BATTLE OF DODOCANESE

ANKARA—Belief that British forces have occupied all twelve islands of the Dodocanese group with the exception of Rhodes grew today amid conflicting reports of fighting in progress on the key island of Kos. Travelers reaching Instanbul from the Turkish coast reported German bombers have been attacking all islands except Rhodes repeatedly in recent days. Reports indicate that the British had forged a ring around Rhodes with the occupation of the other islands and were preparing for an assault on Rhodes when the German parachutists landed on Kos. 


