## GERMANS TREAT IN ITALY

After four days of fighting British and American forces have driven the Germans back from all positions north of the Volturno River in Italy. The Nazis are retreating in full force and there are indications that they will withdraw for a new stand on a river eighty miles from Rome. The Allied advance yesterday was one to three miles. The exact location of the Canadians is not revealed but is indicated they are six hours' distance from Naples. They are known to be taking an important part in the fighting. British warships are active on both west and east coasts of Italy. Two enemy ships have been sunk between the island of Elba and the west coast. In the Adriatic a German transport en route to land troops was sunk and British ships were under fire of enemy coastal batteries.

## GENERAL WITHDRAWAL IN RUSSIA

Indicating a general withdrawal from the Dnieper River in Russia, Berlin spoke yesterday of a "systematic large detaching movement in the area of the Dnieper River." There is fierce hand to hand fighting from house to house, building to building and street to street in the important city of Melopol. At Kiev and Gomel the Red Army has been facing stiff rearguard resistance from the enemy, this being general all along the Dnieper River.

## NO SEPARATE PEACE

The Finnish minister of finance, Tanner, says there is not much chance of a separate peace between Finland and Russia.

## LONDON HAS BRIEF ALERT

London had a brief alert Saturday night, the first since October 8, but no enemy planes came over. German bombers struck at a southeast coast town but there were no reports of casualties or damage.

## FIGHTING IN YUGOSLAVIA

Patriots Making Bid for Zagreb—Rommel Brings in Reinforcements.

LONDON, Oct. 18.—Yugo-Slav partisans forces are fighting against the Germans on the outskirts of the important city of Zagreb which is 75 miles from Belgrade, the capital.

## Smash Jap Air Attack

Jap Reply to Air Devastation at Rabaul Fails with Heavy Loss

ALLIED HEADQUARTERS IN SOUTHWEST PACIFIC, Oct. 18.—Allied headquarters announced today that Allied airmen destroyed 104 Jap planes, and probably damaged another 54 in battles Friday and Saturday. The Japanese, apparently trying to emulate the Allies heavy raid on Rabaul, New Britain, sent about 62 bombers and fighters against Orobay, New Guinea. The Japanese lost 43 bombers and 20 fighters, and probably eleven other aircraft. Not one Allied plane was missing.

Hundreds of Thousands of Germans Threatened by Encirclement at Dneiper Bend

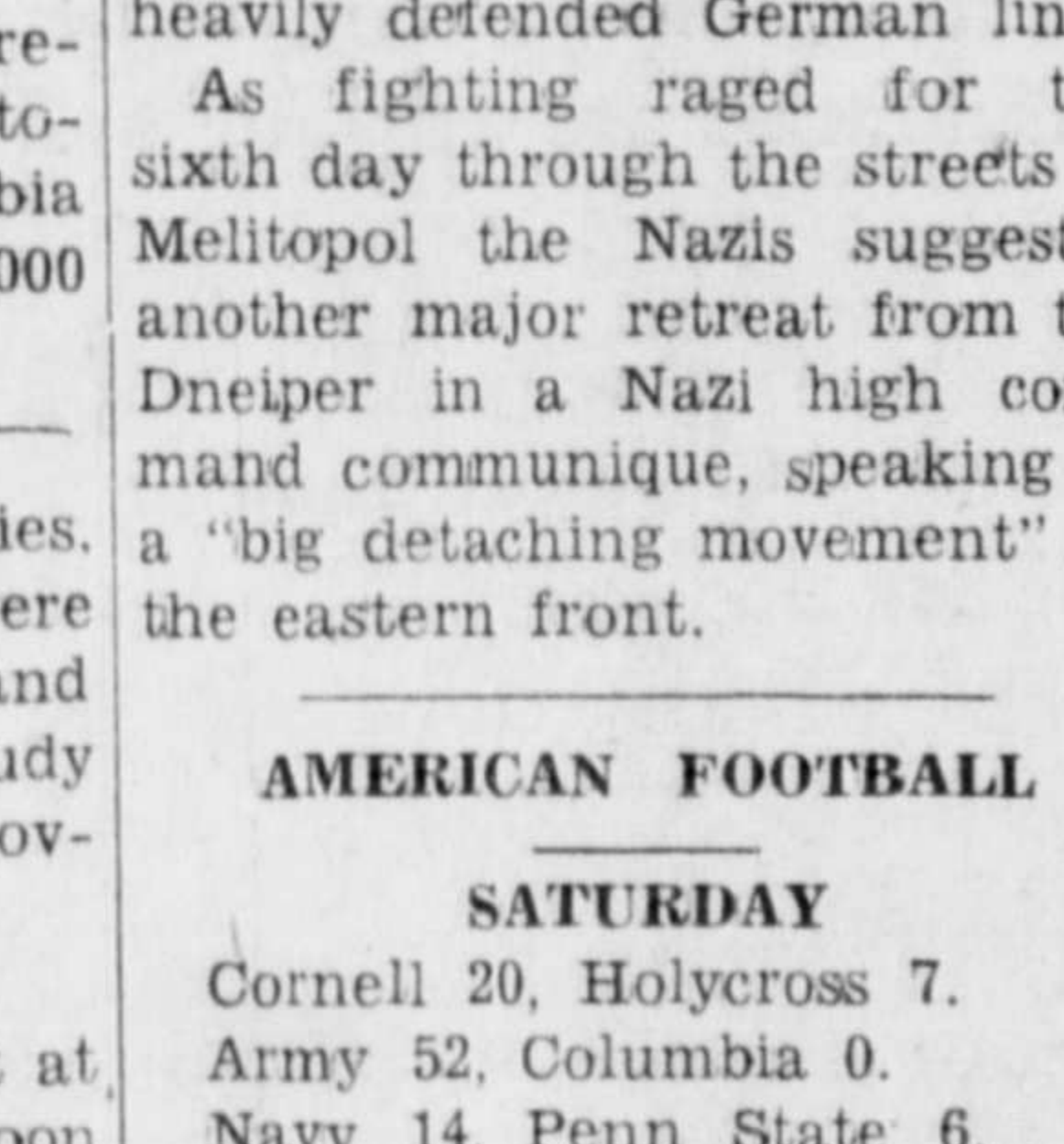
LONDON, Oct. 18.—Tearing a hole fifteen miles deep inside the Dneiper River loop behind Dneipropetrovsk, the Russians threatened today to trap hundreds of thousands of Germans in the river bend to the east as well as at Melitopol and in the Crimea.

Black, provincial council member for Prince Rupert, who welcomed the delegates and was then elected chairman of the meeting after which the convention proceeded with its business.

## RESUME HEAVY AIR ACTIVITY

BRITISH RESUME HEAVY AIR ASSAULT ON CONTINENT WHILE NAZIS SNEAK-RAID BRITAIN

LONDON, Oct. 18.—Royal Air Force Mosquitos bombed targets in Berlin and Western Germany without loss last night while fighters attacked airfields and communications in occupied territory. R.A.F. Mosquitos and Mustangs were active over northern France, damaging seven locomotives. R.C.A.F. Wellingtons laid mines in enemy waters. There were no R.C.A.F. losses.

## EIGHTH STABS TOWARD ROME

FIFTH AND EIGHTH ARMIES CAPTURE THREE MORE TOWNS NORTH OF VOLTURNO RIVER—POSSIBILITY OF NAZI WITHDRAWAL

ALLIED HEADQUARTERS ALGERIA, Oct. 18.—The Anglo-American Fifth Army, driving beyond the Volturno has "firmly occupied" Canello, Ruviano and Nerrone, and British Eighth Army patrols are stabbing westward into the Apennines toward Rome. Allied headquarters announced today.

## DECORATION FOR MERIT

FIRST DISTINCTLY CANADIAN AWARD IS ANNOUNCED—FOR EITHER MILITARY OR CIVILIAN

OTTAWA, Oct. 18.—Creation of the first distinctly Canadian decoration for merit—the Canadian Medal—and its approval by the King was announced last night by Prime Minister William Lyon Mackenzie King. It may be won by any citizen, civilian or uniformed, in recognition for "meritorious service above and beyond the faithful performance of duties" and may be awarded to citizens of other countries that Canada may desire to honor.

## EVERY MAN SALESMAN

CANADIAN NATIONAL EMPLOYEES ALL OUT FOR VICTORY LOAN—MESSAGE FROM PRESIDENT

MONTREAL, Oct. 18.—Every employee of the Canadian National Railways and subsidiary companies stationed in Canada will today receive a "23" message issued by R. C. Vaughan, chairman and president, asking for complete support for the Fifth Victory Loan throughout the campaign. A "23" message is the telegraph symbol for a message or instruction carried over the wires and directed to all and sundry in the company employ throughout the area covered.

Eighty-four of the enemy planes were shot down over New Guinea. Only two Allied planes were lost in bagging the large number of Japanese.

**Bond Buyers Are Builders . . .**

Regular readers of the press in Canada will have noted by now that the National War Finance Committee is placing a new emphasis on self-interest in the Fifth Victory Loan campaign. This is being done of course without discounting the importance of public war bond subscriptions in the quest of victory.

Honest judgment reveals that most of the bonds sold since the start of the war have been bought by citizens for reasons dictated by self-interest. There may have been many who were not particularly anxious to secure three per cent interest but it seems fair to say that these bought in the knowledge that they were protecting themselves from the domination of predatory nations on the loose in Europe and the Far East. But at this point in the war when victory seems to be so much nearer and peace time conditions are much nearer, more and more of us in Canada are realizing the tightly bound relationship between our savings in war years and our well-being in the months and years which follow the day of peace.

Of course, from the very beginning of Canada's program of public borrowing, the Minister of Finance and his colleagues who have been directing the sale of government securities have pointed to war savings as one of the salvations of post-war prosperity. Our manufacturers and other producers of consumed goods will not be able to build up staffs of employees and big payrolls unless the great mass of consumers shall have ready cash to buy what they need and want.

Happily a very large portion of Canadian people have a backlog of these savings, enough to create a tremendous market for post-war goods of all descriptions. But we should not overlook an obvious truism, that the greater the average war savings in Canada the greater will be the post-war market with all its attendant increase in jobs and wages.

Wise Canadians will put every available dollar into Fifth Victory Loan Bonds, not only for their own immediate post-war benefit, but as a good, country-wide co-operative move to ensure a long term period of maximum employment and maximum prosperity.

A good and faithful servant, if ever a Christian deserved his reward in Heaven it is Hugh Grant.

We extend our sympathy to those whom he leaves but, knowing them as we do, we are sure that the great faith and the inspiration they derived from their departed one will effectively assuage their sorrow and adequately comfort them.

A visiting concert party has been entertaining the troops here lately. On Saturday night they were at Seal Cove and last night at the Capitol Theatre. Opening accordion numbers by Frank Ramoni and his accompaniments all through the show indicated he is an artist of no mean sorts.

Tiny Janis Thompson is a whirlwind acrobatic dancer and possesses sense of balance while maintaining the most trying positions that is quite remarkable. The next young lady to appear, after a humorous build-up by Gerald Griffin, the master of ceremonies, who led us to believe that she had been in two well known pictures only to let us down by saying that she too had seen them, was Jerry Knox. Jerry is statuesque, big blonde beauty and she knocks them cold with her raucous, resonant voice more re-

miscient of the "roaring forties" than the "gay nineties" whose songs she features. Western Head of Canadian National Puts up Victory Loan Trophy

WINNIPEG, Oct. 18 — The

keen competitive spirit among western region employees of the Canadian National Railways in the Victory Loan drive is being spurred on by the award of a silver cup and shield.

W. R. Devenish, vice-president and general manager, announced that he would offer these trophies for competition in the C.N.R. family from Port Arthur

to Victoria. "The cup will be awarded to the divisional group reaching the largest percentage of its allotted quota," he said. "The shield will be for the railway shopmen at Transcona and Fort Rouge. ditions an impressive international military parade consisting of both men and women of the armed forces and including representation of navy, army and air force with some motorized equipment was held yesterday afternoon to signalize the Fifth Victory Loan campaign opening in Prince Rupert. A substantial turn-out of veterans of the last war under President Dr. R. C. Bamford of the Canadian Legion participated in the parade. A detachment of the Prince Rupert Machine Gun Regiment with Lieut. D. G. Borland in charge, the Prince Rupert Sea Cadets Corps and the Red Cross Women's Corps were also represented. It was a smart procession which marched along Third Avenue and past the Post Office where Group Captain Roy H. Foss took the salute. One of the features of the parade was the making of its debut by the newly formed band of the Prince Rupert Machine Gun Regiment under Bandmaster Peter Lien. The local naval band and the Sea Cadets' bugle and drum band also provided music.

Third Avenue was gaily decorated with streamers of flags strung across the street and the Post Office was similarly adorned.

Many citizens turned out to see the parade and showed a measure of enthusiasm.

**The Experts Say - - -**

**PICKLES**—New pickle recipes available to housewives won't strain the sugar budget much—and it's well worth a little sacrifice of present sweetness for future spice, says the consumer section of the agriculture department in announcing that mimeographed copies of a dozen or so fine recipes may be obtained by writing to its publicity and extension division, Ottawa, and asking for "Wartime Pickles and Relishes."

**"PIECING" IN FAVOR**—Doctors and nutritionists have placed their stamp of approval upon "piecing" between meals providing that the snack does not take away meal time appetite, says Marion Harlow of nutrition services. Tests have shown that workers in war industries do better work and are less tired at the end of the day if they have something to eat and drink in the middle of the morning and afternoon.

Children, who often expend as much or more energy than a hardworking adult, cannot eat enough at meals to supply all the food they need, and between-meal snacks are quite in order for them too if they consist of such food as milk, whole grain bread, fruit or raw carrots.

Such foods make ideal "piecings," for they contribute to the day's supply of vitamins and minerals as well as giving a

"lift" to tired bodies and satisfying appetites.

**TRIPS AND TIRES**—Byrne Hope Sanders, director of the prices board's consumer branch, suggests that rural housewives make their shopping trips to town coincide with those their husbands are making to transport goods, thus conserving gasoline and prolonging the life of tires and automotive equipment.

**FEATHERLIGHT PLASTICS**—The woman shopping for costume jewelry these days will be impressed with the quantity and variety of plastics, which, unlike most costume jewelry, are very light. The new lines of plastic jewelry are "light as a feather," and a trinket by its weight will have to choose some other method of evaluating it.

**CANNING CORNER**—Here are a few storage "Do's and Don't's" to keep canned goods in good condition: Test sealers for leakage before storage, and make sure they are wiped clean and that no food is adhering to the outside of sealers. Store canned goods in a cool, dark, dry place. If space is light, each sealer may be wrapped in paper. Sealers should be examined after a week of canning for signs of spoilage, and checked periodically for signs of possible

spoilage. They should be washed thoroughly as they become empty, dried and stored with lids and metal rings in place. Rubber rings should be washed, dried and stored flat in boxes or envelopes in a cool, dry place. If lids are tightened after sealers are cool the seal may be broken, and this also may happen if sealers are lifted by the lids. Canned goods should not be stored in a place which is either too warm or too cold, nor should they be put away upside down.

**Terrace Man Hunts In The Bulkley Valley**

SMITHERS, Oct. 18 — S. G. Kirkaldy, well known postmaster at Terrace and his party put in most of last week scouring the hills in the Bulkley Valley in search of a deer or moose. Neither the weather nor the game were very obliging but that did not deter the party from putting in the time in the search. They experienced no luck until just before dark on Friday evening, which was their last day for hunting, when a big buck obligingly showed himself on the crest of a knoll where they were resting and Sammy drew a bead on him and got him with the first shot. The party had a hard job getting him out to the station at Hubert where he was shipped to Terrace to be displayed before the residents of that town who do not see many specimens of that kind in their district. Mr. Kirkaldy is very enthusiastic over the attractions of the Bulkley Valley and hopes to visit the district more frequently as soon as the Skeena highway is completed and ready for traffic.

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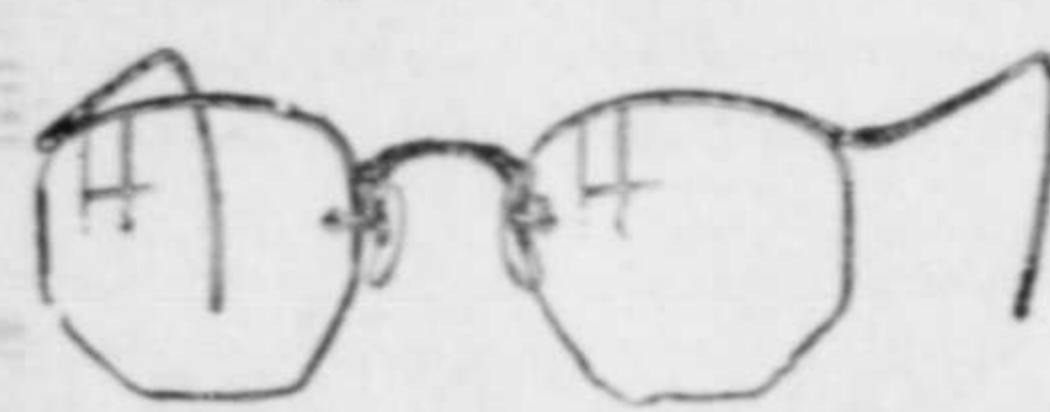

## SPORT NEWS

### Sport Chat

They led Bold Archer from his Newmarket stall for the last time the other day. And in a nearby field this stallion who ranked as one of the most prolific sires of winners in the history of the turf was destroyed by a bullet. Bold Archer, at 19, was feeling the infirmities of age.

A splendid-appearing animal who sired successful races from every type of mare, Bold Archer in a 12-year period ending last season was the father of 188 winners who accounted for 267 races. Those victories were worth something like \$275,000 to the various owners. Bred by the late Sir John Robinson at the famed Workshop Manor Stud, Bold Archer was purchased by the late R. L. V. Sherwood for \$135,000 in 1929.

Unknown to all but the principals, Gustator, a horse that might win next season's Derby, figured in a lightning change of ownership at a Salisbury race meet. The deal was put through in the paddock within two minutes and just before Gustator raced to victory in the five-furlong Parkstone Plate. The buyer was H. Kouyoumdrajin, an American from Manchester with big cotton trade interests. He paid Lord Carnarvon about \$35,000 for the colt. Incidentally the buyer also had a substantial bet on Gustator—right on the nose.

Each of the three placed horses in a Salisbury sprint returned a profit to successful bettors of one penny on two shillings. That's because the betting was so heavy there was insufficient money left in the "tote" to pay a dividend. Racing rules say that "if the net pool is insufficient to pay back the value of the bets on the winning or placed horses as the case may be, then two shillings, one penny, shall be paid."

Capt. Bruce Hobbs, who as a kid of 17 won the 1938 Grand National steeplechase on Battle-ship, has been awarded the Military Cross. He joined the army at the outbreak of war and has served more than three years in the Middle East where he was twice wounded. He has just recovered from the latest injury. At one time it was thought that the chase jockey never would ride again. He fractured his back in a fall at Cheltenham races shortly after winning the National. His complete recovery amazed the turf world.

Silver Fair must be one of the world's most versatile racers. At Limerick Junction in Eire, she ran two races in one day—one of them over the hurdles. She was unplaced in the 1 1/2 mile hurdle event but a couple of hours later ran second in a two-mile flat race.

### AIR FORCE TROPHIES

#### Presentation Dinner Last Week —Made Clean Sweep During Season

The Royal Canadian Air Force inter-service football and softball champions were feted at a mess dinner at Seal Cove last week.

Guest speakers for the evening were Group Captain Roy H. Foss, commanding officer Number Four Group headquarters, and Wing Commander Brooks, commanding officer, Prince Rupert. Chairman for the occasion was Leading Aircraftsman Spencer.

Wing Commander Brooks was called upon to present the Northern British Columbia trophy, the Mobbey Cup, and the Stuart Shield to Corporal Melville, captain of the football team, and the Dibb trophy to Sergeant O'Leary, captain of the softball aggregation. Group Captain Foss then arose to pay

fitting tribute to the champions. The kickers garnered every award that was put up for competition this season. The Northern British Columbia trophy was won by the squad for coming out on top in the play-offs in the first half of the schedule. They romped through the half without suffering a single defeat.

The Mobbey Cup, which the airmen captured by entrenching themselves at the head of the heap in the second half, dates back to 1914 and is believed to be one of the oldest cups in this area to be put up for competition.

To complete the hat trick, the boys in blue made off with the Stuart Shield in the post-season play-offs. The shield, like the Mobbey Cup, has a tradition behind it dating back to 1922.

After facing some of the stiffest opposition seen here in the last few years, the softball club climbed to second place in the final standing, in a league that boasted 22 teams. They then went on to capture the Dibb Trophy that saw them subdue three different contestants.

Others at the head table were Squadron Leader Arnold, Flight Lieutenant Springborn, Flight Lieutenant Girard, Flying Officer Beck and Flying Officer Boyd.
