LONDON, Dec. 29-A joint communique from the British Admiralty and Air Ministry revealed that naval units and coastal command aircraft attacked a nazi force in the Bay of Biscay waters off the French coast and sunk three Nazi destroyers.

Finishing Off German Battleship.

CITY OFFERED USE UF U.S. INCINEKATUR

The United States government has offered to extend the hours of operation at the newly city limits to take care of garbage collected in the city of to whom the offer is addressed, planned the naval phase of the less objectionable sea gulls.

The incinerator which has Air Marshal Tedder. been established by the United' States government has a capacity of seventy tons per day and is now burning about twentyfive tons daily originating from the United States forces and installations here as well as at Port Edward in addition to the garbage from the army, navy and air force at Prince Rupert. It is a model plant developing great heat capable of consuming all types of garbage except ashes, glass and non-combusti ble materials in large quantities

The United States authorities are offering to take care of municipal garbage subject to the conditions that the city pay for all water and light consumed at the plant and that the garbage delivered to the plant be dry and free of the non-combustibles such as asnes and glass.

To facilitate the use of the type of the sanitary trucks operated by the city, the United States is ready to construct a ramp to the unloading platform tual cost of constructing the

At the present time the city is burning — or attempting to burn-its garbage alongside the modern incinerator in its crude and inefficient dump, an inspection of which yesterday revealed an unsightly and smelly mess.

STORMING CITIES LONDON, Dec. 29 (CP)—Six days after Soviet troops had regained the offensive, the Red Army today stormed the outer defences of Zhitomir and Koroseten, strategic junction points on the Leningrad Odessa railway, 80 miles west of the Ukrainian capital of Kiev. Dispatches from the front placed one Soviet spearhead within ten miles of Zhitomir after sweeping through Korostishev and Smolovka Heavy Soviet field guns

are softening the city's de-MOSCOW, Dec. 29, (P) - The Red Army, advancing all along the line, swung southwest of Kiev yesterday in a new plunge toward Rumania and the old Polish border, cutting two railroads out of the German's fast dwindling network of communications and threatening the flank of enemy forces along the lower Dnieper river.

The Pussians' spectacular odvance through the town of Andrushevka, 120 miles from the Rumanian frontier, was preceded by terrific artillery barrages. It carried Russian troops forward approximately 40 miles * from the starting point of the offensive in the Brusilov sector to within 15 miles of the Zhitomir-Odessa lateral railway

This strategic railroad which Nazi Marshal Fritz Von Mannstein cleared at heavy cost by his ill-fated November tank onslaught, was again in imminent danger according to front line despatches.

Todays report said that sixty more communities have been overrun in the latest forward sweep of the Russian Army west of Kiev and the Russian troops are now only one hundred and fifteen miles from the border of Rumania.

The Russian Baltic Army has beaten back eighteen German counter-attacks to capture several populated places in northern white Rusia on the approaches to Vitebsk.
