# British Air Raids Are More Intense

### PASSING OF LEADER IN CITY LIFE

John Dybhavn, Prominent In Many Ways Since Early Days, Succumbs Suddenly to Heart Trouble.

John Dybhavn died suddenly at 11 o'clock Saturday night at his residence on Atlin Avenue, Westview, and Prince Rupert, in his passing, lost one of its most prominent and highly esteemed pioneer citizens. He was one of the outstanding leaders in the public, business, industrial and fraternal life of the city. He demise comes as a great shock to the entire commun-

Mr. Dybhavn had had heart trouble for some time and a couple of weeks ago had an attack of influenza. This had visibly weakend him but he had been able to return to his office and a week ago essayed to leave on a business trip at Vancouver, returning home on Wedne day morning. Since then he had kept to bed at his home, anticipating that the rest would soon bring him around again, On Saturday afternoon he took a weak turn and gradually became worse although his passing at the end was very sudden.

Mr. Dybhavn was born at Borgund, Norway, sixty-four years ago. He attended business college and took military training in Norway. After having been engaged in the mercantile business in Seattle for eight years, he came to Prince Rupert in 1908 as a contractor on railway construction. Then he started in the real estate in association with Olof Hanson M. P. with the opening up of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway, he established the Royal Fish Co. business and later started the Massett Canners venture on the Queen Charlotte Is-

Mr. Dybhavn developed personally as Prince Rupert progressed. In 1911 he pecame a British subject and the following year was elected an alderman. For upwards ! of twenty-five years he served as Norwegian vice-consul here and, as such, did much to assist many of his countrymen who came here to reside and become Canadian subjects. He was a friend and trusted adviser to them all.

Becoming one of the leading figures in the fish business here, Mr. Dybhavn was for years a member of the Biological Board, later of the Fisheries Research Board of Canada. He was also a member of the local branch of the Canadian Fisheries Association.

He was a past president of the Prince Rupert Chamber of Commerce and Prince Rupert Rotary Club. He was active in the Masonic craft and was a member of Tyee Lodge, Kaien Chapter, Kincolith Preceptory and the Shrine Club, being particularly active in some of the branches of Masonry.

Deceased was also active in connection with St. Paul's Lutheran Church and was for years a leading member of the Prince Rupert Pioneer's Association.

Besides his widow, the former Miss Olga Fagerlie, Mr. Dybhavn is survived by one son, Lieut. George Dybhavn, Royal Canadian Artillery, at present at home on leave, and one daughter, Miss Alma Dybhavn. Brothers include Anton Dybhavn here and Carl and Tom Dybhavn, in Vancouver. There are also brothers and sisters in Norway. The bereaved will have the deep

sympathy of many friends. The funeral will take place Thursday afternoon from St. Paul's Lutheran Church under the auspices of Tyee Lodge A. F. & A. M.
