It is easy to overestimate the effects of defeat on the German mind. For many Germans will be tempted to think not so much of the destruction of the Nazi hopes as of the triumphs that preceded it. The Nazis set out to conquer Europe and the German of the next generation will remind himself how nearly they succeeded; how little of Europe escaped their armies; on what narrow accidents important events depended; how skilfully they organized the economic life of most of the continent of Europe to serve their plans. It is true that the war came home to the German people as the last war never did but the Germans will persuade themselves that, with a little more skill and a little better luck, they would have won the war in the first two years before their cities and their factories had to suffer from our bombs. Not much, then, can be trusted in the future to the impressions left by defeat and disaster.


