines. All members should be in earnest and follow the Toc H rule to 'spread the Gospel without preaching.'"

"The important job for Toc H," said Lieut.-Commander Harrison "is for us to interest the younger men to work and think along Toc H lines and so help, along with other similar organizations, to build a better world after the war."

Some very interesting and thought-provoking points were stressed by visitors and members alike and the evening proved very educational and enjoyable.

The next meeting of Toc H takes place in March.

Bulletins

IF GANDHI DIES

NEW DELHI — If Mohandas K. Gandhi, 74-year-old Indian Nationalist leader now in the thirteenth day of a hunger strike, dies, there will be widespread revolution in India, those close to the Mahatma predict. Large scale violence will be bound to break out. Gandhi is the only person who has been able to maintain passive resistance in India for twenty years. Gandhi's condition is gradually becoming worse. He was sinking today and doctors have almost given up hope of recovery. In the United States Secretary of State Cordell Hull has expressed concern over Gandhi and it is understood to have discussed with Lord Halifax, British ambassador to the United States, the possibility of Gandhi's release. However, direct intervention by the United States is considered unlikely.

TO JOIN ALLIES

LONDON—The French fleet at Alexandria consisting of nine warships and smaller vessels will soon come over to the Allies, it is expected.

REDS NEAR DNEIPER

MOSCOW—The Russian forces have advanced to within thirty-six miles of the Dneiper River with capture of the vital railway junction towns of Krasnograd and Pavograd. There have been spring-like thaws on the southern front and this may slow up the Russian advance. However, it continues uninterrupted today.

IMPORTANT PASS LOST

ALLIED HEADQUARTERS IN NORTH AFRICA — French and American forces in Tunis have yielded to the Axis attempt to force important Kasserine Pass. The British, however, are softening up the Mareth Line. The Americans are still endeavouring to take up a stronger stand following their retreat.

U.S. ON RATIONS

WASHINGTON — Sale of canned fruits and vegetables in the United States has been banned pending the application of rations on March 1. There is no restriction on sale of fresh fruit and vegetables. Issuing of ration books started today.

SALVAGE STORAGE

Premises Obtained by Junior Chamber of Commerce on Waterfront

The salvage committee of the Prince Rupert Chamber of Commerce has solved the problem of finding quarters for the storage, sorting and assembling local salvage material for shipment. A fuel shed of the Hyde Transfer east of Cow Bay on the waterfront has been given over for the purpose by Percy Cameron. The shed measures 35 by 20 feet.

Yesterday a party of Junior Chamber members turned out to clean up the premises. Today the storage of bottles started. Later will follow the organization of collections after which there will have to be made storing, packing and shipment arrangements. There will be no house-to-house salvage collection in the meantime.

The Junior Chamber had been given a site at the corner of Third Avenue and Seventh Street to erect a salvage storage shed but difficulty arose in the matter of obtaining lumber with which to build the structure.

SUSPENSION PROTESTED

Local Labor Council Backs Up Vancouver Boilermakers

At the regular meeting of the Prince Rupert Labor Council, the members unanimously endorsed a resolution of the Vancouver Dock and Shipyard Union protesting suspension of the Boilermakers' Union in Vancouver by the Canadian Congress of Labor.

The question of unsanitary conditions in the Wartime Housing dining room was referred to the Allied Labor Council. It was reported that over \$100 had been collected by C. C. L. unions in the Aid to Russia drive.

JAP SUNK IN NORTH

Supply Sink Sent to Bottom by United States Planes Based in Aleutians

WASHINGTON, D.C., Feb. 22 — United States aircraft based on the Aleutian Islands have sunk a Japanese supply ship in the North Pacific, it is announced.

U-Boats Take Heavy Toll

WASHINGTON, D.C., Feb. 22 — The United States Navy reported today that more than 850 persons — mostly service personnel — are dead or missing as a result of two large American cargo-passenger ships being torpedoed by submarines in the North Atlantic early this month.

FRIENDSHIP WITH TURKS

Relations of Ankara With Great Britain and Russia Are Vastly Improved

ANKARA, Feb. 22—The Premier of Turkey says that a real alliance has been reached between Great Britain and Turkey and that friendship between Soviet, Russia and Turkey is growing every day as a result of the recent visit to Turkey of Prime Minister Winston Churchill of Great Britain.

REDS ARE MOVING ON

Important Advances All Along the Line Being Made by Russians

MOSCOW, Feb. 22—Driving forward without let-up and inflicting enormous losses upon the enemy, the Red Army is today within thirty miles of Dneiperpetrovsk, important city on the Dneiper River.

Fierce land and air fighting continues as the Russians advance in the regions of Krasnodar, Kursk, Novorossisk.

Orel is still threatened by the Reds.

NAPLES IS HIT AGAIN

Heavy Raid by U. S. Bombers On Important Italian Port

CAIRO, Feb. 22 — United States bombing planes based on North Africa attacked the Italian ports of Naples and Cremona, 200 miles to the south, on Saturday night. Three ships were hit in Naples and a great chemical works was damaged at Cremona. None of the planes failed to return.

The Italian High Command announced that 119 persons had been killed and 332 injured in the raid on Naples.

Objectives in Crete were also attacked. British planes from Malta raided points in Southern Sicily.

Cairo reports today said that Allied planes, blasting at Axis strength around the Mediterranean, bombed the Sicilian harbor of Palermo and attacked a convoy in the Mediterranean, leaving smoke pouring from one large merchant vessel.

Agreed Upon Principles Of Both War and Peace; Anthony Eden Declares

Will Go On Collaborating After Axis Has Been Utterly Destroyed—Message From Premier Joseph Stalin

LONDON, Feb. 22 (CP)—Great Britain and Russia are agreed on broad principles of collaboration for peace as well as utter destruction of the Axis, Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden said in a speech commemorating the twenty-fifth anniversary of the founding of the Russian Army. Eden spoke before a great gathering in Royal Albert Hall.

DESTROYER IDENTIFIED

U.S.S. DeHaven Was Sunk in Battle of Solomon Islands

WASHINGTON, D.C., Feb. 22 — The Department of the Navy yesterday announced that the American destroyer sunk in the January 29-February 4 battle of the Solomon Islands had been identified as the 2100-ton DeHaven, one of the newest American destroyer types. She was sunk by Japanese dive-bombers.

A letter from Premier Stalin expressed confidence that "joint offensive operations" to smash the common enemy would soon be possible between the armed forces of the two countries. It was read to the meeting.

Other ministers spoke in observance of the day at various centres in the country. Deputy Prime Minister Clement Atlee was at Cardiff, Home Secretary Herbert Morrison at Brighton, Sir Stafford Cripps at Sheffield and Rt. Hon. Oliver Lyttleton at Newcastle.

NEGLIGENCE IS CHARGED

This is Finding of Coroner's Jury In Dawson Creek Explosion

DAWSON CREEK, Feb. 22 — A coroner's jury decided that the explosion which caused the death of five persons and brought injury to 150 others as well as heavy property damage on February 13 was "directly attributable to gross negligence." The jury did not say what persons were negligent.

MEDICAL OFFICERS CONVICTED

Penalties Meted Out by Military Court-martial in Quebec

QUEBEC, Feb. 22 — Eight of nine Army medical officers and men have been found guilty in court-martial of irregularities in medical examinations of recruits.

All were members of No. 5 Company of the Royal Canadian Army Medical Corps except one private.

Lieut. Pierre Gauthier, Bloc Canadian Populaire, M.P. for Port Neuf, was completely exonerated.

Capt. G. A. Grondin, aged 43, convicted of accepting various sums of money, was dismissed from the service.

Major Ludovic Lavalee, 52, and Major Celestin, 34, were both convicted of having accepted sums of money in connection with the examinations. Lavalee was sentenced to be severely reprimanded and was given rank penalty which will result in his majority being dated January 8 instead of a year earlier. Guimont was sentenced to a severe reprimand. Capt. Yves Gadbois, 26, was sentenced to be reprimanded for accepting \$20 while performing military duties.

Private Leopold Houde, 35, was given nine months' detention for having accepted sums of money in performance of duties and having distributed money among the medical personnel.

Private Georges Fortin, 24; and Louis Hamel, 25, were convicted of accepting money in performance of duties and given ninety days' detention.

Private Paul Cloutier, 19, was given 45 days detention for having accepted bribes.

Death Toll Of Crash-Fire Is Now Up To 34

SEATTLE, Feb. 22—The death list as a result of the crash and fire when an army bomber hit the Frye parking house here last week has risen to thirty-four. Three more bodies were recovered from the ruins yesterday and two persons are still missing. Eleven of the dead were in the plane, one was a fireman and the others plant workers.

VEGETABLES IN SEASON

They Are Feature of Retail Market At Present Time

New seasonal vegetables have been making their appearance in the local retail market recently, most of them coming from California. They provide refreshment in the stores which are becoming more and more limited in their stocks owing to wartime shortages and restrictions. Speaking generally, there is little change in market prices. Egg prices are beginning to soften.

MERCHANT'S HARBOR

The name of the port of Copenhagen, Denmark, means "Merchant's Harbor."

MARSHFIELD, Oregon, Feb. 22 — A United States Navy minesweeper capsized in heavy seas off Coos Bay Saturday with loss of five dead and thirteen missing, it was announced today.

Standard of Entertainment For Troops Here Well Maintained

These troop concert parties, especially the ones that come up from the south under the management of Mrs. Yvonne Firkins, maintain the same high standard of excellence. The present one, currently called 'Sunny Side Up,' is well balanced and has variety. It started off at the Capitol Theatre last night with Capt. MacDonald, Auxiliary Services officer for this division, introducing Mrs. MacLean who is in charge of the party in place of Mrs. Firkins this time. Mrs. MacLean then introduced Queenie Thomson, the very able accompanist to the troupe. This set the style of one artist announcing the next artist which cleverly dispensed with a master of ceremonies.

The Brassington duo, a very talented brother and sister act, opened the program with a military taps number. They are versatile and their dancing embraces every type—ballroom, adagio, tap and jive. Being youthful the jive and jitterbug numbers were best suited to them and they really put it over. So much so that when the brother, perspiring freely, came to announce one of the numbers he wiped his brow and had the audience laughing with his nonchalant remark: "Jitterbug Juice, folks, that's all."

May Judge, who has a surprisingly strong lyric soprano voice for one so fair and fragile in appearance, kept the boys pleasurably entertained with "Ciribiribin," "My Hero" from "The Chocolate Soldier," "Rose Marie" and a pretty interpretation of "Alice Blue Gown" in which the Brassington duo waltzed in the background as an accompanist to the song.

Dick Benb, who has been here before and has made many friends, played number after number—he is most generous with his encores—on his marimba to a delighted audience. Many of his numbers were medleys of popular tunes, as well as "I Had the Craziest Dream," "For Me and My Gal" and a very lovely rendition of the ever favorite "Believe Me If All Those Endearing Young Charms." He is a real artist. Then came two of the cutest little tricks who called themselves "The Handhill Lariats" and specialized in cowboy songs while accompanying themselves on the ukulele and guitar. Half of their charm, and I doubt if they know it, is in the wholesome impression they give of en-

joying themselves as much as the audience. They are natural, fresh and very sweet and know how to put over first class entertainment.

Juliette—who could forget Juliette—"the Oomph Girl," or as I heard some girls call her the "oo-oomph" girls" was a hit from the minute she stepped on the stage. A popular cabaret artist in the south, she possesses that gift of the born artist—personality. She puts over a song just the way the composer must of dreamed of it being put over and with such an effortless manner. She is reminiscent of Marie Lloyd, Sophie Tucker and company and, in spite of her artistry, does not take herself too seriously. She is a rollicking sort of a girl and was a tonic for the boys. She sang "This is the Army, Mr. Jones," "I Said 'No'" and "Mr. Five By Five."

Dick Sharp, the "rootin' ropin' cowhand," sang, played the guitar and did some breath-taking rope tricks. For a long time this sun-tanned, blue-eyed lad did the rounds of Major Bowes circuit as one of the headliners and after seeing his act it can be seen why. The program finished with the company finale done in the Russian manner and dedicated to the Russia Allies.

Fighting Veteran Back to Sea-Life

73-Year-Old Former Boxer Now Boatswain in Merchant Marine

WINNIPEG, Feb. 22 — Mike Sullivan, 73-year-old Irishman, veteran of three wars and former world champion middleweight boxer, is still scrapping. 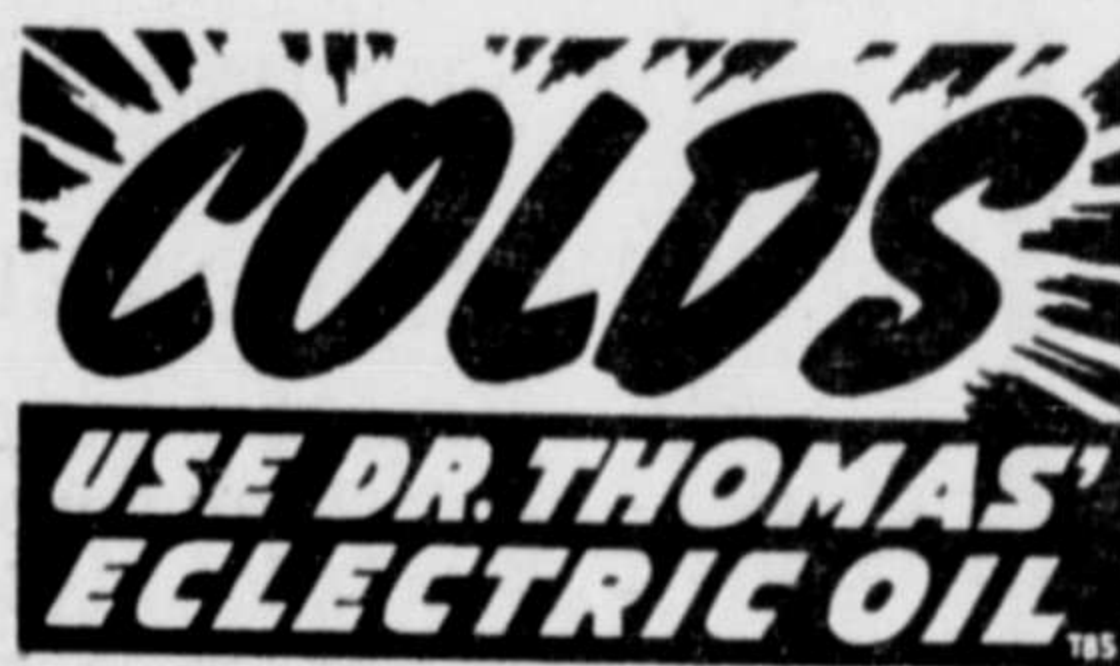
