Sandwich Secrets

Sandwiches should be good eating, and good health builders

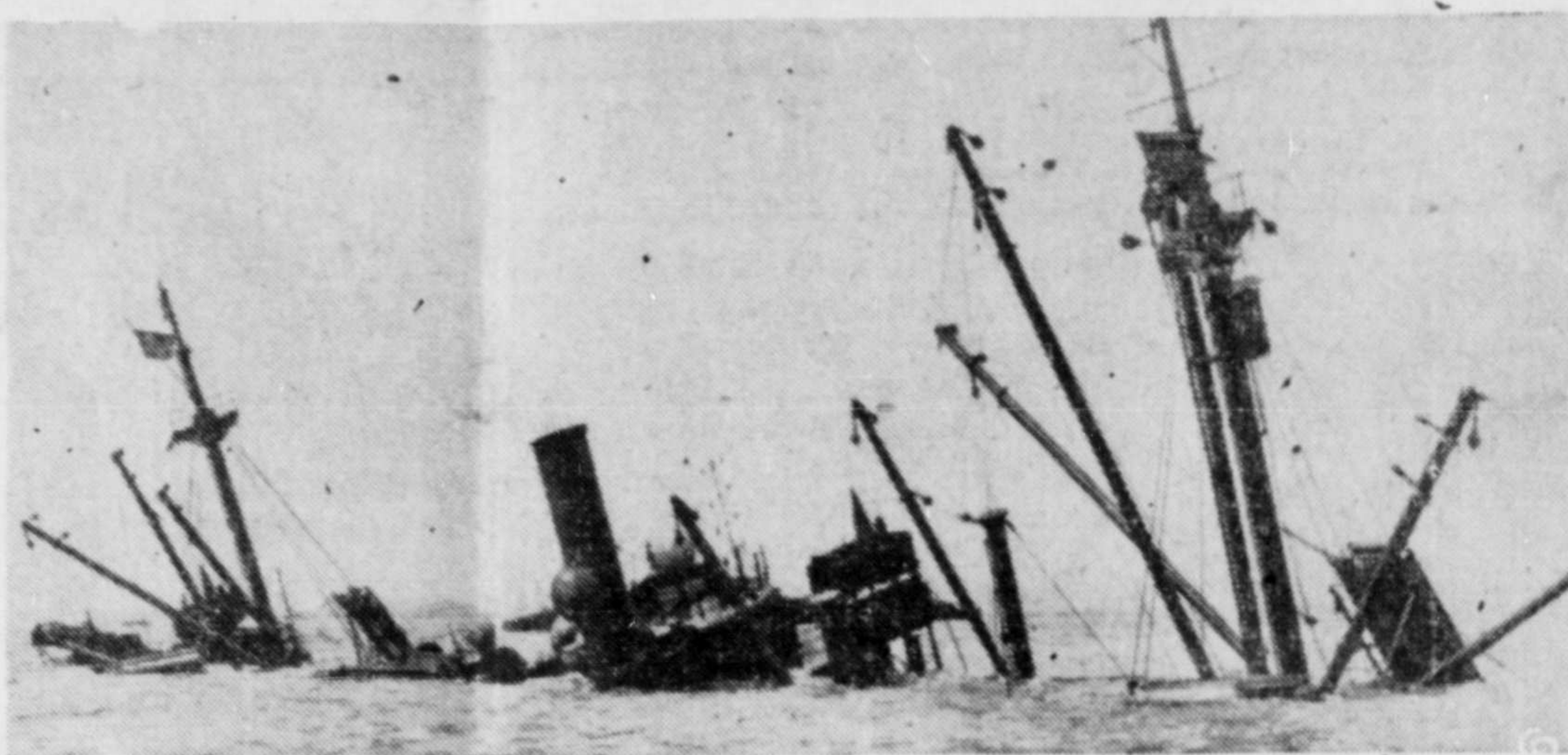

The superstructure shows above water after a large merchant vessel loaded with explosives was sunk off Robins reef light, in upper New York bay. duties. Although the responsibilities of policing and governing were under two different departments of the federal government, he did both jobs creditably.

From 1898 to 1908 Major Wood held his post in the Yukon, achieving a promotion to Assistant Commissioner. From there he was transferred to headquarters in Regina. In 1914 he took a leave of absence and returned to the southern state where he was born.

Years ago Commissioner Wood was in charge of the Mounties in Prince Rupert.
