EXPANDING NEW UNIT APPROVED

Local Ack-Ack Company Discussed By Canadian Legion—Other Matters Up

The recruiting drive for an anti-aircraft company to be established in connection with the Prince Rupert Machine Gun Regiment was discussed by regular monthly meeting on Wednesday in the club rooms and approval was expressed.

Applications were received from a goodly number of ex-service men who wished to join their comrades in furthering the work which the Legion does in the interest of the ex-serviceman and the public generally.

Capt. Grant, past commander of the Canadian Legion in the State of California, was present and, when called upon for a few words, proved to be a most interesting and accomplished speaker.

After the meeting closed a pleasant hour was spent around the refreshment table.

R.A.F.'s "Chum" Goes "Grounded"

Twice Dug Out of Crashes Faithful Dog is Finally Through Flying

SOMEWHERE IN ENGLAND, June 11 — Happy days of bombing raids are over for Chum, grounded now because high-altitude flying affected his great heart.

Three years ago Chum, a 10-year-old cross between a sheep dog and a greyhound, made his first flight after sneaking on a Royal Air Force station so often he was eventually allowed to stay.

Twice they dug him out after crashes. Only once Chum refused to fly. He jumped from an aircraft before it took off and could not be tempted to re-enter. The plane crashed in flames.

Invariably, as soon as Chum hopped into an aircraft he jumped on a bunk and stayed there. When evasive action flung him from the bunk, he merely yawned and climbed back again.

Ministerial Ass'n Meets

Moral Conditions in City Are Discussed — Service Chaplains Are Welcomed

Moral conditions in the city and measures that might be taken to meet them were discussed at the regular monthly meeting this week of the Prince Rupert Ministerial Association.

Three service chaplains — Capt. Miller, new area padre; Capt. Rowlands of the United States Army, and Flight Lieutenant Springborne of the Royal Canadian Air Force — were welcomed.

Very Rev. James B. Gibson, D.D., the president of the association, was in the chair and Rev. A. F. MacSween acted as secretary in the absence of Rev. C. A. Wright.

Regular meetings of the association are suspended for the summer months and will be resumed in September.

Dominion Day On Usual Date

OTTAWA, June 11—Dominion Day will be observed as usual on Thursday, July 1 and not on Monday, July 5, as had been suggested, the cabinet council decided yesterday.

BUSINESS EXTENDED

TransCanada Now Serving Twenty-Four Points in Dominion

MONTREAL, June 11— The extension of the Trans-Canada Air Lines transcontinental route to Victoria brings to twenty-four the number of points in Canada for which air express service is provided by Canada's national air line according to an announcement today by G. E. Bellrose, general manager of TransCanada Air Lines.

"We established air express between Montreal, Ottawa, Toronto, Winnipeg, Regina, Lethbridge, Edmonton and Vancouver in October, 1938," Mr. Bellrose said, "and this has grown from the original eight centres to 24, from the Atlantic to the Pacific with direct connections to and from points in Newfoundland and in the United States."

Mr. Bellrose stated that arrangements are in effect between Trans-Canada Air Lines and the Pan American Airways for the transportation of traffic in air express between points in Canada and those served by the Pan-American Airways in Cuba, Central and South America as well as certain islands in the Caribbean Sea.

Trans-Canada Air Lines express services also have air express connections with the American air lines via Dallas, Texas, to Monterey, Mexico and Mexico City.

Pick-up and delivery service and all other group work on air express traffic of Trans-Canada Air Lines is performed by the Canadian National Express and that company's operating, traffic and accounting officials serve in a like capacity for Trans-Canada Air Lines express services and to handle the volume of express traffic offering, it has been necessary to appoint air express agents at the principal airports.

"The development of express traffic over our air lines since its inception has been remarkable," Mr. Bellrose said. "During the year 1942 the total number of shipments handled by Trans-Canada Express was almost four times as large as in the year 1939 and the total weight of express traffic carried was seven times greater. In 1939 we handled 11,076 shipments weighing 51,408 pounds while last year we handled 40,501 shipments with a total weight of 387,318 pounds. This growth is steadily continuing as indicated by the figures for the first four months of the present year when he handled 17,688 shipments totalling 214,857 pounds as compared with 10,268 shipments weighing 67,994 pounds during the first four months of 1942.

"Traffic carried by T. C. A. air express consists very largely of commodities vital to the war effort and war industry, medicinal supplies, machine and other repair parts, building plans and considerable material for war plants and military establishments.

LOS ANGELES DISORDERS WASHINGTON—Serious disorders between service men and civilians in the Los Angeles area are to be investigated by the State Department.

DRIVE FOR RECRUITS

Plans Made For Campaign Next Week to Enlist One Hundred Men for Anti-aircraft Guns Here

Plans for an intensive campaign next week for the recruiting of one hundred men for an anti-aircraft company to be formed in connection with the Prince Rupert Machine Gun Regiment were made at a meeting or representative citizens last evening with Col. J. W. Nicholls presiding.

Features of the recruiting drive will include exhibitions of anti-aircraft weapons on Monday Tuesday and Wednesday evenings of next week on Third Avenue in front of the Post Office where a recruiting hut will be kept open on each of those days for the receiving of attestations.

Col. Nicholls spoke of the need of men, particularly for the anti-aircraft guns which would be the most likely weapons to come into action here as any attack that would receive army pay on the basis of parades attended.

Sergeant Tony Ainsley, G. R. S. Blackaby and Dr. R. C. Bamford were appointed a committee to make arrangements for radio broadcasting, G. W. Cripps will make arrangements in connection with the recruiting hut.

NEWS FROM JAPAN LONDON, June 11 — Vatican radio in a broadcast heard here said that information on British prisoners in Japanese hands may soon be made available through a radio-telephone contact between the Apostolic Delegate in Tokyo and the Vatican.

TIPPING BUTCHER ILLEGAL LONDON, June 11 — British shoppers who "slip the butcher or the grocer" an occasional shilling have been warned by the Food Ministry that such tips constitute "secret commissions" and are punishable offences.

Strategic Mediterranean Base Point For Drive On Italy Is Taken by Allies

LONDON, June 11—The Italian defenders of Pantelleria Islands in the Mediterranean to the west of Sicily have surrendered and the islands, which for nineteen days had been subjected to continuous intensive bombardment, first by air and during the last few days by the navy as well, have been occupied by the Allies.

Following the processional as the graduates moved into their seats in the auditorium with Miss Janet Rochester acting as pianist, there was the singing of "O Canada" after which Rev. E. W. Scott read from the scriptures.

NO LOVE IS LOST

Chinese Wholesale Grocer Won't Do Business with Japs

VANCOUVER, June 11—That no love is lost between the Chinese and Japanese, even in local circles, is illustrated by an incident that happened here yesterday.

A Chinese wholesale grocer received an order from a Japanese at Tashme, evacuation centre near Hope. The order was filled by a clerk in the wholesale grocery and dispatched for shipment to the Canadian National Railway freight terminal here.

The Chinese truck driver returned to the wholesale and gave "the Boss" the railway bills of lading, said boss hit the roof. The Canadian National Railway received an urgent phone call: "Stop load freight car. I make big mistake. I sell grocery to damn Jap. I want get my freight back. I send truck quick."

With the increase in strength comes many new problems for the Navy League and not the least of these will be financing. Sea Cadets corps have now come directly under the aegis of the Department of Naval Affairs and the drill hall of the Navy here has now been made available for the weekly training parades of the Cadet Corps, naval instructors also being provided.

Annual reports of the chairman, R. M. Winslow, and Lieut. Commander Alex Mitchell revealed the activities and success of the Sea Cadets work carried on during the past year and suggested plans for the future.

The financial statement of the secretary-treasurer, Alex McRae, showed the branch to be in good shape in this respect not that members had been called upon to any extent during the year but because new expenditures were small and as the annual tag day had done exceptionally well.

"Our Sea Cadet Corps," said the annual report of Mr. Winslow, the chairman, "despite various discouraging conditions, carried on and actually improved in members, discipline, training and morale but the credit particularly falls to Lieut. Commander Alex Mitchell and his officers. A notable item of progress during the year was in connection with the drum and bugle band which had been largely financed by the efforts of the cadets themselves. In this connection appreciation was due to L. S. A. Murray Jane, Rev. E. W. Scott and James McGlashan had assisted very materially in instruction work and Theo Fortune at target practice. As for recreation and entertainment, thanks were due to D. G. Borland of the Capitol Theatre, the management of the "Y" Cafeteria

and Y. M. C. A. war services. There had been helpful direction and co-operation from Lieut. Commander Glasco and his assistant, Lieut. Hooper.

The question of providing cadet instruction in the schools was raised and it was decided to consult with the board of school trustees in this matter.

The inauguration of a Women's Auxiliary in connection with the Navy League Branch is still under consideration, a delegation of ladies having been present at last night's meeting.

A vote of thanks was passed to the Canadian Legion for having made the hall available for last night's meeting was passed.

Lieut. Commander Mitchell announced at the meeting that the annual church parade of the Sea Cadet Corps would be held this coming Sunday.

The address to the graduating class was given by Rev. A. F. MacSween whose remarks were both appropriate and inspiring. Diplomas were presented to the students one by one by Jack Deane, chairman of the board of school trustees, after which Col. F. T. Fahey, director of technical education for the province, spoke briefly. The class valedictorian was Alistair Crerar who acquitted himself creditably. The graduation song "All Out for Canada" was distinctive since it was written especially for the occasion by Miss May Skinner, one of the class. Its singing was followed by the National Anthem.

Graduation was one of those momentous occasions in a person's life, Mr. MacSween said. It was a moment in which the graduate might feel justly proud for it gave proof of ability and industry, the reaching of a height that was not easily attained. 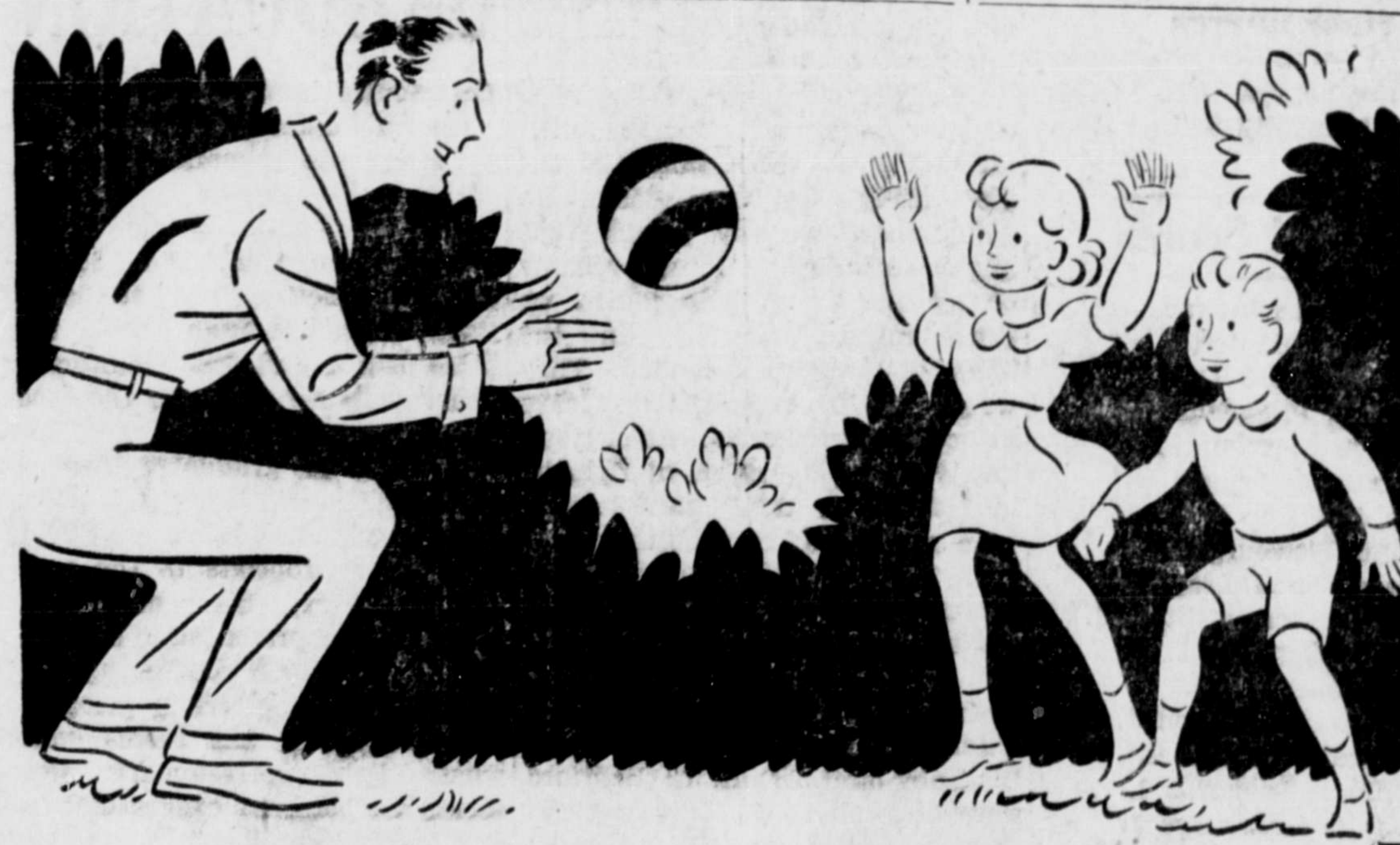



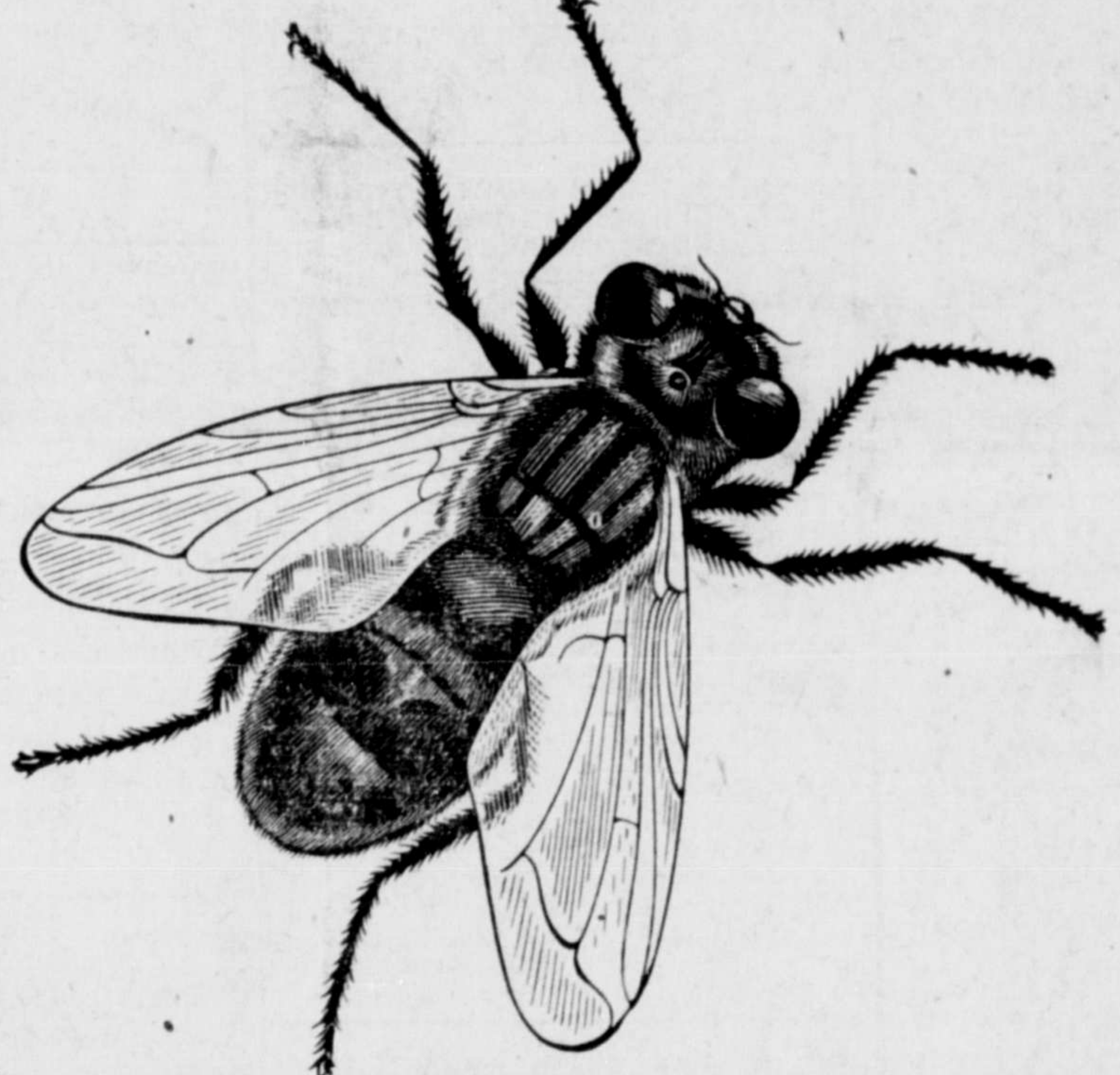
