and marifal classes already designated under National Selective Service Mobilization Regulations, and also to men who are 16 to 18 years old (both ages inclusive).

. Objective:

This Third Order makes available for essential employments the services of men in age and marital classes designated as callable for Military Training under National Selective Service Mobilization Regulations and also all men from 16 to 18 years of age (both ages inclusive) who are presently employed in the non-essential employments now specified.

EMPLOYMENTS COVERED BY THIS ORDER:

Men, of the specified categories, are covered if now employed in any of the following:

1) Any wholesale activity not here listed: farm.products, ther than tobacco; food products; hardware, lumber and uilding materials; plumbing, heating and ventilating suplies; electrical equipment for industrial use; machinery and equipment; gasoline. oils and greases: fuel and ice; arm supplies; metals, minerals and chemicals; paper and products; books, newspapers, magazines and sheet nusic; watches, clocks and timing instruments; leather nd leather goods; scrap metal, junk and waste. (2) Raising special livestock, such as race horses, and dogs, cats and ther pets. (3) Flower growing. (4) Horticultural services, xcept tree surgery. (5) Leather currying, finishing, emossing and japanning. (6) Brewing. (7) Manufacturing in ny of these lines: (a) fur goods; (b) robes and dressing owns; (c) neckties and scarves; (d) curtains and draperies; metal household furniture; (f) household furniture except mattresses and bedsprings); (g) metal office furniare; (h) rattan and willow-wares; (i) cigar and fancy oxes (wood); (j) mirror and picture frames; (k) perames, cosmetics and other toilet preparations; (1) hand ags and small leather goods.

AGE AND MARITAL CLASSES OF MEN COVERED BY THIS ORDER:

(a) Every man born in any year from 1917 to 1927

Employments listed in Paragraph B above, to be reviewed All men as defined above must report to an Employment and under this Third Order, are additional to the employments listed elective Service Office not later than July 15th, 1943. Men in the First and Second Orders. The First Order required compliance by May 19th, and the Second Order by June 15th, 1943.
