Erected on Conrad Street by Wartime Housing

Plans for a new six-room

school building to be erected on Conrad Street by Wartime Housing Limited have reached the city and were viewed by the board of school trustees at last night's meeting. Preparations are being made by the contractors, Smith Bros. and Wilson, for the erection of the building which, it is emphasized, will be essentially of temporary nature

workers. The building will be of frame construction, one storey and partial basement with asphalt chingle roof. Outside dimensions will be 151 by 58 feet. Classwill be 24 by 311/2 feet with ceiling height of twelve feet. There will be hot water heating but no provision is made for basement recreational facilities. There will be an entrance foyer at one corner with hall running lengthwise and opening into three classroom

on either side. To make way for the school it has been necessary to move one of the wartime houses to another site this work being present in progress.

UNITED NATIONS SEAL

Editor, Daily News:

Symbolizing the unity of purpose which prevails among the United Nations, this year's Christmas seal, the little emblem with its promise of ultimate victory in the battle against tuberculosis, will shortly appear on thousands of letters sent out and received by British Columbians in common with other folk in many lands.

Five great countries-Britain. the United States, Canada, Mexico and Brazil—are using the same seal. Canada has the added distinction of supplying the seals not only for herself but for Great Britain and two of her dependenciles — Jamaica and British Guiana — countries in which wartime restrictions on paper have made printing their own seals impractical.

Designed by Andre Duga, in- school committee. ternationally known artist and illustrator, the 1943 Christmas seal depicts a small girl looking out of a window and seeing Santa Claus driving across the sky. In describing how the design came to him, Mr. Dugo says:

"I wanted to show the spirit of Christmas and to represent at the same time the wonderful work of the tuberculosis associations. So I decided to paint a happy, healthy child in a world where it is possible for children to believe in goodness and the spirit of Christmas, in Santa Claus, in miracles and in fairies -in short, an ideal which, to me, is one way of representing the aim of the Tuberculosis Associations to rid the world of one dread enemy of health, happiness and security."

In Canada, tuberculosis takes 6,000 lives annually, more than half of these among young people between 15 and 45. More than 50,000 persons are now suffering with tuberculosis.

Carrying forward the fight against the disease in British Columbia, the B.C. Tuberculosis Society is constantly extending its services along the three-fold front of education, preventive measures and treatment.

This year, in addition to its many-sided program of instruction and tests in schools throughout the province and the support of district public health services, it is undertaking mass

of extending them to every resident of British Columbia.




