Any protest against the direct bombing of Rome by the Allies may well be accepted as a protest also against the use of Rome as a centre for the prosecution of war against the Allies. Probably the Pope had that very thing in mind when he referred to "contending parties." Possibly the Pope's protest would be a more specific thing if the circumstances were different.

The position of the Pope is no doubt a difficult one but the war is full of difficult positions for many people.

Whether or not he may be following the course that all approve of, there is no reason to believe that His Holiness is not devoutly anxious for a peace that would be satisfactory to all people and lasting for the world.
