

Churchill Promises Second Front

Many Workers Are Frozen To Jobs Mass Invasion of Europe Also Pledged by Premier In Confident Speech

New Control Measure Announced

Provincial Govt. Control Is Proposed

War Industries and Essential Civilian Industries Cannot Change Without Permission—News-papers in High Priority List.

OTTAWA, Sept. 21 (CP)—A new control measure keeping employees of high priority industries at their present jobs was announced late Monday by Labor Minister Humphrey Mitchell.

The latest regulations, amounting to virtual "freezing" of male workers in "A" and "B" priority categories, require that men in these categories may not be released by employers and may not be given separation to their jobs without first obtaining written permission of select committees.

The order was effective yesterday and the minister's announcement said that the two top priorities include all war industries and essential civilian services including delivery of fuel in food processing and meat packing plants and many others.

Production of newspapers and circulation of news is also included in the list.

MAN IS QUITTED

McKay Freed at Supreme Court Assizes on Breach and Entering Charge.

James McKay, Indian, was acquitted at the session of the Supreme Court Assizes here yesterday afternoon on a charge of breaking and entering the home of Henry Helin at Port Moody with intent to commit assault. The jury reached a verdict of acquittal after deliberating for half an hour.

The crown's case was that McKay broke into the Helin home and armed himself with a knife from the kitchen. McKay went into a bedroom and hid. Mrs. Maude Helin, alone at the time, had retired, brandishing the weapon. It was essential to the satisfaction of the jury that accused had been seen and that there was no doubt of intent.

There were five witnesses for the crown and one for the defence. Mrs. Thomas McKay, sister-in-law of accused, gave evidence as brief as were addresses of counsel and summing up by Mr. Justice Bird. W. O. Fulton acted as crown counsel with T. W. Brown for the defence.

The jury retired at 4:20 p.m. and returned half an hour later with the verdict.

Ald. H. M. Daggett felt it was dark enough in Prince Rupert without any dimout and he moved that the necessary representations be made to have the dimout lifted. This was seconded by Ald. T. H. Sorensen and carried. Ald. McKay felt the dim-out was a definite menace in Prince Rupert.

WAR NEWS

HISTORIC VENICE BOMBED

ALLIED HEADQUARTERS IN NORTH AFRICA — Heavy bombers threw new weight into the conquest of Italy by bombarding the historic port of Venice as French troops and island guerillas proceeded today to mop up German resistance on Corsica and the Fifth Army registered new gains on the Salerno beachhead.

REDS ARE STORMING ON

LONDON—Blasting into the Smolensk defence zone to outflank that German central front anchor, the Red Army stormed on today from captured Velizh, 65 miles to the northwest, while further south they slashed across the Kiev-Chernigov highway on the middle Dnieper River and cut the main Crimean escape railway between Zaporozhe and Dnieper Petrovsk. Today the capture of Chernigov was announced by the Russians in a Reuters dispatch. Chernigov is 77 miles northeast of Kiev.

NAZIS RUSH TO BALKANS

LONDON—The Germans reported tonight to be rushing thirty divisions aggregating more than 250,000 men to Italy and the Balkans to protect themselves from a growing Allied menace to the southern flank. Twenty-four divisions are said to have gone to the Balkans and others to Italy.

Sailors Set Upon Beer Parlor Host

Assault With Intent to Rob Charge Follows Session in Refreshment Resort.

A party of sailors drank beer in a refreshment parlor with August Kuitala a few days ago and, noticing that he appeared to be "staky", later set upon him with intent to rob, it was suggested in city police court yesterday in the evidence of a case in which Howard Adolf Pipin, Walter Daniel Jack and James Findlay McDicken were charged with assault. Pipin was convicted and fined \$150 with option of thirty days' imprisonment. Jack was also convicted but, owing to his youth, was given suspended sentence. The charge against McDicken was dismissed. Kuitala was knocked down near the Canadian National Railway wharf ramp and his wallet taken but the escapee was interfered with by a naval sentry and the assailants, in their attempt to make a getaway, threw away the wallet and \$50 which was found on the dock.

Labor Minister Knows Situation

Ald. J. S. Black Tells City Council of Recent Interview in Quebec.

If something is not done by the federal authorities to relieve the stress placed on this city and its public works and utilities by the conditions imposed by war it will not be because the members of the government are unaware of the situation, Ald. J. S. Black told the city council last night when asked if he had contacted any government authorities during a recent trip east to attend the annual Trades and Labor Congress sessions in Quebec.

Ald. Black said he had had occasion to meet the minister of labor, Hon. Humphrey Mitchell, and had been interested to find that Mr. Mitchell, who displayed keen interest, already realized the position this city was in. However, Ald. Black had endeavored to let Mr. Mitchell know as fully as possible the state of labor and municipal conditions.

Fuel Emergency Is Declared By Local Council

The local city council last night endorsed a resolution of the British Columbia shipyard conference declaring that a national fuel emergency existed and demanding action from the federal government for the building up of a supply. The resolution declared that the fuel shortage was such that war industries might be seriously affected to say nothing of the fact that there was no assurance of a domestic supply. On motion of Ald. Black, seconded by Ald. Brett, the resolution was endorsed.

TELLS OF MUSSOLINI'S NARROW ESCAPE — REVEALS PLAN FOR CONFERENCE BETWEEN HIMSELF, ROOSEVELT AND STALIN

LONDON, Sept. 21 (CP)—Prime Minister Winston Churchill declared today that a second front will be thrown open "at the right time and mass invasion from the continent will begin." Calling the Mediterranean battlefield "a third front," the Prime Minister told the House of Commons in a long war review that the second front has not yet been thrown into play but "exists and is the main preoccupation already with the enemy."

Surveying the whole sweep of the war with serene confidence, Churchill also declared:

1. Not a moment was lost needlessly in operations against Italy and, except for the failure of Italian guards to do assigned duty, Mussolini would have been shot when Hitler's parachutists rescued him at Gran Sasso.

2. American forces have been landed on the island of Sardinia to assist Italian troops who drove the German garrison over to Corsica now being occupied by French units.

3. A tripartite conference of representatives of Great Britain, United States and Russia will take place at an early date and no question will be barred from discussion. Any differences will be set aside for a conference of Roosevelt, Stalin and Churchill.

4. The Allies are prepared to place large armies in Italy and to deploy a weighty and active fighting front against the enemy on whatever line he chooses to resist and to maintain against him with increasing weight and vigor if need be through fall and winter.

5. A French army of 300,000 to 400,000 is being steadily organized and the battleship Richelieu will soon take its place in the French fleet.

Speaking of the prospect of the Stalin-Roosevelt-Churchill conference, the Prime Minister said: "No meeting during this war could carry with it so much significance for the future of the world as a meeting between the heads of the three governments for, without close, cordial and lasting association between Soviet Russia and their great allies, we might find ourselves at the end of the war only to have entered upon a period of deepening confusion."

Churchill's speech was the longest in his career as Prime Minister. It lasted two hours and seven minutes.

Curfew To Ring Again

Curfew will ring again in Prince Rupert and, if the fire bell is not sufficiently audible, Ald. Robert McKay would have the air raid sirens used.

At the suggestion of Mayor W. M. Watts, the city council last night decided to ask the police to see that the provisions of the curfew bylaw were enforced and the public will be so notified in an official manner.

Under the bylaw boys and girls under fourteen years of age are required to be off the streets, unless accompanied by adults, after 8:30 p.m. from October to March inclusive and after 10 p.m. during the rest of the year.

The mayor thought it was high time that the curfew was again enforced and Ald. McKay agreed, stating that, if it was necessary before, it was doubly necessary now.

Forgery Case Up

Ernest Burke Taken To Court Today at Supreme Assizes

Ernest Burke is taking trial at the Supreme Court Assizes here today on a charge of counselling the commission of the crime of forgery. The hearing by jury before Mr. Justice H. I. Bird opened this morning and is proceeding this afternoon. W. O. Fulton is acting as crown counsel with T. W. Brown appearing for the defence.

The allegation in brief is that a youth George F. Robertson came in possession of a check for \$400 payable to "George F. Robinson" which the accused induced him to sign and which accused cashed. A bogus registration card is involved in the case.

The jury consists of R. S. Ingram, foreman; William Finlayson, J. E. Jack, James N. Forman, A. H. McLean, L. F. Brewerton, Robert Reid, K. M. Peterson, Alexander McLeod, Andrew Martin, Ole Rorvik, and Frank Morris.

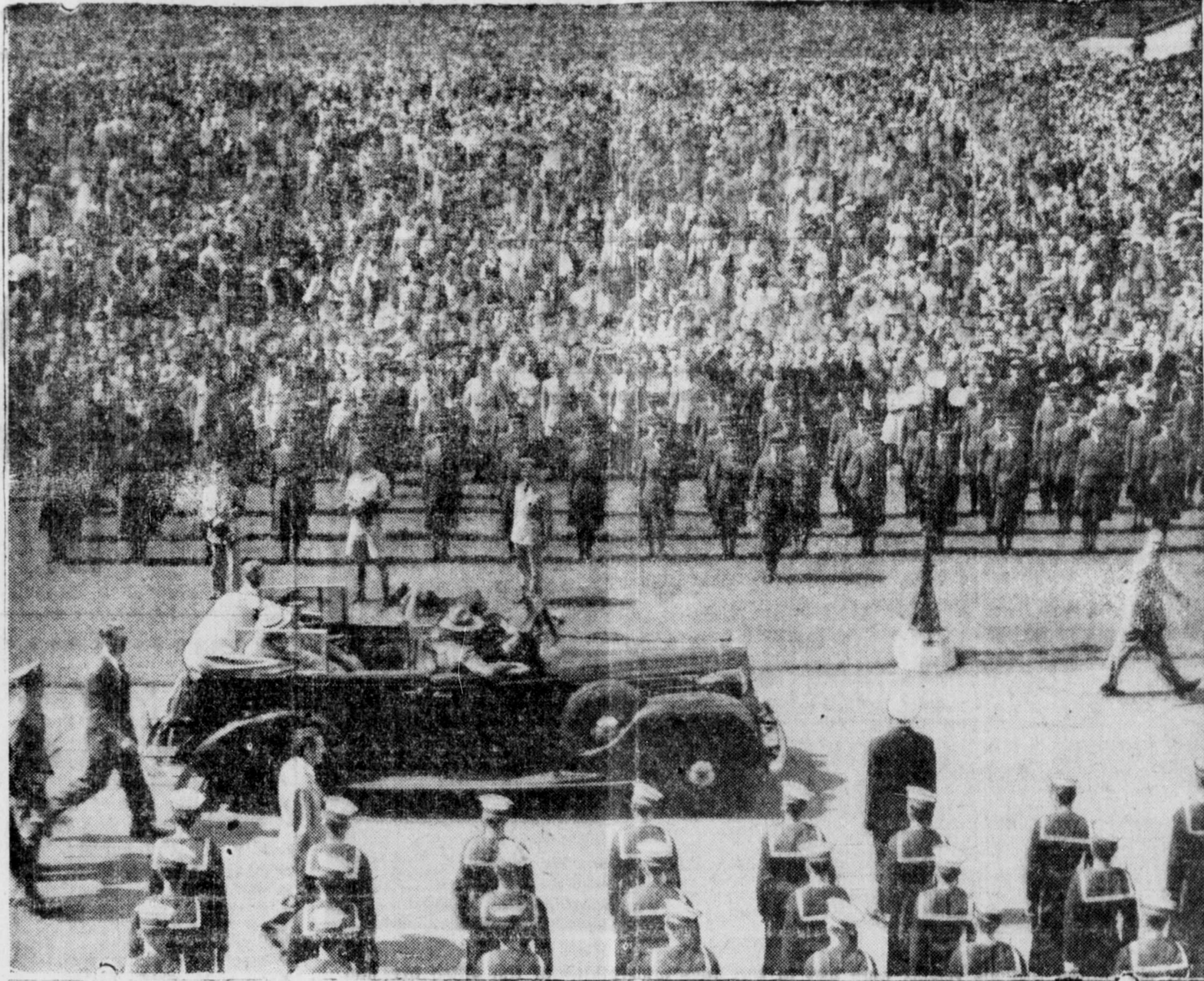

Prognosticators seem to be coming around to a general consensus that 1944 will see the defeat of the Axis and the end of the war. The first quarter of the year is set for the defeat of Germany after which the whole pressure will be applied to Japan which will be defeated during the last quarter of the year.

"Some time in the early spring the entire European front will collapse precipitately," one prognosticator predicts. Then will come the heavy offensives against Japan. In view of the long distances and the predominantly naval characteristics of the war against Japan, the campaign in the Pacific, at its best, will be in an uncertain stage during the summer of next year.

FREE FRANCHISE

Editor, Daily News: Because we have had a functioning city council this year the attention of the housewives has been directed to city affairs, in which they have a real interest.

The fact that they had been resident here since January, 1943 shows that they are not here by night characters with a purely transient interest in civic affairs but are settled residents of the city and, as such, are entitled to a say in its administration.

However it appears they are penalized for desiring to exercise their democratic responsibility as citizens since they are charged two dollars to vote while those who are too apathetic to take any interest in the affairs of the city escape this levy. It goes without saying that persons who do not care whether they vote or not are not the most responsible kind of citizen and it is the latter group, if any, who should be required to pay the two dollars.

The sole argument we have heard to justify the charging of this fee is that the city needs the money that there should be some charge against householders for the benefits they receive from having a well functioning civic government.

inate in the layout of this levy. Why place it on the most public spirited group of householders and allow the more responsible ones to go scot-free?

However well intentioned the framers of this provision might be in seeking to assure that frivolous persons might not vote it is obvious that the only effect of the provision is to disenfranchise large numbers of responsible persons. The practice of charging people for the exercise of the franchise cannot be justified as a democratic procedure. This is an anti-democratic measure with the added drawback that it in actual practice has a greater tendency to disenfranchise the less wealthy citizens of the community while those well off will find it little hardship to find this sum.

Prince Rupert's mayor and council should press the Union of British Columbia Municipalities to join with them in demanding that the British Columbia government repeal this anti-democratic measure as well as make direct representations on this subject themselves in the meanwhile.

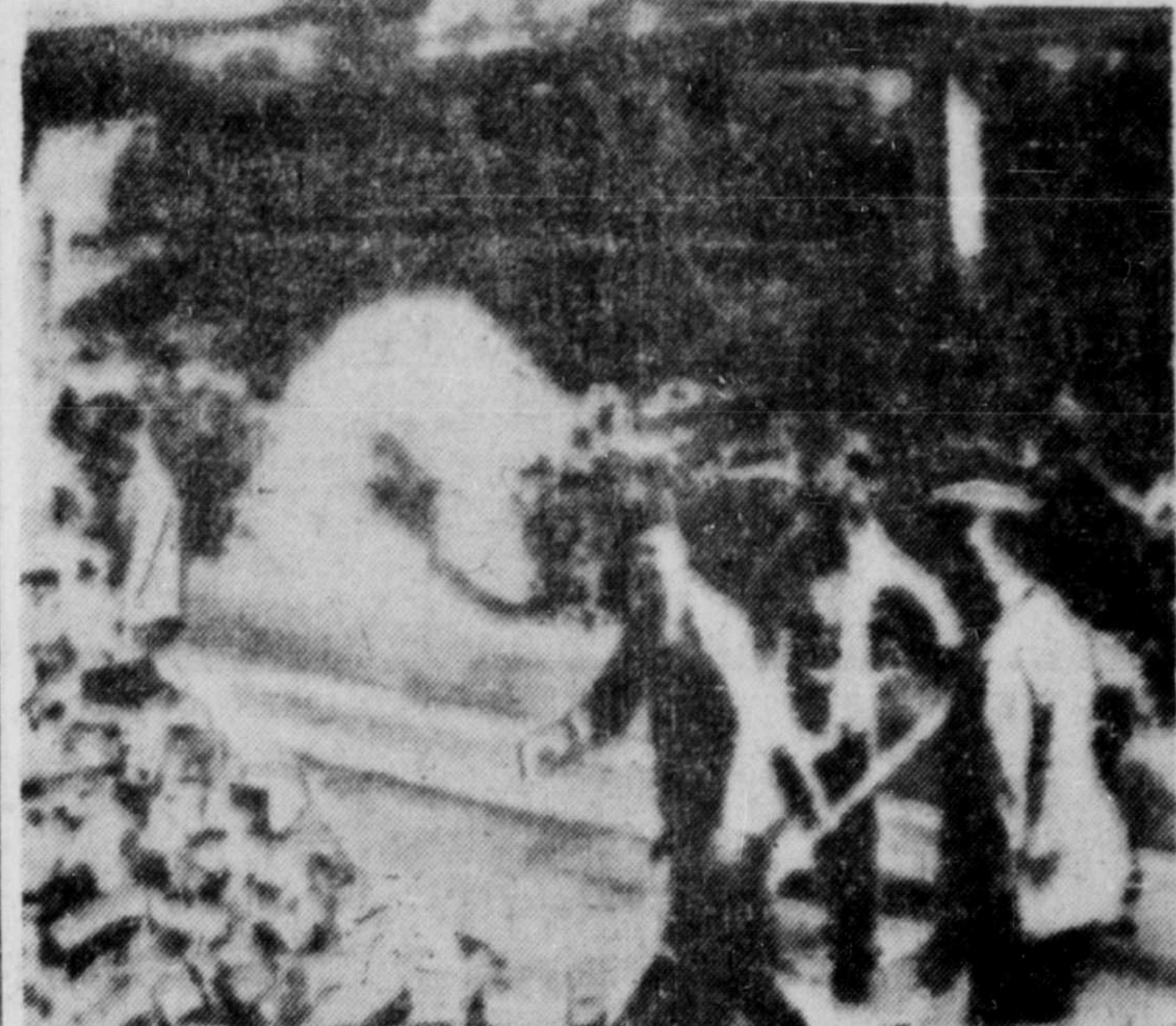

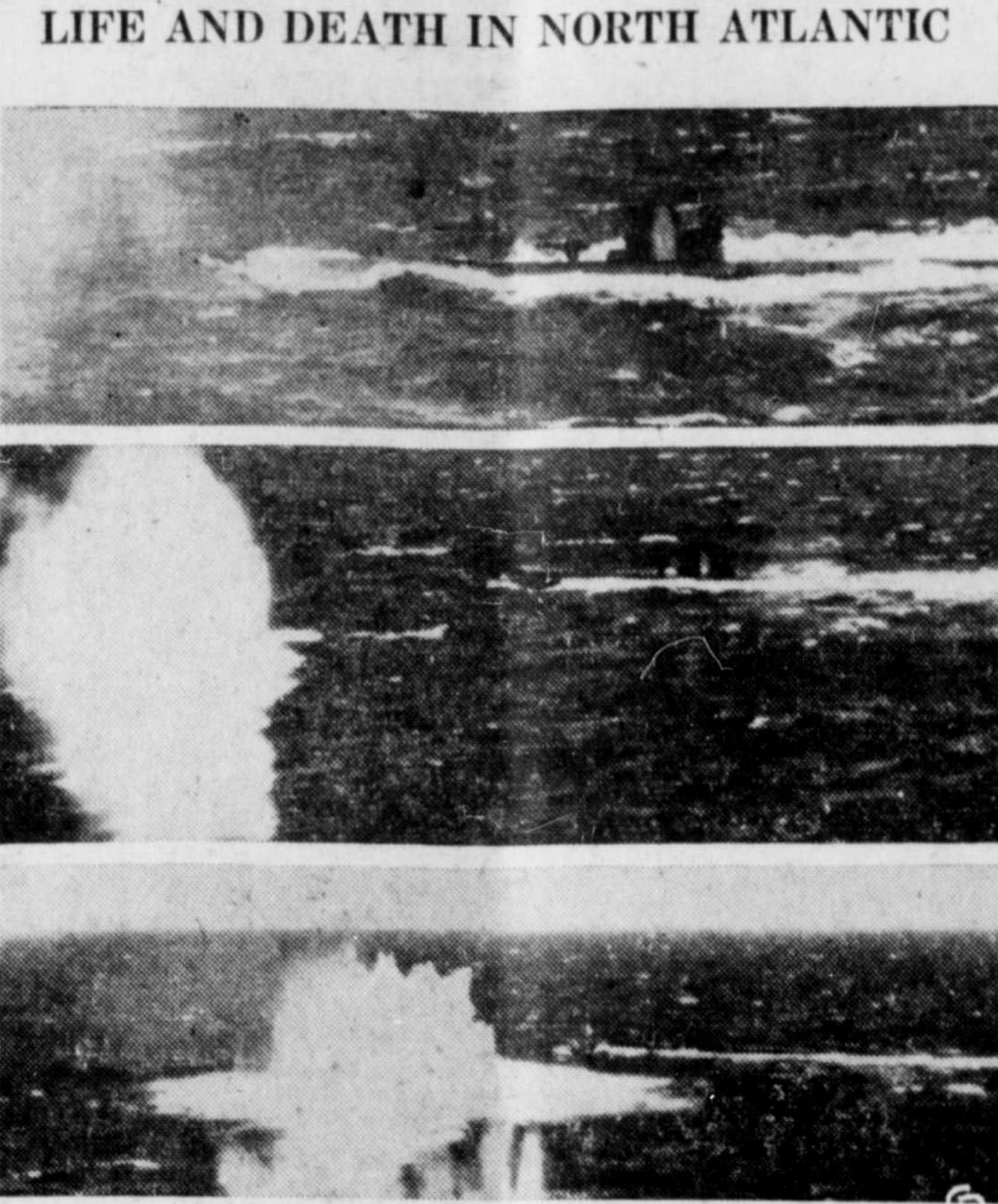

LIFE AND DEATH IN NORTH ATLANTIC

A series of pictures made by the U.S. Army Air Force anti-submarine command and just released, showing the sea-air duel between a Nazi submarine somewhere in the North Atlantic, and a B-24 plane patrolling the high seas. This was one of 13 clashes with subs during which the planes probably destroyed five subs and damaged five others. This sub was surprised on the surface. Going into a steep dive the pilot ordered bomb bay doors opened and depth charges enveloped the target. The pictures in sequence show Nazis in the conning tower, apparently too surprised to man the deck guns. In the 2nd picture the sub starts to crash dive as depth charges splash in the water. In the third picture the depth charges explode as plumes of water rise into the air.

Timely Recipes

NINE DAY PICKLES

Cut up 5 quarts cucumbers. Place in brine (1 cup salt to 2 quarts water) to cover, for 3 days.
 Put in cold water for 3 days, changing water each day.
 Put in weak vinegar solution.

5 cups water to 1 cup vinegar; add 1 tablespoon alum. Boil cucumbers in this mixture 5 minutes; remove and put in crock.
 Boil 3 pints vinegar, 3 cups brown sugar, 1 ounce allspice, 1 ounce cinnamon (powdered or sticks), 1 ounce celery seed and pour hot over pickles, drain, re-heat and pour hot over cucumbers each morning for 2 additional mornings. Bottle and seal.
 Yield: about 5 quarts.
