

Applications should be made to Local Ration Boards, and must be accompanied by present Ration

Lost Ration Books

If you find a lost Ration Book you should mail it at once to your Local Ration Board. When you turn in the found Ration Book be sure to state that you

Damaged or Destroyed Ration Books

If you loose your Ration Book, or damage it so that it is no longer fit for use, you should report the fact to your Local Ration Board at once. In such cases arrangements are made to issue a temporary Ration Card good for 30 days, pending investigation and issuance of new book.

Meat Allowance for Medical Cases


