Britain Is Having Political Crisis

YANKS ARE HEAVY HIT IN AFRICA

Lost Considerable Equipment in Algerian Setback Which is Not Minimized

ALLIED HEADQUARTERS IN NORTH AFRICA, Feb. 18 (CP)—United States armored formations withdrew today from the mountains below Tebessa in Algeria after receiving a severe mauling at the hands of Marshal Erwin Rommel's desert tank men who occupied the towns of Sbeitla, Kasserine and Feriana in a 66-mile advance since Sunday from Faid Pass in central Tunisia.

At Washington Secretary of War Henry L. Stimson said that the American forces had suffered a serious local set-back which "should not be minimized but still less should it be exaggerated."

ISOLATED 76 DAYS

LONDON, Feb. 18 (CP)—A total of 17 lighthouse keepers, isolated 76 days in Tuskar Rock lighthouse off the south Wexford coast, were rescued by a relief boat which battled through heavy seas and took them off.

OFFENSIVE FROM AIR

Royal Air Force Resumes Its Attacks on Continent Without Loss Wednesday Night

LONDON, Feb. 18 (CP)—The Royal Air Force renewed its offensive over the continent last night with an attack on an undisclosed district in western Germany which was made without loss.

NOT LIKELY FOR CANADA

Suspension of Canned Meat and Fish Sale in This Country Not Anticipated

OTTAWA, Feb. 18 (CP)—Canadian officials said today that there is no likelihood that Canada will follow the action of the United States in suspending sale of canned fish and canned meat prior to imposition of a meat ration.

REDS ARE SMASHING WESTWARD

Further Spectacular Gains are Made by Russians Over Retreating Nazis.

MOSCOW, Feb. 18 (CP)—The Red Army is smashing westward and widening wedges in Kharkov and Kursk regions at the north end of the active Russian-German battlefront and its columns have pierced deeper into Donets Basin territory in drives threatening the Germans retreating from Rostov, the Russians announced today.

Russian forces are now moving towards Kiev and Orel, probably intending to reach the Dnieper River before the enemy have a chance to entrench themselves.

Sub Drive Resumed

SAINT LUCIA, British West Indies, Feb. 18 (CP)—The Germans apparently have started their long-awaited renewal of the submarine campaign in the Caribbean Sea with the sinking of a large British West Indian schooner off the north coast of South America. Three of the sixty-two passengers are dead and forty-six others are missing. Three of the twelve members of the crew are also missing.

DIEPPE IS CRITICIZED

Specialist Member of Parliament Not at All Satisfied With Way Raid Was Handled

OTTAWA, Feb. 18 (CP)—Criticism of staff work behind combined operations in the attack on Dieppe last year was given in the House of Commons yesterday by Rev. T. C. Douglas, C. C. F. member for Weyburn, who demanded a debate on the subject either open or secret.

Douglas said that the gallantry of the men at Dieppe left nothing to be desired "but that cannot be said of staff work of those responsible for conducting this combined reconnaissance."

The prairie Socialist member said his information was that an aerial bombardment planned to soften up the objective had been called off at the last moment, that men were landed at high tide and taken off at low tide when they had to cross 4000 yards of open beach.

Douglas asked why tanks had been landed on a beach facing an unbreached twelve-foot seawall.

IS CHARGED BY RUSSIA

Leader of YugoSlav Guerillas is Accused of Collaborating With Axis

LONDON, Feb. 18 (CP)—The Daily Herald says the Russian government has sent a note to the Yugo-Slav government in London accusing Draja Mihailovic, Serbian guerilla chieftain, of "collaborating with the Axis. The Soviet government said it had proof of the charges.

CHURCHILL ILL
LONDON — Prime Minister Winston Churchill is suffering from a severe cold and fever, it is announced today. He is confined to bed.

BRITISH MOVE IN NORTH AFRICA
The British Eighth Army, rushing towards the Marits Line to relieve the hard-pressed Americans, has now advanced sixty-five miles into Tunisia and is menacing Axis forces.

JAPS IN CHINA
CHUNGKING — Making new landings northwest of Hong Kong, the Japanese have started a new drive into southern China.

ADVANCE EVERYWHERE
MOSCOW—The Red Army continues to advance everywhere along a 400-mile front from north of Kursk to Rostov with a point now gained 36 miles northwest of Kharkov where the Russian drive has resulted in the seizure of Boeodukhov. The snow-covered fields are littered with bodies and equipment abandoned by the enemy. In capturing a town northwest of Kharkov, the Russians took one hundred German tanks.

BOMB NEW BRITAIN
ALLIED HEADQUARTERS IN SOUTH PACIFIC—Allied planes pounded at three bases of the Japanese on New Britain Island.

YANKS TO AUSTRALIA
BELBOURNE—A sixth United States Army has arrived in Australia.

FRENCH JOIN ALLIES
WASHINGTON — Forty-two French warships have joined the naval strength of the Allies, these not including the great battleship Richelieu which reached New York a few days ago.

INQUEST ADJOURNED
The inquest into the deaths of Reginald McClellan and Andrew Kirkup, victims of last week's highway construction camp slide disaster near Kwinitsa, has been adjourned until tomorrow evening.

SCHOONER TORPEDOED
WASHINGTON — A West Indian wooden schooner is reported to have been sunk by a U-boat off the north coast of South America. Three of a crew of 74 persons on board are dead and 49 missing. The enemy submarine is described by survivors as having been a large one.

MEAT-FISH OUT
WASHINGTON — At the order of the office of Price Administration, sales of canned fish and meats have been suspended in the United States indefinitely. Sales will probably be permitted again on March 28, when meat rationing begins.

MADAME CHIANG SPEAKS
WASHINGTON—Madame Chiang Kai-Shek, wife of the Chinese generalissimo, speaks before the United States Congress today on behalf of greater aid for China. She said that defeat of Germany should not be the first consideration of the Allies and warned that Japan had greater resources in occupied countries than Germany.

SEND CANADIANS SOUTH
OTTAWA — Howard Green, Conservative member for Vancouver South, suggested in Parliament yesterday that Canadian army men be sent to the South Pacific for military experience and to acquaint themselves with the fighting methods of the Japanese.

WANTS DIEPPE DEBATE
OTTAWA—T. C. Douglas, C.C.F. member for Weyburn, Saskatchewan, has asked for an open or secret debate in Parliament on the Dieppe raid. Canadians, he said, wished to know if there had been lack of planning and preparation.

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Labor Ministers Talk of Resigning In Issue Over Beveridge Report

Policy of Going Slow on Matter of Social Security Approved 335 to 119—Closest Division Churchill Has Had

LONDON, Feb. 18 (CP)—The House of Commons today upheld the government policy of dealing slowly and cautiously with the Beveridge report on social security, defeating a Labor motion of disapproval of that policy by a vote of 335 to 119. The possibility of serious political repercussions remained as the Labor Party, represented in the war cabinet by three ministers, voted practically solidly against the government.

Twenty-two Labor ministers, as well as Rt. Hon. Clement Atlee, Secretary for the Dominions and Deputy Prime Minister, Rt. Hon. Herbert Morrison, Home Secretary, and Rt. Hon. Ernest Bevin, Minister of Labor, scheduled an immediate meeting to consider whether or not they should resign.

Such resignation would radically alter the coalition government Prime Minister Winston Churchill set up in May 1940 when the German juggernaut was crashing into the Low Countries and Northern France.

While the House reaffirmed its support of the government, the vote was the heaviest ever recorded against the Churchill administration.

QUOTA IS INCREASED

Pacific Coast Halibut Fishermen Allowed to Take 50,500,000 Pounds This Year

OTTAWA, Feb. 19 (CP)—The Department of Fisheries announce that Canadian and American fishermen will be permitted a maximum combined catch of 50,500,000 pounds of Pacific Coast halibut during 1943. This is one million pounds more than in 1942. The West Coast halibut fishery regulations have been amended in view of the need for greater production for the United Nations.

The catch limit in Area No. 2 waters off British Columbia, Washington State and Southeastern Alaska has been set at 23,000,000 pounds or 300,000 pounds more than last year. The opening date of the season will be April 16.

## EDITORIAL

### Vegetables Needed This Year . . .

Vegetables are an important item in the food supply and a larger production in 1943, both of fresh and canned products, is essential. In addition to increased domestic demand it is expected that the armed forces will require larger supplies and that shipments may be necessary to invaded countries. And there is a further possibility that the United States may take a larger volume of Canadian vegetables in 1943.

There is a reasonably good prospect for the commercial vegetable growers who are being encouraged to increase their output. And for those who grow vegetables only for home use an extra row or two should be planted—especially when seed is already on hand. There is no way that food can be produced more quickly than by growing of vegetables. And with transportation facilities taxed to the limit one way of easing the burden is to grow as much food as possible right at home. From every angle, therefore, it appears desirable to urge increased production of vegetables in 1943.

## Timely Recipes

### Souffle Sandwiches

2 tablespoons fat  
2 tablespoons flour  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
1/4 teaspoon mustard  
1 cup soft grated cheese  
2 eggs  
8 slices bread  
1/2 cup milk  
Softened butter to lightly butter toast  
3/4 cup canned tomato pulp or 4 large, peeled tomatoes  
Melt fat, add flour, salt and dry mustard and blend well. Stir in milk, then cheese and cook stirring constantly until sauce is thickened and cheese melted. Pour onto beaten egg yolks and fold in stiffly beaten egg whites. Toast the bread and spread lightly with softened butter.

Cut peeled tomatoes crosswise in four slices. Place 1 slice and 2 half slices or 1 1/2 tablespoons tomato pulp on each slice of toast. Pile on a baking sheet and bake in a hot oven 425 degrees F, until puffed and golden, about 5 minutes. Makes 8 sandwiches.

**NATIONAL SELECTIVE SERVICE**

**Complete Utilization of Canada's Manpower and Womanpower is Essential to Victory**

NATIONAL SELECTIVE SERVICE CIVILIAN REGULATIONS provide measures to assist in complete utilization of manpower and womanpower. Workers and employers are urged to familiarize themselves with the Regulations and assist the war effort by carrying them out. Under Order in Council P.C. 246, January 19, 1943, all civilian regulations have been consolidated and revised. Main features of National Selective Service Regulations now stand as follows:—

**COVERAGE**  
Employees: Regulations cover persons of either sex from 16 to 64 years of age inclusive, except for the following: provincial employees; armed services; persons in fishing, fish processing, hunting or trapping; clergymen; registered nurses, probationers and practical nurses; school, college and university teachers; domestic servants in private homes with only one employed; school students employed after school; employees in respect of part-time subsidiary employment; and any person employed for 3 days or less in a calendar week, by the same employer. Agricultural workers are covered by special provisions, not by the general provisions, as also are "technical personnel."  
Employers: Generally, the Regulations cover any person, firm or other employer, with one or more "covered" employees.

**EMPLOYERS MUST—**  
In Engaging Employees: (a) refrain from discussing employment with a prospective employee unless permitted to do so by a National Selective Service Officer; (b) notify the nearest employment office of any need for additional employees; (c) secure permission from an employment office to advertise for workers.  
If Having Surplus Workers: (a) notify the employment office of intention to discharge or lay off employees; (b) notify of intention to retain employees not actually required.  
If Intending to Discharge or Lay Off Employees: Give employees 7 days' notice in prescribed form, unless a National Selective Service Officer, after application, permits a reduction of this period, or unless in the building construction industry. Such permission may be granted in case of materials shortage; breakdown of machinery; where absence of other employees interferes with operations; providing, however, that conditions are beyond the employer's control and that the employer cannot make use of employees' services otherwise. 7 days' notice is not required unless an employee has been already employed for one month; or in the event of fire, explosion or other calamity, or termination of work by weather; or where an employee unreasonably refuses alternative duties. Whether preceded by 7 days' notice or not, separation from employment requires notice in writing.

**EMPLOYEES MUST—**  
If Unemployed for 7 Consecutive Days: Register for work at the nearest employment office. (Full-time students, housewives and clergy are not included).  
If Seeking Employment: (a) first secure permit from a National Selective Service Officer, unless returning to a former employer within 14 days, or returning to the same employer immediately after sickness, a strike or lockout, or under seniority rules; (b) refrain from advertising for a job unless a National Selective Service Officer approves.

The foregoing is not a complete reproduction of National Selective Service Civilian Regulations. For further information or rulings on particular cases, apply to the nearest Employment and Selective Service Office.
