Red Cross News

Seems Like Miracle

Two things make the life of a prisoner of war endurable—"hope of escape, and Red Cross parcels," said Major General Carton de Wiart, V.C., who was released from an Italian camp to accompany a peace emissary to the Allied Nations. "Although the Italians did their best," he said, "the food was scarce. If it had not been for the Red Cross we should have been extremely hungry. Since my return it has shocked me that some people in this country do not fully realize the work the Red Cross has done and is doing. The whole thing seems a miracle to me."

Rooms Open Evenings

In order to meet the increasing need of more and more Red Cross hospital supplies and comforts as the war fronts expand, Mrs. Wallace Campbell, Toronto, chairman of the National Women's War Work Committee suggests that Red Cross work rooms might be open evenings. "Make no mistake about it," writes Mrs. Campbell to Provincial Red Cross Headquarters. "With the constant drain on reserve supplies, there could arise a crisis, when there would be too little and too late, unless women workers rally round and knit and sew as they have never done before."

Boxes of Pot Pourri

A Summerland Red Cross worker has collected flower petals from her beautiful garden this summer, dried them and parcelled them in small attractive packages with bits of blue and pink darkspur on the top. A card inscribed: "Pot pourri from an Okanagan garden" is in each box. "This has netted a tidy sum for the Red Cross, as well as advertised the beauty of the Okanagan Valley," writes the branch secretary, Mrs. A. W. Vanderburgh.

UNITED NATIONS SEAL

Editor, Daily News:
Symbolizing the unity of purpose which prevails among the United Nations, this year's Christmas seal, the little emblem with its promise of ultimate victory in the battle against tuberculosis, will shortly appear on thousands of letters sent out and received by British Columbians in common with other folk in many lands.

Five great countries—Britain, the United States, Canada, Mexico and Brazil—are using the same seal. Canada has the added distinction of supplying the seals not only for herself but for Great Britain and two of her dependencies—Jamaica and British Guiana—countries in which wartime restrictions on paper have made printing their own seals impractical.

Designed by Andre Duga, internationally known artist and illustrator, the 1943 Christmas seal depicts a small girl looking out of a window and seeing Santa Claus driving across the sky. In describing how the design came to him, Mr. Duga says: "I wanted to show the spirit of Christmas and to represent at the same time the wonderful work of the tuberculosis associations. So I decided to paint a happy, healthy child in a world where it is possible for children to believe in goodness and the spirit of Christmas, in Santa Claus, in miracles and in fairies—in short, an ideal which, to me, is one way of representing the aim of the Tuberculosis Associations to rid the world of one dread enemy of health, happiness and security."

X-ray surveys of workers in war plants with the ultimate object of extending them to every resident of British Columbia.

Funds for these costly and vital projects are derived almost entirely from the sales of Christmas seals. Every Christmas seal put on a package, letter or card helps seal the doom of tuberculosis. By responding generously British Columbians may give themselves, their families, friends and country an invaluable gift—the gift of better health.

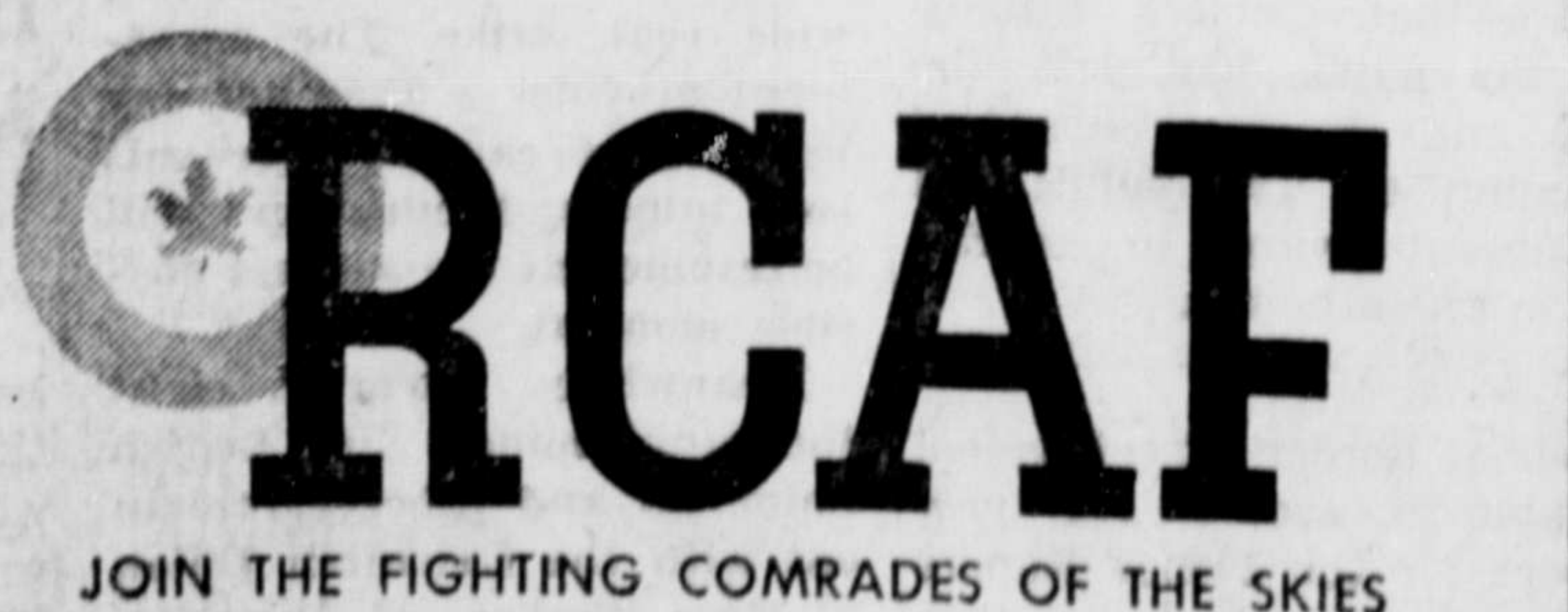
