United States Scores Again Against Japanese in Kula Gulf-Fall of Munda Immienent

ALLIED HEADQUARTERS IN THE SOUTHWEST PACI-FIC. July 13 (CP)—A Japanese cruiser and three destroyers were sunk Monday night and early Tuesday by American naval units in a second battle in Kula Gulf off New Georgia in Kula Gulf off New Georgia in the Solomons. The battle may be still in progress. Two other Japanese destroyers were QUIT JOB reported as being probably sunk. No mention was made of American losses. The latest losses raise to at least 13 and supplies.

The original motive behind the building of the P.G. E.R. was to divert traffic from Prince Rupert, thereby hindering the development of another great Pacific port and frustrating one of the main objectives of the building of the National Transcontinental railway. This is the motive behind the present revived activities of the Pacific Northwest Trade Association. It is a diversion of trade from its natural channels rather than a creative program.

"A different perspective is a program that will develop 'the last great frontier of this continent,' not as an adjunct of either Vancouver, Seattle and Portland; or of any other established section of Canada or the United States but, instead, 'A Great North, Strong and Free" on its own account, standing on its own economy, and opening up new world routes by land and sea, and through the skies, new ports in the sub-Arctic seas, the shortest way to the trade routes of the Northern Hemisphere. Alaska and the Yukon were bled white to enrich the cities of the Pacific slope. In the new era of expansion is it not possible to develop the north for its own sake, and give depth -and strength-to Canada, as well as width, and thus fulfill the original purpose of the building of the railways now incorporated in the Canadian National system?"

We are glad to note the Moose Jaw paper's suggestion that such great projects as the opening up of the north might be carried out from a national viewpoint rather than from the standpoint of mere; sectional benefit. Possibly it would be better for British Columbia if it thought of the Peace Riva from this angle rather than considering too strongly the mere possibility of local outlet Kudos. There seems to be no good reason why the opening up of the Peace River could not benefit the whole of British Columbia instead of Vancouver or Prince Rupert exclusively. Possibly we would be doing better if we submerged the competitive angle and took a broader view of the whole situation. Unity of representations certainly would be conducive to quicker action. Sectional bickering, conversely, may still further delay actual accomplishment.

Meantime it is gratifying to see the provincial government making post-war road plans on a large scale which should equitably meet the road needs of all parts of the province including the north. No doubt, the financial aspect of these huge undertakings is being taken into due account.






