Any person drawing water from any connection in the city between 4:30 p.m. Saturday, April 17th, and 8:30 a.m., Sunday, April 18th, will be committing a serious offence against the safety of the whole community. There will be water in the mains but it is absolutely essential to retain this for fire protection. A sufficient reserve of water to carry over this period must be drawn off in containers and if this instruction is not honestly carried out by everybody, the period of shut-off, due to alterations in the water system, may have to be extended at least twelve hours.

# British-Canadian Air Forces Carry Out Mighty Raids

Pilsen, Great CzechoSlovakian Armament Works, Mannheim and Ludwigshafen are Targets for Friday Night

LONDON, April 17 (CP)-More than six hundred bombers roared out in the moonlight last night to strike heavily at Mannheim, Ludwigshafen and Pilsen, the latter in German-occupied CzechoSlovakia and the home of the Skoda munition works, in what the Ministry called the "biggest night operation this year." Fiftyfive planes are missing. A large number of aircraft from the Canadian bomber group took part and ten of the missing bombers are Canadian. A Royal Canadian Air Force communique said that four were lost in the raid on the Skoda works at Pilsen and six in the attack on the armament works at Mannheim-Lubdwigshafen.

Squadrons led by Wing Commanders M. M. Fleming of Ottawa and Tiny Ferris of Edmonton blasted Pilsen with block-busters and incendiaries and airmen said the whole Skoda factory area appeared to be a mass of smoke with the red glow of fires and flashes of high explosives lighting the scene.



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
