IL DUCE UNDER ARREST AND MARTIAL LAW DECLARED AS MARSHAL BADOGLIO Premier King RETURNS FROM RETIREMENT TO BE-COME PREMIER AND KING TAKES OVER + On Mussolini ARMY.

LONDON, July 26 (CP)—Benito Mussolini has been dismissed as Prime Minister of Italy and is reported to be under arrest after failing to escape to Germany. King Victor Emmanuel has taken over command of Italian forces. The former Italian chief of staff, Marshal Pietro Badoglio, has been named Premier of Italy to succeed Mussolini. The country has been placed under martial law. The atmosphere is tense with expectation of forthcoming BULGARIA events which may be as sensational and dramatic as the sudden overthrow of Mussolini coming at the same time as the Axis forces are being routed MAY QUIT in the Sicilian campaign.

It was last night that the announcement was made in Rome that Dictator Mussolini had resigned as Premier and Victor Emmanuel, in connection with what was considered a possible bid for peace with the onrushing Allies, had assumed command of the Italian forces for "a stand against those who have wounded the sacred soil of Sicily.

Marshal Badoglio, former chief-of-staff and never an admirer of Fascism, who was dismissed by Mussolini in 1940, came out of retirement to accept the King's appointment as Premier.

In a proclamation to the Italian people Badog- YANKS HIT lio said "the war continues."

The dramatic turn in Italy's fortunes is seen in London as a shattering blow to Germany and Japan, Mussolini's Axis partners.

Hours after the Rome radio made the announcement, Berlin radio, in its first comment, said Mussolini's retirement was because of health reasons.

There was no immediate indication as to what would become of Il Duce as he sank back into the shadows after twenty-one years of dictatorship in which he tried vainly to recreate the ancient glories of Rome on a Fascist basis and made mili-

tary alliances with Germany and Japan. Mussolini was reported captive of the new Italian government today following the crash of his dictatorship. A Reuters News Agency dispatch from Sweden said Mussolini was captured while trying to escape from Italy to Germany. There was no immediate confirmation of this but other dispatches from Switzerland said it was reported other leaders and cabinet members also were under arrest.

Martial law was declared throughout Italy as the new regime took over. A strict curfew has been imposed, theatres closed and all public gatherings banned.

Dispatches from Switzerland said the Italian people were, apparently, accepting developments with comparative calm.

Previously there had been hints of disorder, hints contained in a proclamation by the new Premier Badoglio ordering demonstrations to be put down with an iron hand by the military.

The conviction grows in London that Italy is making preliminary moves toward peace.

Widespread repercussions are expected to result in Germany and Nazi satellite nations.


