WAR NEWS

POUNDING AWAY AT SICILY

ALLIED HEADQUARTERS IN NORTH AFRICA — British and American bombers since Wednesday have continued the massive assault on Sicily, wreaking destruction from one end of the island to the other. Not a single air field escaped. Great fires were reported everywhere and many enemy planes were riddled with gun fire. Messina and Palermo were among principal objectives. Royal Air Force night bombers attacked Axis barracks and a railway station at Cagliari in southern Sardinia before dawn yesterday without loss, it was announced today.

SWEEPS OVER FRANCE

LONDON—Eight enemy fighters were destroyed by Royal Air Force Spitfires and American fighters in separate sweeps over Northern France and the Low Countries late yesterday, it was announced today. Britain passed the night without an alert, rounding out a full week since this country has seen an enemy plane.

AXIS SHIPS SUNK

LONDON—British submarines have sunk four and possibly five more Axis ships in the Mediterranean.

RUSSIANS TAKE POSITION

MOSCOW — The Red Army has taken an important hill position near Velliki Luki on the central front, following through to make further advances. Air activity against German positions in the Western Caucasus has been resumed by the Russians.

ITALY IS HIT AGAIN

Messina and Reggio Calabria Pounded on Monday Night

ALLIED HEADQUARTERS IN NORTH AFRICA, July 2 (CP)—The Royal Air Force's night ranging bombers returned to attack Messina Monday night. Allied headquarters announced, and bombs were seen to drop on the ferry terminal and marshalling yards in that eastern Sicilian port. Other bombers from eastern Mediterranean bases attacked the Italian mainland ferry terminus at Reggio Calabria Monday night.

No Inferiority of Gentler Sex—Take Part in All Activities—Example to Canada

Soviet Russia is the land where the woman is the real equal of the man, taking her part on equal terms in practically every line of endeavour, the Women's Canadian Club heard on Wednesday night at a meeting in St. Andrew's Cathedral Hall where the speaker was Mrs. Gertrude Baskine, scholar, poetess and pianist, wife of a Russian and an extensive traveler throughout the Soviet Republic. Mrs. Baskine, who is at present residing in Toronto, is on a lecture tour for the Canadian Club organization. A large audience listened to her discourse Wednesday night and was keenly interested in a description of Russia which presented a picture vastly different from the conception which many have had of that vast land. Mrs. J. A. Rutherford, president of the club, was in the chair.

TRAITOR TO SERVE LIFE

WASHINGTON, July 2 (CP)—President Roosevelt drew Max Stephan, Detroit traitor back from the gallows from which he was to be hanged today, and commuted sentence to life imprisonment. The former restaurant owner was convicted of harboring and assisting Oberleutenant Hans Peter Krug, Nazi flier, who escaped from a Canadian Prisoner's camp at Bowmanville, Ontario.

KILLED IN ACCIDENT

A. B. Armstrong, Pioneer of Stewart and Alice Arm, Loses His Life Near Premier

Albert B. (Ernie) Armstrong, well known pioneer of northern mining camps, particularly Stewart and Alice Arm, was instantly killed about noon on Monday of this week in an accident near Premier. He was engaged with a crew which was tearing down a bridge and was working beneath the structure when timbers collapsed and crushed him to death. The body was removed to Stewart where Mr. Armstrong had resided for years and where an inquest and funeral took place.

Mr. Armstrong was about sixty years of age and, before going to Stewart, had been located for some time at Alice Arm. He had been with the Crawford Transportation Co. both at Alice Arm and Stewart and later went into packing business for himself. More recently he had been in the service of the Premier Gold Mining Co. He was widely and favorably known in the north and many will learn with regret of his tragic passing.

Besides his widow at Stewart Mr. Armstrong is survived by two daughters Gladys and Kathleen both at Vancouver at present.

work, enjoying equal pay and equal privileges.

Second, woman could be elected to any legislative or government position.

In 1917, 85 per cent of the women of Russia did not know how to read or write, 55 per cent of them were in domestic service and 25 per cent were on the farms. Little more than 20 years later in 1939 there was not a position in the country that women were not in including the direction of agriculture, industry and business. Now only two per cent of the women were in domestic service while they occupied 25 to 30 per cent of the professional pursuits. Women were judges and engineers and more than half the Russian doctors were women. They held one-third of legislative seats.

So important a part was the Russian woman playing in the national life that her transition from peace to wartime conditions in 1941 had been smooth and natural.

There was no distinction of labor in Russia today. There was no kind of work that was considered exclusively men's or exclusively women's. Even in the steel mills, the mines, transportation and merchant marine women participated. The national heroines — "the glamor girls"—of Russia were not the moving picture actresses but the women who made records in the industries or the professions.

Never Before in War Has This Area Witnessed Such Co-ordinated Blows of Power, Speed and Surprise

ALLIED HEADQUARTERS IN AUSTRALIA, July 2 (CP)—Artillery shelling of the big Japanese air base at Munda in the Central Solomons, destruction of 123 enemy planes and consolidation everywhere along a 700-mile front of Allied gains under a canopy of bombers and fighters were announced today as successes in the as yet young offensive in the South Pacific. Never before in this war has this area witnessed such co-ordinated blows of power, speed and surprise struck by Allied navy, ground troops and planes under command of General Douglas MacArthur.

CANADA FOR CANADIANS

Gyro Club Speaker Would Deplore All Who Fail to Become Good Citizens—Expel All Japs

In two sectors of action—New Guinea and the Solomons—most immediate progress was reported for the eastern arm of the two-pronged drive.

A communique disclosed that United States forces which landed Wednesday on Rendova Island had destroyed the small Japanese garrison there by midday and, within two hours after debarking, were firing shore batteries at Munda air base five miles away. Seizure of the only harbor in the New Georgia sector, Viru, 30 miles from Munda, was also announced.

Further to the east there were heavy aerial attacks on the Japanese bases of Salamaua and Lae on New Guinea and Rabaul on New Britain.

On Wednesday United States and Japanese airmen fought a fierce battle over Munda as the Japanese tried to oppose the landing of the American on Rendova Island, five miles distant, in the central Solomons. Sixty-five out of 110 Japanese planes were shot down, according to the first reports, and 17 United States machines were lost. The Japanese threw every type of aircraft—medium bombers, dive bombers and zeros—into the fight.

Some of the enemy machines were bagged by naval gunners from warships which participated in the Rendova landing operations which appear to have been the first stage of a new offensive operation against Japanese positions in the South Pacific.

The 7,700-ton United States transport McAuley was lost, being crippled by an aerial torpedo and then sunk by a submarine. All on board the transport had previously been landed.

The United States Navy announced that the combined American forces, in making the landing, had achieved all primary objectives on Rendova although fierce resistance was encountered as a start was made to move inland. Soon, however, the garrison had been destroyed and the occupation completed. The Japs have had installations on Rendova Isl. Whether or not the landing was accomplished by surprise is not known. In any case, it was opposed and developed for a time into fierce fighting.

The strategic intent of the American move, except for its generally offensive nature in advancing American positions in the Solomons, 110 miles northwest of the outpost in the Russell Islands, is not fully apparent. Capture by the American of Veru Bay on New Georgia Island is also announced while two islands between New Georgia and the Solomons have been taken as well.

President W. J. Scott was in the chair at Wednesday's luncheon and expressed the appreciation of the club to Mr. Cameron for his address. Guests were Corp. Barney Bay and Sergeant Major Daly.

to "culture." Even in the besieged cities of war theatres, ballets and libraries must be kept in operation.

How women captained ships of the merchant marine, manned the bombing planes and took otherwise active part in the prosecution of the war was described by the speaker. Women too were among the greatest of the guerrilla fighters and saboteurs. They might be subjected to the cruelest of torture, even to death itself, but never had they been known to betray their comrades.

In spite of the activity of women in all other pursuits, there was still real home life in Russia. There were still babies for the population had tripled. The family was still a unit in society. Here the organization of institutions to take care of children while their mothers worked were described. The children were kept in institutions close to the industrial establishments so there was no real separation from the mothers. Two months before her baby was born and two months after the mother had time off from her work with full pay.

From the start in education the Russian child was taught co-operation and brotherhood, teamwork rather than individualism, respect for the property of the people as being the property of the state and, therefore, their own. There was today a universal educational system. University education was available to all whose intellectual capacity warranted it but stiff entrance examinations had to be passed. Universities were considered strictly places of study and there were no fraternities or sports.

Mrs. Baskine made it clear that there was no equality of salaries or wages. Those of the highest attainments and those giving the most able service got the highest wages.

In their belief of the state being first, material comfort was the last thing the Soviet government of Russia had given to the people.

In Russia women were given their rightful position as a 50 per cent physical and mental factor. Women were conscious of their citizenship. Women of Canada, still passive, inactive and inarticulate, might well take a lesson from them.

Could Do No Worse
"See what the men have made of the world! Could the women do much worse?" asked the speaker. "Let women take their place as citizens, not only as mothers and wives. Let women take part in the peace treaties. Maybe then their sons will not have to go to war again 25 or 30 years hence!"

Following the address, Mrs. Baskine answered a number of questions which were put by members of the audience.

Miss Patricia McClymont, before Mrs. Baskine was called upon to speak, favored the gathering with a piano solo.

Mrs. C. E. Cullin presided at the piano to accompany the singing of "O Canada" and "God Save the King."

Police Court Fines Higher

More Cases were Tried in City Police Court During Past Month.

Misdemeanors were more numerous during June than during May according to the police court record, with 89 cases tried last month as against 72 cases in May. In June, the culprits dug down to the tune of \$1,455 in fines while in May collections were a mere \$954. June fine collections were the highest of any month so far this year.

The total of police court fines collected in the six month period just ended is \$5805.25. Last year the total collections to the end of June were somewhat higher, with \$6332.75 being collected.

Human frailty, however, contributed only \$133.75 to the public coffers during June 1942.

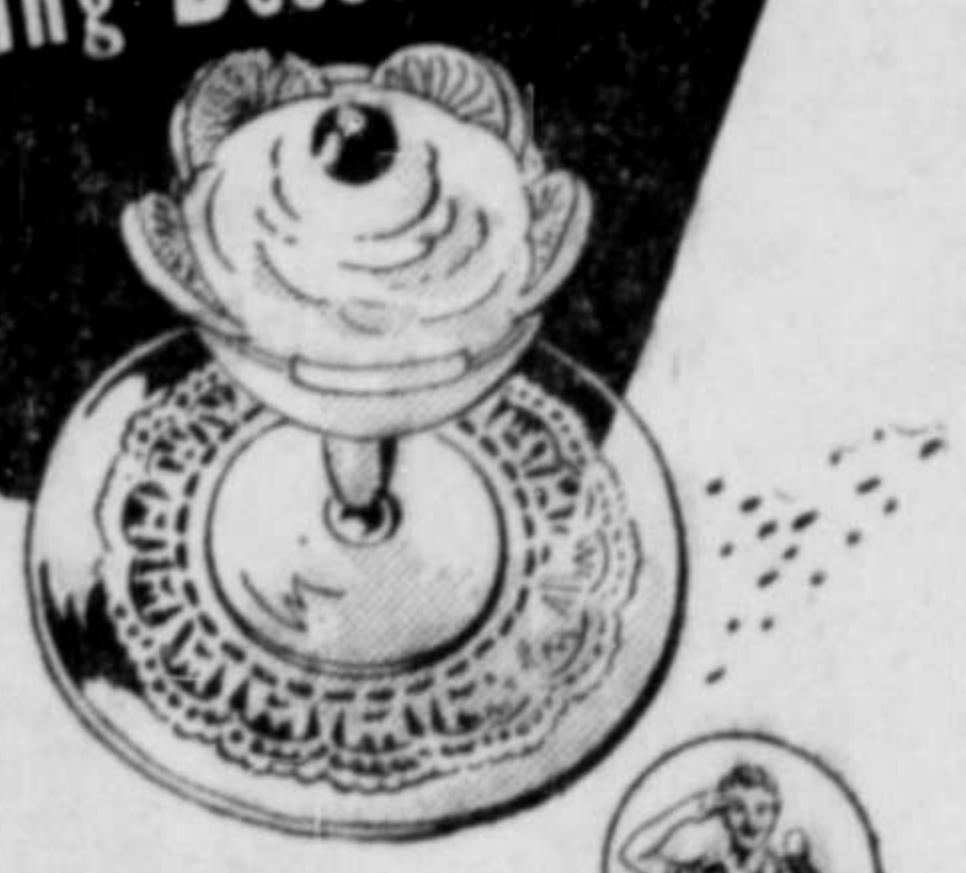

Meat Coupons

The law provides that book-holders when purchasing meat must surrender at the time of purchase to the seller, valid meat Coupons. It is, therefore, illegal for merchants to issue, or book-holders to accept, LOU's or any form of credit slip or token for meat for later supply. In other words, if the purchase of meat does not equal the full Coupon value, small balances must be either ignored or taken in such easy "make weight" items as sausages, hamburger, etc.

Removal of Coupons

While it is illegal for anyone to present loose Coupons when purchasing rationed goods, the law allows the book holder to remove Coupons in the presence of the merchant or his employee. This practice may be preferable when purchasing meat. It not only assists the merchant but may prevent your ration book from becoming soiled.
