## Most Terrific Blow

CANADIAN PLANES PAID IMPORTANT PART IN RAID WHICH LEFT CITY FIERY AND EXPLODING RUIN - TWENTY-SIX MACH-INES LOST.

LONDON, Nov. 23 (CP)-One thousand British and Canadian planes made Berlin a fiery mass of exploding ruin Monday night in the greatest air attack in all history, setting new fires in the heart of the German capital which still burned from the massive assault last Thursday.

"Berlin can never recover, from this blow," a Stockholm newspaper declared in commenting on dispatches from its correspondent.

Probably more than 2,300 tons of bombs fell on Berlin last night, exceeding the record dropped on Hamburg in the offensive which knocked that port out of the war.

The Air Ministry reported that the attack was highly effective.

Royal Canadian Air Force headquarters said it was the greatest effort yet made by the Canadian bomber group which sent out scores of Lancasters and Halifaxes.

The cost was twenty-six bombers, four of them Canadian.
