ON BERLIN

TWO RAIDS

Was Easy Victim Saturday Night But Stiffened Resistance Last Night-London Visited

LONDON, Jan. 18 (CP)-Berlin was bombed for the second successive night last night by the Royal Air Force. Twenty-two British planes failed to return, indicating that a force of probably some five hundred machines took part.

The strong force of Royal Air Force bombers laid huge fires across Berlin in the renewed "war of capitals" last night in spite of the stiffened defences of the German city which resulted in the 22-plane toll compared with only one the previous night.

There were two mild air raids by the Luftwaffe on London last night. Intense anti-aircraft fire resulted in the shooting down of ten Nazi planes.

In their eleventh major raid so far this month, the Royal Air Force bombers were over Berlin Saturday night. Dropping a great weight of explosives and incendiaries over the German capital, they started huge fires and, apparently, did much damage. Only one British plane is missing.

Early reports were that thirtyone persons had been killed and 150 injured in Saturday night's bombing of Berlin but it is considered likely that casualties may have been more than that. The central building of the Berlin Olympic Games is reported to have been destroyed.

Two and four-ton block busters were used by the Royal Air Force in the raids on Berlin.

A Poor Regulation . . .


