

Canada's Home Front Turns Giant Spruce Into Bomber Timber on Queen Charlotte Islands Near Prince Rupert



Canadian lumberjacks are striving to cut 200,000,000 feet of spruce log this year, much of it airplane Sitka spruce from Queen Charlotte Islands, just 50 miles from the Alaskan border.

Train takes logs to the inlet where they are floated into huge rafts. The lumbermen daily walk five miles through bush to work. Lumbermen work ten hours a day at muscle-building toil,

Canada's Synthetic Rubber . . .

The announcement of the Minister of Munitions and Supply that a plant will be opened late this year at Sarnia, Ontario, for the making of synthetic rubber in quantity which would be sufficient to meet the Dominion's lin. normal peacetime requirements is gratifying indeed. It seems to indicate that the rubber crisis has been settled and that we may soon be independent of the necessity for raw rubber which we must import. Thus one of the pressing economic problems of the war has been solved.

Of course, it is not to be implied that there will be any immediately complete relief for the general rubber shortage. We shall have to continue conserving for the war effort our existing supplies and anything we are capable of making as long as the conflict lasts. As far as the normal civil requirements are concerned, it will be some time before any material relief will be apparent although a few more tires and such like may be available after a time.

Methyl Hydrate . . .

Drinking of methyl hydrate, which has been resorted to by some of the more chronic inebriates of late, is held responsible for the death of a man in the course of a drinking orgy on the local waterfront. The authorities have effectively restricted the sale and consumption of liquor, with benefits which are quite apparent. There is also control of the sale of drugs and other harmful stimulants. There seems to be no reason why the distribution of such articles as methyl hydrate and extracts should not also be brought under similar control. Already the city council of Prince Rupert has had this matter up. It is to be hoped that they will be speedily able to obtain the desired results.

Civilian Rights . . .

Many local people quite strongly feel that it is time again to remind the powers having control of such matters that even here in Prince Rupert the civilian population, who after all are responsible for and are the backbone of the community, should have some well defined rights of security therein. There have been actions, which under special powers measures may be quite legal in the final analysis, but which have been considered to verge on the borders of highhandedness.

Prince Rupert people, we think, have, generally speaking, showed every willingness and desire to co-operate with the authorities in connection with the prosecution of the war in its various phases. They have shown a spiri of give and take, courtesy and consideration. Undoubtedly, they are justified in expecting to be treated likewise. sion for out-and-out highandedness.

No one should know better than the authorities themselves that tactful negotiation and mutual understanding carried on along courteous business lines can usually accomplish the desired results without resorting to procedure bringing about misunderstanding and bad feelings. Bureaucratic coercion is one of the things we are fighting against and we are justified, we believe, in contending that it should be kept out of our dealings even in the emergency of war unless it is extremely necessary.





"Shock Troops" Drain Reich's Best Workers.

BERNE, Switzerland, June 18 The German Army is being reorganized; an effort is being made to replace traditional Prussian automatism with the individualism and personal resourcefulness that characterize the fighting forces of the decadent democracies."

The reform of the Reichswehr is being carried out through the "total mobilization" by which the new German General Staff is combing 1,000,000 men out of the civilian ropulation. The central idea of this reform is to break up the infantry into a large number of small groups or "shock troops" instead of the previous company system. A shock troop will not have more than 20

The individual soldier in these new units will be a highly specialized fighter, with special training in close combat, the use of all technical weapons, and in pioneering Production Difficulties

A widespread opinion in Germany is that if the German Army doesn't succeed in eliminating the Russians this summer next winter will be very bad and may result in defeat for Germany. This opin-


