Watchwords Should Be Decentralization, Co-operation, Production and Wide Trade.

HAMILTON, December 11 (P) Premier John Bracken, in an address Friday night on the first anniversary of his election as Irag. Progressive Conservative national leader, said government in Canada must be decentralized to bring it more directly under control of the people.

Mr. Bracken said that Canada needs rational reforms and suggested four watchwords for the future - decentralization not centralization, co-operation and not state dictatorship, expanding production and not scarcity and widening areas of trade, not restrictive practices.

Mr. Bracken warned against party which offered blandishments of security and prosperity without personal effort, a party which would destroy the good with the bad. State Socialism could not brook opposition and would lead to dictatorship.

Canada, the leader said, had three political alternatives piecemeal policy leading to reaction, socialism or a constitutional system of rational reform.

Continued regimentation or chaos were the alternatives to which his party had to offer, declared Mr. Bracken.


