(CP)— LONDON, June 17 Clashes between scouting parties on the Smolensk front indicating a new stirring in that long dormant sector furnished the principal action last night on the German-Russian battlefront, a Soviet communique said.

A war bulletin was silent on the fighting north and south of Orel where sizeable opposing armies are reported massing in activity which communiques on both sides have hinted might portend a major offensive.

Russian planes raided German tank concentrations near Sevsk in the vital Orel sector of the Soviet front Tuesday night in continuation of several days of sharp activity in that area, a Russian communique said.

The Trickle That Counts . . .

War, so big that it spreads into almost every part of our world, is won by the organized little efforts of individuals. The monotonous left and right turns on the drill field, the collection of fats in the kitchen, the unvaried motions beside a lathe, the added work of feeding larger number of live-stock and the extra number of daily taps on the typewriter, flow into and make possible the great lent a helping hand several afterstream of war effort destined to overwhelm Hitler and his shady colleagues.

While this is true, many of us fail to appreciate it sometimes. Our humdrum job can appear to be so remote from our idea of war as something exciting and important. It is fair and accurate, nevertheless, to say that the flood which will take proper care of the enemy depends entirely on the trickling flow of individual effort from all of us.

With that conception of our part in the job of war, we see more clearly the reason why individuals should buy Victory Bonds, no matter how small; why each war worker cannot afford to stray away from his shop unnecessarily, and why even in the simple matter an income tax return, co-oporation of the individual is vitally important.

There still seems to be a hesitancy on the part of many Prince Rupert men to appreciate their war responsibilities. In the past there have been recruiting campaigns when recruiting was for men who would do their fighting far afield, even though it would be fighting for Can-

This week an appeal is being made by the local reserve for recruits to man guns which have been placed here to defend our own city and our own homes. The understanding is that, in joining the reserve, men will not even be called away from Prince Rupert. And it has been pointed out that, if such a situation arose as it being necessary to fight for Prince Rupert, one would not be interested in his ordinary every day work but would first think of the protection of his home. By joining the reserve and taking advantage of the training and organization it offers, a man would be in that much better position to fight for the preservation of his home.

It should not be necessary to have to ask men who live today in a city that is under the threat of actual physical warfare where they stand and what they are doing about it. There are other advantages to be derived from belonging to the reserve but possibly the strongest of them all is the factor of home insurance.

Canada in Postwar Shipping...

Many signs are evident that Canada should have a place in the maritime picture when this war is over. Her shipbuilding activities warrant an important contribution to the rebuilding of the world's replacement tonnage and crews have been trained who will expect to have an opportunity to continue this means of employment.

There should be a constructive policy formulated similar to what is taking place in United States and Great Britain.

Taxpayers of Canada hear plenty of the staggering sums being allocated to shipbuilding and allied industries but little about arrangements for protection of this huge investment. There should be little need to write this off as a war expenditure in the same wav as guns and ammunition if some intelligent planning is done now.
