JAPANESE ARE DOOMED

ALLIED HEADQUARTERS IN SOUTHWEST PACIFIC-The bulk of the Japanese garrison, routed from the air and shipping base of Salamaua, New Guinea, has been destroyed, and small groups which escaped into the jungles facing certain annihilation, Allied headquarters announced today. With mopping up operations proceeding at Salamaua, Allied forces are crumbling the Japanese defences of Lae, eighteen miles north of eNw Guinea. Lae is under Allied artillery fire.

MOST BLOODY FIGHTING

LONDON-Most bloody fighting so far in the whole Mediterranean campaign continues around Salerno where the reinforced Fifth United States Army is battling strong German Forces. Heavy casualties are being suffered by both sides. The Germans are reported to have entered Vatican City in Rome.

RED OFFENSIVE CONTINUES MOSCOW-The great Russian offensive against the Germans continues without slackening and there is no slowing up in the advance of the Red Army principal objectives of which now appear to be Kiev and Novorossisk.

Both the major political parties for months had been getting their battle lines drawn for the contest. The C.C.F., still in the formation stage in the sland province, had not put up any candidates he-

Both the opposition groups were critical of the vay the election was called. Opposition Leader W. J. P. MacMillan, drawing attention to the time beween dissolution and voting day, declared the government was "trying for a snap verdict, allowing anly the time provided by law to discuss their unsavory record."

For the C.C.F., Provincial Secretary Douglas Mc-Farlane charged the election had been called at this time to "prevent the C.C.F. from getting a start." He declared the outcome of the Ontario general election—where the C.C.F. made big strides — had

precipitated this election.

Premier Jones, who took office only last May, retorted that it was usual for a new premier to seek 'a mandate and lay his policies before the people. Also, he declared, three by-elections would have to be held in any case, and these would cause "almost as much disturbance" as a general contest, which would have to be held early in 1944 anyway.
