# Tunisian Situation Now Confused

## EX-HEAD OF RAIL CO. DIES

Sir Edward Wentworth Beatty, for Many Years C.P.R. Chief, Passes Away

MONTREAL, March 24 (CP)—Sir Edward Beatty, aged 65, prominent figure in the Canadian business world who resigned a year ago as president of the Canadian Pacific Railway Co., died Tuesday night in hospital here. Death came suddenly in a last brief illness although Mr. Beatty had been in indifferent health for the past two years. He had been finally stricken a month ago.

Death thus ended one of the most brilliant careers in Canada's business world, a career which saw him work up through the legal department of the Canadian Pacific Railway to become executive chief of the world's greatest privately owned system in his fortieth year.

### Is Dead



SIR EDWARD BEATTY, K.C.

When Edward Wentworth Beatty, K.C., on October 10, 1918, accepted the office of president of the Canadian Pacific Railway Company with its vast empire of railroads, telegraphs, steamships and hotels, he turned away from an ambition to be a judge.

He was promoted from vice-president at the head of the law department of the company to be president and executive chief of the world's greatest privately-owned transportation system about a week before his forty-first birthday. In 1924 he became also chairman of the board of directors.

Beatty achieved distinction as a transportation executive. He became actively associated with some of the Dominion's most important banking utilities and mining enterprises. A bachelor, familiarly known but seldom addressed as Eddie, he played a prominent part in directing organizations dealing with youth training, higher education and social betterment.

He was at the helm of the C. P. R. from 1925 to 1929 when the company's earnings reached the highest peak in its history and also through the depression when railway revenues dropped precipitately and many lines on this continent were threatened with bankruptcy.

Contemporaneously with these periods the C. P. R.'s greatest rival, the Canadian National Railways, were developed to their greatest degree of competition by the late Sir Henry Thornton.

In the boom years the C. P. R. during the Beatty regime spent many millions in improving its enormous property, two of its vast projects being the construction of the Royal York Hotel in Toronto at a cost of \$17,000,000 and the launching in 1931 of the great 43,000-ton liner, the Empress of Britain, a war casualty nine years later. ## AIR BLOWS EXCHANGED

Allied Airmen Strike at Northern France and Germans Hit by Night

LONDON, March 24 (CP)—Trading punches with the Germans across the English Channel, Allied airmen struck again this morning at enemy targets in northern France as Nazi warplanes resumed hit and run raids on coastal districts of Britain. Heavy explosions west of Boulogne rocked houses in the Poleskone sea after formations of Allied planes streaked across the Channel to follow up night attacks by Royal Air Force fighters on railway communications in northwest Germany and occupied territory.

As Allied daylight raiders kept up the shuttle service across Dover Straits, the Germans used mist as a cover to cross the British coast and bomb a locality in the south-east.

## ORGANIZING OF WORKERS

Entertainment and Recreation Being Lined up for Dry Dock Men

At the opening of the Second Great War in 1939 Sir Edward was appointed representative in Canada of the British Ministry of Shipping. All ships in the Dominion of British registry were placed under his direction for service in the Empire war effort.

Through Good and Ill When offered the presidency of the C. P. R. in 1918 by Lord Shaughnessy, who was retiring, Beatty at first refused it. Shaughnessy is reported to have fixed him with a stern eye and to have exclaimed: "My God, Beatty, do you want to be a mere lawyer all your life?" Beatty smiled and, putting aside his hope of eventually going on the Bench, took the job — the highest paid post in Canada.

## RABAUL IS HEAVY HIT BY BOMBS

Heavy Blow is Dealt to Japanese Air Power in South Pacific

ALLIED HEADQUARTERS IN AUSTRALIA, March 24 (CP)—Allied bombers plastered the Japanese air base at Rabaul, New Britain, in a two-hour raid Tuesday, aiming fifty-four tons of bombs on three airdromes and two hundred and fifty enemy planes clustered on them to strike a heavy blow to Japanese air power, the Allied command announced. The heavy raid was launched after reconnaissance disclosed the largest concentration of Japanese aircraft ever observed in the sector. A substantial proportion of the grounded planes were destroyed or damaged.

A large quantity of incendiary and fragmentation bombs was dropped on Rabaul and, on the way back to their base, the Allied planes encountered a ten thousand ton Japanese transport ship which they hit and left afire.

## RUSSIAN FIGHTING

Chuguey and Belgorod Sectors Are Principal Sectors of Violent Conflict—30 Miles From Smolensk

### LATEST REPORT

MOSCOW, March 24 (CP)—The Red Army clung tenaciously today to positions on the northern Donets River, beating back every effort of the Germans to establish themselves on the eastern bank. On the central front Soviet troops pressed on toward Smolensk, capturing more settlements in their advance.

MOSCOW, March 24 (CP)—Chuguey and Belgorod sectors were the centres of most violent fighting in the Donets area as the Germans employed increasing numbers of infantry behind their mass tank and plane attacks but there was no serious denting of the Soviet line.

The Red Army is now within thirty miles of the important Nazi-held city of Smolensk on the central front and is continuing its drive through woods and swamps in spite of stiff resistance.

In the Bryansk sector a strong drive of the enemy has been repulsed and seven thousand Nazi officers and men are reported to have been killed.

Elsewhere along the long, muddy front there is bitter fighting.

## STOPPING AIR BASE

This is Object of Stopped up Air Offensive Against Kiska

WASHINGTON, March 24 (CP)—Stepped-up air offensive against the Japanese force on Kiska Island is designed primarily to prevent the enemy from accomplishing the task of building an air field on the Aleutian base. New blows in this offensive were reported Tuesday in an American Navy communique which said that Kiska was attacked Monday by two groups of bombers but, except for one large fire, results were not observed. Monday's raid was the twenty-first on the island.

The Japanese on Kiska are reported to be working day and night on the building of a land plane field on Kiska.

## May Be Attack By Japs

Major General Pearkes Makes Appeal for More Recruits For Reserve

EDMONTON, March 24 (CP)—Major General G. R. Pearkes, commander-in-chief of the Pacific Command, as he called for more recruits for Canada's Reserve Army, warned that there is more reason now than ever before for a Japanese raid on the Pacific Coast.

General Pearkes told a luncheon meeting that supplies to China and Russia are going by railroad, ship and air via Alaska and there is more reason for some desperate raid by the Japanese now than in the past.

In the event of an attack on the Pacific Coast, the general said that reserve units from all over Western Canada might be called.

Mr. Ilsley also urged members to refrain from making public statements which might prejudice the fourth Victory Loan campaign to be launched April 26.

## PORTS HIT BY BOMBS

Naples and Palermo Are Objectives Of Fighting Allied Aircraft

ALLIED HEADQUARTERS IN NORTH AFRICA, March 24 (CP)—Naples and Palermo, Italian ports, were again raided by Allied heavy bombers of which all returned from the raids. Hits were observed in railway depots and oil installations which were the principal objectives.

## Air Traffic Is Increased

Mail, Passengers and Express All Far Ahead of Last Year on TransCanada

WINNIPEG, March 24—Air mail carried by TransCanada Air Lines in February more than doubled the amount in the corresponding month a year ago and air express increased more than three times, according to figures released by O. T. Lawson, vice-president. The number of passengers grew from 5,765 to 9,462 an increase of 3,697. Mail for the month totalled 257,336 pounds, an increase over February 1942 of 136,771 pounds.

Express amounted to 47,834 pounds as compared with 14,044, an increase of 33,790 pounds.

## HIT NAZI SHIPPING

British Light Coastal Forces Are Continuing Their Assaults

LONDON, March 24 (CP)—British light coastal forces, continuing assaults on enemy shipping along the continental coasts, seriously damaged at least one escort vessel and hit two others by gunfire yesterday off Terschelling, Netherlands, the Admiralty announced.

## NAZIS ARE ENCIRCLED

Allied Forces, Flanking Mareth Line, Overwhelm Axis Tanks and Artillery

NOT SO GOOD LONDON, March 24 (CP)—Prime Minister Winston Churchill told the House of Commons today that the Eighth Army had lost the most of its bridgehead through the Mareth Line as a result of counter-attacks of Marshal Erwin Rommel and that the Axis defence lines in that sector were largely restored.

ALLIED HEADQUARTERS IN NORTH AFRICA, March 24 (CP)—Except for a twenty-mile gap, Allied forces are reported to have surrounded the Mareth Line, threatening to trap Marshal Erwin Rommel's fleeing troops. The British Eighth Army was reported last night to be rushing through the line at some points, having made a two-mile breach. The Eighth Army move in from the south with American and French forces striking toward the coast from two directions. The line has been flanked at both ends. The Americans have captured Maktasi on their way to the sea.

Allied forces, which have swung in a sweeping movement around the southwestern flank of the Mareth Line, faced and overcame strong German concentration of tanks and artillery at El Hamma, twenty miles west of Gaves. Allied air forces smashed fiercely at this concentration, hitting at least thirty-two enemy tanks and destroying at least nine.

Concerted counter-smashes by Axis infantry and armored forces confused the situation today where units of the British Eighth Army were rammed into the Mareth Line. In extremely hard fighting, British troops, who had driven a bridgehead through the Mareth Line in a frontal assault near the coast, succeeded in repulsing all efforts of the Germans to dislodge them from the area of Mareth village, an Allied headquarters communique said.

East of El Guefar, where American troops were within an hour's drive of the sea, front dispatches said that the Americans, from positions in hills on either side of a narrow pass, poured artillery fire into a force of some one hundred German tanks, destroying some ten to thirty of them.

## Attended Funeral Of Dr. Eggert In Vancouver Lately

C. H. Orme returned to the city this morning from Vancouver where he attended the funeral of the late Dr. C. A. Eggert, pioneer physician and surgeon of this city. Dr. Eggert succumbed very suddenly recently to a heart attack. He had been in apparently good health and his death was quite unexpected.

The funeral was attended by many former Prince Rupert residents now living in Vancouver and some of them acted as pallbearers.

## Assistance To Fisheries Has Interested Him

Questions in regard to financial assistance given by the government to the fishing industry have been asked in Parliament by Olof Hanson, M.P. for Skeena. He asks what was the total financial assistance by way of statute, bonus or otherwise to the fishing industry, including shellfish, on the Atlantic coast, on the Pacific coast and inland fisheries.

### Sir Edward Wentworth Beatty . . .

Railway history has many chapters of personal romance, but it has few parallels to the career of Sir Edward W. Beatty, now dead, who at the age of forty-one became the head of one of the greatest transportation systems. Even in this continent of opportunity, his advancement had been sensational. Mr. Beatty was the first Canadian-born president of the Canadian Pacific Railway.

Edward Wentworth Beatty was born in Thorold, Ontario, in 1876, the son of Henry Beatty, a prominent ship owner of the Dominion. At the age of ten he moved with his parents to Toronto where he received the education and training which fitted him for the great responsibilities of his present position. The Model School, Upper Canada College, Harbord Street Collegiate Institute, Osgoode Hall and the University of Toronto had each contributed to his store of knowledge. In 1898 he graduated from the University and studied law with the firm of McCarthy.

Being a lawyer of heart as well as by profession his ability and diligence attracted the attention of the General Counsel of the Canadian Pacific who placed him in the law department of the Company. Though he was but twenty-four at the time, and the position he occupied was sought by lawyers of large experience, Mr. Beatty was not satisfied to rest upon his laurels, but continued to study with the same enthusiasm that had marked his career to that time. At twenty-eight when he had mastered every detail connected with the great railway system he was appointed Assistant Solicitor and three years later, General Solicitor. At thirty-five as General Counsel, he was enjoying the air on the uppermost pinnacle of the law department. Three years later he stepped from the law to the executive department, being named director and vice-president, and at the age of forty-one he succeeded Baron Shaughnessy as Chief Executive of the large system.

Withal Mr. Beatty had a firm but unobstructive personality. We was a tireless worker. His mind was logical. Coke and Lyttleton had trained him in tranquility and he was a man not easily surprised. He had a piercing eye and his clear, steady, strong way of looking a man in the eye was his chief and most impressive feature. He was a believer in thoroughness to the last degree a "fifty-fifty combination" of tireless brain and tireless industry but, he was not all steel. His decisions were always humane and he was sympathetic to suffering and misfortune at all times. Boys were his hobby, and his work for their betterment would have made him famous even had he not been President of the world's greatest transportation system. Mr. Beatty was conciliatory toward labor and never had a strike on the C.P.R.

Such persons, if their income from sources other than salary and wages exceeds 25% of their total income, are required to pay their 1943 Income Tax by instalments as follows:—

- 20% on or before 31st March, 1943
- 25% on or before 30th June, 1943
- 25% on or before 30th Sept., 1943
- 30% on or before 31st Dec., 1943

If less than 75% of your income comes from salary or wages, you must estimate your 1943 Income Tax now and pay instalments as set out above. You may estimate your tax by applying the 1943 rates either to your 1942 income or to your estimated 1943 income.

The first instalment of 20% is due  
31st March, 1943

changed with the depression years and the president's skill as a lawyer came into prominence. His pleas in favor of the unification of the Canadian Pacific and Canadian National Railways were models of close reasoning based on the statistics he used as background. Sir Edward's solution for the acute railway situation of Canada was joint private operation of the two systems. The Federal government decided for co-operation but with each company maintaining its own management. He always considered co-operation as a mere palliative and not a cure. He pleaded before the Royal Commission which required into the transportation situation in 1932, before the shareholders of the C. P. R. and on many a public platform for unification. His plan called for the placing of the non-competitive sections of the two railways under a unified con-

trol divorced from political influence. It was his belief that not only when he addressed the Canadian Chamber of Commerce at Vancouver, "We have frittered away too much of our national wealth. There has been a lack of united thought and united effort in dealing with major national problems and failure of the better element of our community to give the nation leadership."

Always a believer in the great future of the Canadian west, even during the drought period beginning in 1935, Sir Edward at Lethbridge in 1937 urged generous treatment for the people of the devastated area. "Nature will take a hand in solving the drought problem and help will be repaid when would the Dominion be able to balance its railway budget under his scheme but dividends could be resumed for the C. P. R. while provision could be made for the new railroad construction the country would require.

- (c) All internal fats known as kidney fat, and fat adhering to the tenderloin and flanks.
- (d) All cod fat, udder and udder (dug) fat.

Beef frozen prior to March 25th does not come under this ruling.

Penalties are provided for infractions of this Regulation.

Slaughterers can either render the fat themselves or ship it to a packer or renderer for processing.
