NUCKS ENHANCE THEIR PRESTIGE AS FIGHTERS

Successful Planning and Training in England Resulted in Notable Successes in Sicily and Italy.

LONDON, Dec. 11 (CP) — The year 1943 saw the Allied battle line and campaign from summer winter along dust-choked roads of Sicily and Italy. It has been a year of triumph for the 1st Canadian Infantry Division.

The 1st Canadian Army Brigade—two formations—sailed in the tremendous armada which struck Italy in the dawn hours of July 10.

The Canadians, joining the Army and making a detour to the road to Berlin by first the road to Rome, proved their fighting ability beyond question in bitter battle in Sicily and up the spine of Italy. They proved, too, in the mountains that they had Spartan endurance and could meet the fiercest of heart-breaking campaigns.

The performance of these troops won the confidence and admiration of the central Mediterranean Americans who know that the Allied formations which they met in the line for the first time after a long period of training in the central Mediterranean theatre. Generals Dwight D. Eisenhower, Sir Harold Alexander and Sir Bernard Montgomery all had encouraging words for the Canadians. They liked them for the way they carried out their battle.

Had Good Training
Lt.-Gen. A.G.L. McNoughlin's performance of his Canadian formations provided abundant evidence that the training in England had been carefully directed and carried out with careful planning, shrewd leadership and good leadership.

The Sicilian campaign gave a Canadian major-general, Guy Simonds, his big opportunity and the commander of the "Red Patch" division emerged as one of the outstanding leaders of the campaign. The Canadian formations, through intensive training and preparations for the Sicilian campaign during the spring, were ready for the final phase of the campaign in June. The division sailed with all its equipment.

Massed Off Sicily
Meanwhile an American infantry division, the 45th, sailed from New York for this long-range combined operation and British and American divisions were massing on the North African shore. Several submarine attacks were the only thing that marred the voyage of the Canadians. On July 8-9 the various contingents met in the Tunis-Malta

On Sunday last Right Rev. G. A. Rix, D.D., Bishop of Caledonia, assisted by Rev. B. Shearman, conducted the morning service at Metlakatla.

Following the service, the congregation adjourned to the Indian Day School. A beautifully framed picture of their Majesties King George VI and Queen Elizabeth had been received from His Excellency, the Governor-General, the Earl of Athlone, and Princess Alice, in memory of their visit to the Reserve on September 9, when they were touring British Columbia.

The school was filled with parents and children. Guests were Mr. and Mrs. Gillett, Lieutenant Laird R.C.N., and Mrs. B. Shearman. "O Canada" was sung. Then the Bishop gave an interesting address on the Royal Family and called upon Mrs. B. Shearman to unveil the picture, which was greatly admired. Singing of the National Anthem and Blessing by the Bishop completed the ceremony.

JUVENILES IN THEFTS

Nine Boys From 14 to 17 Years Of Age Under Arrest.

Nine juveniles ranging in age from 14 to 17 years old are under arrest in connection with a series of recent housebreakings, shop breakings, thefts and purse snatchings.

Five of the boys are held in connection with a number of acts in the Cow Bay area, four of them being picked up by the police at Kamloops and Hazelton and one in Prince Rupert. The other four, taken into custody here, are held for more recent violations.

Included in the charges against them are the breaking into the residences of M. Gray, Sixth Avenue, R. M. Winslow, Fourth Avenue, James Park, Ambrose Avenue, the Chandler Photograph studio, the Borden Street school, and ransacking the car of John Garofani. Some of them are alleged also to have committed a purse snatching.

It is stated that most of the goods and money taken were found in the possession of some of the boys and recovered by the police. They were said to include bicycles, a camera, liquor, watches, rings and other articles.

Investigating the cases were police constables Sam Ferguson and G. Brotherton, acting under Staff Sergeant F. W. Gallagher.

FOLLOW UP HEAVY RAIDS

Mosquito Planes Spatter Germany Following Heavy Attack by Big Bombers on Bulgaria.

LONDON, Dec. 11 — In a convincing demonstration of air superiority, Royal Air Force Mosquitoes raided northwest Germany last night on the heels of yesterday's blow at Sofia in Bulgaria by heavy bombers in the Mediterranean theatre. Both Allied raids were carried out without a single loss.

Today American heavy bombers attacked targets in northwest Germany.

NATIONAL LEADER ON BULLETINS

Watchwords Should Be Decentralization, Co-operation, Production and Wide Trade.

HAMILTON, December 11 — Premier John Bracken, in an address Friday night on the first anniversary of his election as Progressive Conservative national leader, said government in Canada must be decentralized to bring it more directly under control of the people.

Mr. Bracken said that Canada needs rational reforms and suggested four watchwords for the future — decentralization not centralization, co-operation and not state dictatorship, expanding production and not scarcity and widening areas of trade, not restrictive practices.

Mr. Bracken warned against a party which offered blandishments of security and prosperity without personal effort, a party which would destroy the good with the bad. State Socialism could not brook opposition and would lead to dictatorship.

Canada, the leader said, had three political alternatives — a piecemeal policy leading to reaction, socialism or a constitutional system of rational reform.

Continued regimentation or chaos were the alternatives to which his party had to offer, declared Mr. Bracken.

PUSH NEAR KRIVOI ROG

LONDON, Dec. 11 — Soviet troops were hammering their way across the south Russian steppes today toward Krivoi Rog and Kirovograd, the two last important German strongholds in the Dnieper Bend.

Moscow admitted serious reverses, however, in the Kiev bulge 200 miles to the northwest, where German armored forces had driven the Russian forces back to the area south of Malin, only 55 miles west of Kiev.

New Recreation Hall Is Opened

Described by Group Captain Foss as "one of the first I've seen," a new recreation hall at Group Headquarters, Royal Canadian Air Force, was opened with a dance Thursday night.

Under the leadership of Bandsman George Ariss, the Royal Canadian Navy dance band provided excellent music for the occasion. The fine voice of Prob. Bandsman George Korlett was heard in a number of pieces.

High-ranking officers of the services were in attendance.

SOFIA IS BLASTED

Allied Planes Blast Capital of Bulgaria, Railway Yards Being Target.

BERNE, Switzerland, December 11 (Canadian Press) — Several waves of Allied planes blasted Sofia, Bulgarian capital, for one hour and forty-five minutes Friday afternoon, causing great destruction and killing many persons, the Sofia radio said. The target was a railway yard one mile away from the Parliament buildings where a session was disturbed.

LONDON—King George has recovered from his attack of influenza and was able to preside over a session of Privy Council yesterday.

ROOSEVELT IN ITALY

LONDON — Berlin reports that President Franklin D. Roosevelt is on a visit to the front in Italy. The President is known to have been in Carthage, North Africa, conferring with General Eisenhower.

Allied Italian Armies Are Pushing Northward Towards Roman Capital

ALGIERS, Dec. 11 (CP) — The Germans are in retreat from end to end of the Italian front. British Eighth Army troops, spearheaded by Canadians, slugging through bitter German counter-blows, have seized the Adriatic coastal road town of San Leonardo, four miles southwest of Ortona, and another bridgehead has been flung over the Moro River four and a half miles farther inland in a night attack, it was learned today. Accompanying the Eighth Army advance in eastern Italy, Fifth Army forces punched a mile ahead west of Iginano toward the Nazi stronghold of Cassino. Allied headquarters said a battle was raging for San Pietro, seven miles southeast of Cassino.

MASTER OF PR. RUPERT

Capt. Ernest Caldwell Given Command of C.N.R. Vessel.

After a marine career of 29 years, which he commenced as a seaman in British Columbia coastal service, Captain Ernest B. Caldwell, of Vancouver, has been given command of the Canadian National steamer Prince Rupert on which he has recently served as first officer. His promotion comes through the retirement of Captain D. W. Graham, * master of Prince

George who has joined the government's navigation school at Vancouver.

Captain N. MacLean, commodore of the C.N.S.S. line (Pacific), who has been commanding Prince Rupert, is now master of S.S. Prince George.

Captain E. B. Caldwell is well known in marine circles and has seen service all over the world. He joined the Canadian National Steamships as quartermaster of Prince Charles in January, 1925, became third officer in May, 1926, and subsequently served on various Canadian National ships as second and first officer. He has held his master's certificate since February, 1935.

Previous to joining the Canadian National, he was on Canadian Government Merchant Marine vessels plying between British Columbia and California. From 1916 to 1920 he was in England with the Admiralty Transport Service and later on American ships sailing out of Philadelphia in Atlantic Coast Service.

W. T. Moodie, general superintendent of Canadian National Railways for British Columbia with headquarters in Vancouver, left this morning via Jasper on his return south after a brief visit here in the course of a trip over the line on official duties.

Deceased, who followed the occupation of fisherman, was born at Massett, Queen Charlotte Islands. He was a native. Surviving are his wife and one child.

The funeral will take place tomorrow afternoon from the Grenville Court chapel, the Rev. E. W. Scott officiating.

nadians struck rapidly to Potenza, east of Salerno to relieve the 5th Army. British troops came up from Calabria too. Other British formations landed and pressed north from Taranto. Salerno Bay was saved and the 5th began its own advance to capture Naples.

The Canadians' part in this southern Italian campaign was considerable. They didn't fight any large actions but their skillful manoeuvre and rapid progress was a major consideration in the success of the operations in the south.

As the two armies slowly attacked north towards Rome, the Canadians remained in the central sector of the line, advancing through some of the worst terrain in Italy. They had become experienced frontline soldiers in six months' fighting.

Groups of Canadian officers and non-commissioned officers went out from England to serve attachments with the division and the task brigade for experience. Others from the Mediterranean force returned to Eng-

land to use their battle experience there.

Gained Experience

Prelude to Sicily and Italy for several hundred officers and non-commissioned officers was Tunisia. Last winter groups went to North Africa to serve with the 1st British Army and many saw hard fighting with the 78th Infantry division and the 6th Armored Division which were in the line then. They gained valuable battle background.

During 1943 the major portion of the 1st Canadian Army remained in England, continuing its training, working out advanced military ideas and going through final adjustments before it campaigned. Army headquarters and the Second Corps headquarters were built up. The army shared in the big manoeuvres in the spring and during the summer infantry and armored divisions speed up advanced training. One infantry division concentrated on combined operations and coastal assault.

A number of staff changes were made during the year. When Simonds took over the 1st Division, Maj.-Gen. E. L. M. Burns was promoted from brigadier to command another infantry division. In August General McNaughton visited the Canadians in Sicily.
