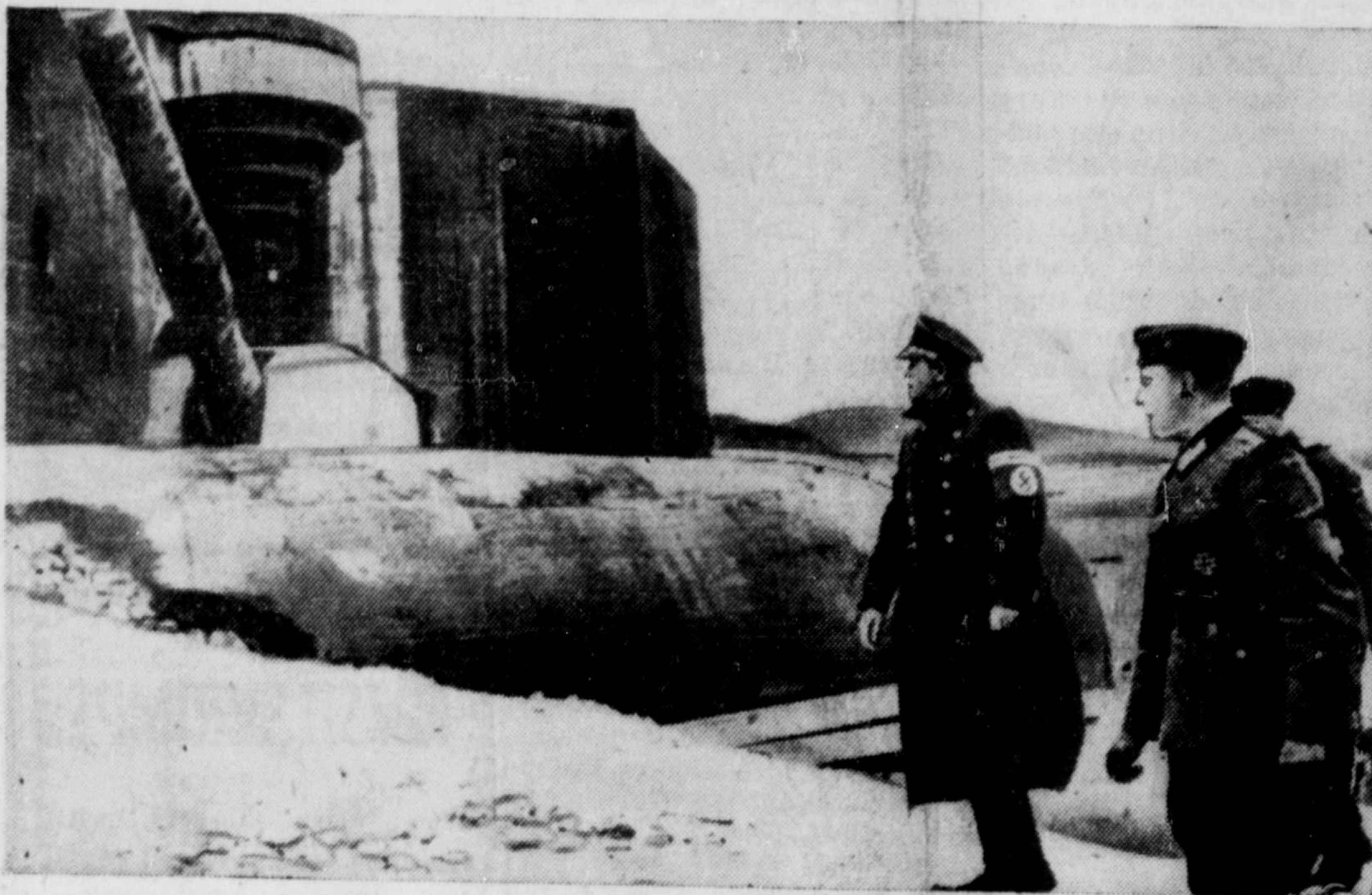

Enemy Evacuation of Aleutian Island Base Saved Many Casualties

Admiral Kinkaid Tells Story of How Americans and Canadians Occupied the Place - Nips Withdrew In Undersea Craft.

WASHINGTON, D.C., Oct. 26 (CP) - Vice-Admiral Kinkaid, commander of the Aleutians area, disclosed today that quite a few Japanese submarines were sunk by American destroyers while the enemy evacuated the garrison on Kiska several weeks ago.

NO TRACE OF BOMBER

ANCIENNE, Lorette, Oct. 26 - There have been no further developments in regard to a missing Royal Canadian Air Force Liberator bomber, signals of a portable radio transmitter from which were believed to have been picked up by a searching Anson plane which, however, searched the area to find no sign of the missing craft. The crew reported that the Anson had to fly high because of low ceiling.

BUSINESS DISTRICT CANVASSED

As the Fifth Victory Loan campaign goes into its second week the canvassers report that they have completed their first coverage of the business district. All business premises are now requested to display in their windows the Honor Certificate which is evidence of their purchase of Victory Bonds.

Was Cast Ashore On Cape Calvert

BELLA BELLA, Oct. 26 - Alexander McLeod, fisherman, is in hospital here suffering from the effects of a harrowing experience when a small gasboat in which he was heading for Vancouver was wrecked on Cape Calvert in the Queen Charlotte Sound area. He was eleven days without shelter or food, finally being picked up by a passing American boat. He was so weak with hunger and exposure that he could hardly stand.

OPERATION AT PHILADELPHIA

Little Melvin Gilliland to Have Delicate Lung Treatment in East

VANCOUVER, Oct. 26 - Eight year old Melvin Gilliland and his mother, Mrs. Norman Gilliland, boarded a Canadian National Railways train Monday night for Philadelphia where the little fellow will undergo a delicate operation at the famous Temple University Bronchoscopic Clinic in an effort to remove a metal staple that has been lodged in his left lung for more than a year.

COMMAND CHANGED

Field Marshal Kesselring Removed From Italy and is Replaced by General Wittinghoff

LONDON, Oct. 26 - The Daily Mail, without giving sources, today published a report that Field Marshal Albert Kesselring has been replaced as German field commander on the Italian front by Lieutenant General Wittinghoff, who is described as a tank expert. Kesselring is said to have been given an air command on the Russian front.

Pope Tries For Peace

LONDON, Oct. 26 - Pope XII has intensified his efforts to bring about peace, the Vatican radio said today as other advisers indicated that Roman Catholic bishops in Germany and northern Italy are preparing to hold conferences for reasons that are not announced. There have been reports that the Pope has talked with British, American and French envoys to the Holy See which is under guard.

WAR NEWS

JAP BASE USELESS SOUTH PACIFIC HEADQUARTERS - A 172-ton bombardment of Kahili air field has left that Bougainville Island air base practically useless to the Japanese for the present, an American spokesman said Tuesday. Bougainville is the top rung of the Solomons ladder and is the last remaining Japanese stronghold in that area. It is now the primary objective of Allied sea, land and air offensive east of New Guinea. Rabaul, on New Britain, has been heavily hit again with 123 Japanese planes destroyed.

HIROHITO IS WORRIED NEW YORK - Emperor Hirohito told the Diet today that "the present situation is truly grave," according to a Tokyo broadcast.

OVER LONDON AGAIN LONDON - Nazi aircraft swept over an outlying London district Monday night but left without passing over the city. There were no casualties and only minor damage was reported.

KOS IS EVACUATED CAIRO - British forces have successfully evacuated the island of Kos under pressure of German sea and airborne attack.

AUSTRIA BOMBED BERLIN - Berlin states that 300 Allied bombers and 200 fighters staged a heavy bombing raid on an important munitions plant near Vienna. The raiding planes were believed to have been based from North Africa.

CROSS-CHANNEL DUEL LONDON - One of the longest artillery duels across the Straits of Dover took place last night, lasting for two hours. There was heavy fire from both sides. The targets are believed to have been convoys.

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RABOUL IS HEAVY HIT

Further Devastating Blows De-livered There and at Bougainville by Allied Bombing Raids

ALLIED HEADQUARTERS IN SOUTHWEST PACIFIC, Oct. 26 - The Japanese have suffered another heavy blow in loss of planes by an Allied air blow on their stronghold at Rabaul in New Britain. No less than 125 planes of the enemy were destroyed and 25 others were probably destroyed when bombing raids were struck Saturday and Sunday at Rabaul air fields. Allied losses consisted of two fighters and two bombers.

The Japanese air reserves at Rabaul are now believed to have been crippled. The Japanese base at Bougainville in the central Solomons is also believed to have been practically knocked out as a result of recent Allied bombings.

Moscow Parley Is Proceeding

MOSCOW, Oct. 26 - There are still no official statements in regard to the tri-partite conference here between foreign ministers of Russia, United States and Great Britain. It is reported that attention is now being given to particular issues and drafting of statements in writing. The conference entered its eighth day today.

Railwaymen Backing Loan

MONTREAL, Oct. 26 - Subscriptions during the first week of the Fifth Victory Loan by employees of the Canadian National Railways passed the four and one-half million dollar mark, according to returns completed at headquarters of the system here yesterday. A total amount of \$4,551,050 was subscribed by 47,994 employees of the Canadian National and affiliated companies, an increase of 61 percent in the number of subscribers and 77 percent in the amount subscribed, as compared with the first week of the Fourth Victory Loan. Employees of the Railways numbering 45,489 subscribed \$4,250,150. TransCanada Air Lines employees numbering 1,354 subscribed \$122,800 while 1,151 employees of National Railways Munitions bought bonds to the value of \$178,100.

Nazis Fight Desperately

MOSCOW, Oct. 26 - The Germans, in disorderly retreat, are waging desperate but futile rearguard battles along the 200-mile front in an effort to save as much as possible from what may prove to be the greatest German disaster since Stalingrad.

CASUALTIES NOT GIVEN

Further Particulars Regarding Loss of Cruiser and Destroyer In English Channel Awaited.

LONDON, Oct. 26 - The British announcement which yesterday revealed the sinking of the cruiser Charybdis and the destroyer Limbourne in action in the English Channel did not give the number of casualties.

The Charybdis and Limbourne were part of a British force engaged in an offensive sweep off the north coast between Ushant and the Channel Islands. Both vessels were struck by torpedoes. Berlin radio had announced Saturday that a British force had clashed during the night with a German force protecting a convoy.

British light naval forces, protecting a convoy, sank four German E-boats and damaged seven more out of a force of 30 in a fierce five-hour running battle in the English Channel Sunday night, the Admiralty announced today. A British escort fleet of destroyers and motor gunboats rejoined the convoy without serious damage. There were several casualties among the crews.

Loyal to Canada And Home Town

A Prince Rupert girl, now working in Vancouver, has sent in \$200 for the purchase of Fifth Victory Loan bonds. This sum represents her savings over a period of several months. Her loyalty to her country is evidenced by this purchase and her loyalty to her home town of Prince Rupert is shown by the fact of her making her purchase through the local canvassers.

Local Firm Sells Out

B.C. Packers Takes Over Albert & McCaffery - To Carry on Business.

British Columbia Packers Limited announced yesterday that they had taken over the ownership of Albert & McCaffery Limited. It is understood that the present management will be retained in Albert & McCaffery Limited who have been carrying on a fuel and building business on the waterfront for the past 25 years.

British Columbia Packers Limited intends to establish an office in conjunction with the Albert & McCaffery Limited operations to take care of their extensive interests in Prince Rupert and district.

Aluminum Plant Is Back to Normal

SHAWNIGAN FALLS, Quebec, Oct. 26 - Officials of the Shawnigan Falls Co. reported late yesterday that everything was gradually going back to normal following a strike over union jurisdictional authority. The workers are gradually returning to their jobs in the aluminum plant into which soldiers were called to break up a picket line.

PRISONERS ARE HOME

LEITH, Scotland, Oct. 26 - More than three thousand disabled British service men, with a sprinkling of Canadians among them, reached this port today receiving a tumultuous welcome, sounding Britain's joy at the completion of the first repatriation for prisoners of war from Germany. They were brought here by the former Canadian Pacific liner Empress of Russia and the Swedish exchange ship Drottningholm.

Jap Drive Is Turned Back

ALLIED HEADQUARTERS IN SOUTH PACIFIC, Oct. 26 - The drive of the Japanese towards the sea on Huon Peninsula of New Guinea in the vicinity of Finschhafen has been definitely turned back by the Australians.

Volunteers to Get War Medal

OTTAWA, Oct. 26 - A new service ribbon will soon be awarded to most volunteer members of Canada's army, navy and air force - the ribbon of the Canadian Volunteer Service Medal - it was announced today by the three defence ministers. The medal will not be struck until after the war.

TO EXTEND FACILITIES

Salvation Army Has Plans for Better Accommodation for Soldiers Here

Major John Steele, area supervisor of Salvation Army war service work on the Pacific coast, is spending a few days in the city on business in connection with plans for extension of the Army's war service facilities here. The plans include provision for the reconstruction of the Stork Block which will be used exclusively for hostel purposes, providing for the accommodation of 170 men. The adjoining Gratton building will then be used exclusively for recreational purposes. Major Steele, who returned to Canada in July after having spent two-and-a-half years with the troops overseas, will give a lecture tomorrow night in the Army Citadel on his own experiences during the trying days of the blitz. Two moving pictures will also be shown. Lieut. Col. C. V. Eviitt will act as chairman and other military leaders of the area will also be on the platform.

Are Back From British Trip

MONTREAL, Oct. 26 - Hon. C. D. Howe, minister of munitions, accompanied by H. J. Symington, president of Trans-Canada Air Lines, and Brigadier James L. Melville of Ottawa, returned to Canada last night aboard a TransCanada Air Lines multi-engine plane from a Commonwealth air conference in Britain.

Mussolini On Air Thursday

BERNE, Switzerland, Oct. 26 - It is reported here that Benito Mussolini will make a radio address this Thursday on the 21st anniversary of the march on Rome.

Bulletins

SEAMEN TO STRIKE VANCOUVER - Seamen of the Park Steamship Co. have warned the National War Labor Board that they intend to strike unless the board gives its decision on wage increases asked for in November last.

NAZIS ARE REGRETFUL STOCKHOLM - Germany has expressed official regret to Sweden over the destruction of a Swedish air transport plane. The affair was a mistake.

CALIFORNIA EARTHQUAKE SAN FRANCISCO - Two quite heavy earthquake shocks, centred in the San Jose area, were felt last night about 10 o'clock. Little, if any, damage, was done.

Love On Italy

Opposition Appears to be Diminishing, Probably in Preparation for New Stand.

HEADQUARTERS IN BRITAIN, Oct. 26 - The Allies have advanced up to five miles in the Anzio area, it was announced today.

Opposition on the American Fifth Army front diminished as the Nazi, apparently fall back to new positions. The Fifth Army seized the town of Anzio, and the British Eighth Army took Orijana, Barabello, Petrelle and Palata.

Bombers and fighters attacked Poydonika air base in Yugoslavia yesterday.

St James and Stewart Go Over Loan Top

St. James is the first community in this district to go over the top in the Victory Loan drive. It is the second community to achieve its objective.

RALE IN HIGH LOW

Realize That Hitler Has Lost War and Would Like to Surrender.

EDINBURGH, Scotland, Oct. 26 - Members of war, returning from Germany, say that the German knows that he has lost the war and would end the war today if it were not for Hitler and his Gestapo. The morale in Germany is low on account of the continual bombing of cities and the Russian front.

Trade Unions and Socialism . . .

Canadian Business says the wedding of the Canadian Congress of Labor with the C.C.F. may or may not involve a hazy, pink honeymoon stage.

There are ambitious men at the top of each movement. The word is that each expects to exploit the other and is confident of being able to do so.

But, eventually, the thoughtful amongst the trade unionists are going to begin asking about the future of trade unionism in that collectivist kind of society envisioned by the C.C.F.

There are only three countries that have been, recently, as totalitarian as the ideal country contemplated by the C.C.F. In each of these countries, by remarkable coincidence, trade unions were wholly abolished as free, democratic organizations to "whop it up" for the government and then gradually died.

Yet each of these governments was created allegedly in the interest of the working man. Each claimed to be guided by the tenets of socialism.

The hard fact of the matter is that socialism is dictatorship. If a so-called socialist government does not maintain a dictatorship, then it is not practising socialism but only a bobtailed variety of democracy made the worse for the mutilation.

If the leaders of the Canadian Congress of Labor are ambitious to establish a dictatorial type of government which they would control—if they are out to run the country as top dogs in a collectivist system, that's one thing. If they are not power-hungry but want to make permanent the gains of organized labor in a free and democratic society, that is another. In one case they should support and then try to supplant the leaders of the C.C.F. In the other, they should regard the C.C.F. socialist doctrines as fatal to the existence of a free labor movement.

Even now, every move of the Canadian Congress of Labor will be politically suspect. Its soul is no longer its own.

VICTORY CONCERT

Fine Show in Support of Loan Put on by Forces Sunday Night

(By DOROTHY GARBUTT) Sunday night's concert at the Capitol Theatre was a very worthy and entertaining effort by the troops to interest their comrades in arms in the Fifth Victory Loan. The idea in the first place was conceived by Lieut. D. M. Davies who worked very hard getting suitable talent for the program. The patriotic note was executed in pageant form, each symbolic character being introduced by Chester le Maistre as narrator. The script for the narrative was by Chester le Maistre and Dorothy Garbutt.

Participating in the Navy, Army, CWACS, RCAF and Wd's, represented by Dan Wintink, Pte. Bill Adair, Pte. Joyce Onions, LAC Lloyd Fraser and LAC Eleanor Sloan the various Canadian nationalities were ushered in, each performer offering a typical example of the art of the race he depicted. First was English Canada and, typifying this, Frances Moore played a medley of patriotic airs "The Maple Leaf Forever," "Land of Hope and Glory" and "Rule Britannia." French Canada had an able exponent in Sergeant Aubrey who, to my mind, is the exact spirit of a jovial, carefree French Canadian. He led the singing of the famous "Allouette," with a wealth of anatomical allusions new to me in the song. The audience loved it. His score was a merry little tune the words of which escaped me but I'm sure it had to do with a miss, a kiss, the moon and June. That's the same in every language, the word's don't really count. Scotch Canada was by

way of being a bagpipe solo by Sergeant William MacCubbin who played the ever popular "Road to the Isles." Irish Canada was a case in point that all Scotsmen were once Irishmen when a Mr. MacPher-r-r-son sang two lovely Irish airs—"Danny Boy" and "The Mountains of Mourne" and sang them very beautifully. He was accompanied at the piano by Clare Davis. After this Western Canada was given a spot on its own when Pte. Johnny Erickson sang three cowboy songs, accompanying himself on the guitar. Johnny has the modest, quiet manner of the real Westerner and backs it up with some of the best singing and yodelling we've heard at the Capitol. His first was "Tumbling Tumbleweed," followed by the haunting "Ride, Tenderfoot Ride" and as his encore, he sang and yodelled "Swiss onlight Lullaby." The applause was thunderous. Ending this part of the program came a figure striding across the stage as Prince Rupert—a figure clad in macintosh, rubber boots and complete with umbrella.

A comedy interlude followed showing young Canada listening with complete apathy, boredom and indifference to a lecture which merited nothing but complete apathy, boredom and indifference.

A colorful Pageant of Nations came next in which girls from Booth Memorial High School, dressed in costume, portrayed the following nations—Belgium by Vicki Meuffels, Poland by Katie Didaksen, Norway by Lillian Knutson, Greece by Elizabeth Ladicos, the Ukraine by Sally Skooy and China by Bessie Lee. A most interesting angle was that each girl who enacted her country actually had the blood of that country in her veins—a living commentary on a united Canada. These young ladies were chaperoned by Miss Jones of the Booth teaching staff and appeared by kind permission of Mr. O'Neill, principal of the Booth Memorial High School.

Great credit is due Mr. Davies for his enthusiasm and clever working out of a timely and patriotic concert and to Chester le Maistre and Merwyn Thomas for their various suggestions for the performance. Stage direction was by Chester le Maistre and make-up, which in each instance was suitable to the nationality was by Carleton Clay, an expert in this line through years of experience in theatrical work.
