We have been to a Communist meeting and heard canada cease to support this infrom Fergus McKean, released anti-Fascist, as patriotic dustry which is definitely not in those who die. and as sensible a war speech as anybody could wish for. harmony with social welfare in We think we are justified in saying this for Mr. McKean who not so many months ago was languishing in an internment camp where he was associated with German Nazis and Italian Fascists whose doctrines he came, as a result of the direct contact, to detest even further than he had before. He seemed to be quite sincere about what he was saying.

If what Mr. McKean said about Russia and the Soviet system is true we might well do with some of it. Soviet Russia, he declared, was not a dictatorship but the epitome of democracy. In Russia, he said, every one had to work and there was reward for individual service. There was no toleration for drones anywhere.

Mr. McKean also said that there was little to be gained by talking about changing the system while the war was to be won. Such discussions could only tend to disunite us at a time when there was need of the greatest measure of unity-capitalists, socialists, employees, workers all—in the great effort to win the war. First the war must be won. Then could come the setting up of the new system, the reconstruction in the planning of which there should be participation in proportion to the measure of effectiveness in winning the war.

It was sound wartime procedure that Mr. McKean propounded, a good deal sounder and more helpful than has been heard from certain other socialist groups which profess less radicalism than the Communists, groups which spend a lot of time and energy in political discussions which, to say the least of it, are not tending to unite us in our prime task of getting down to winning the war.




