

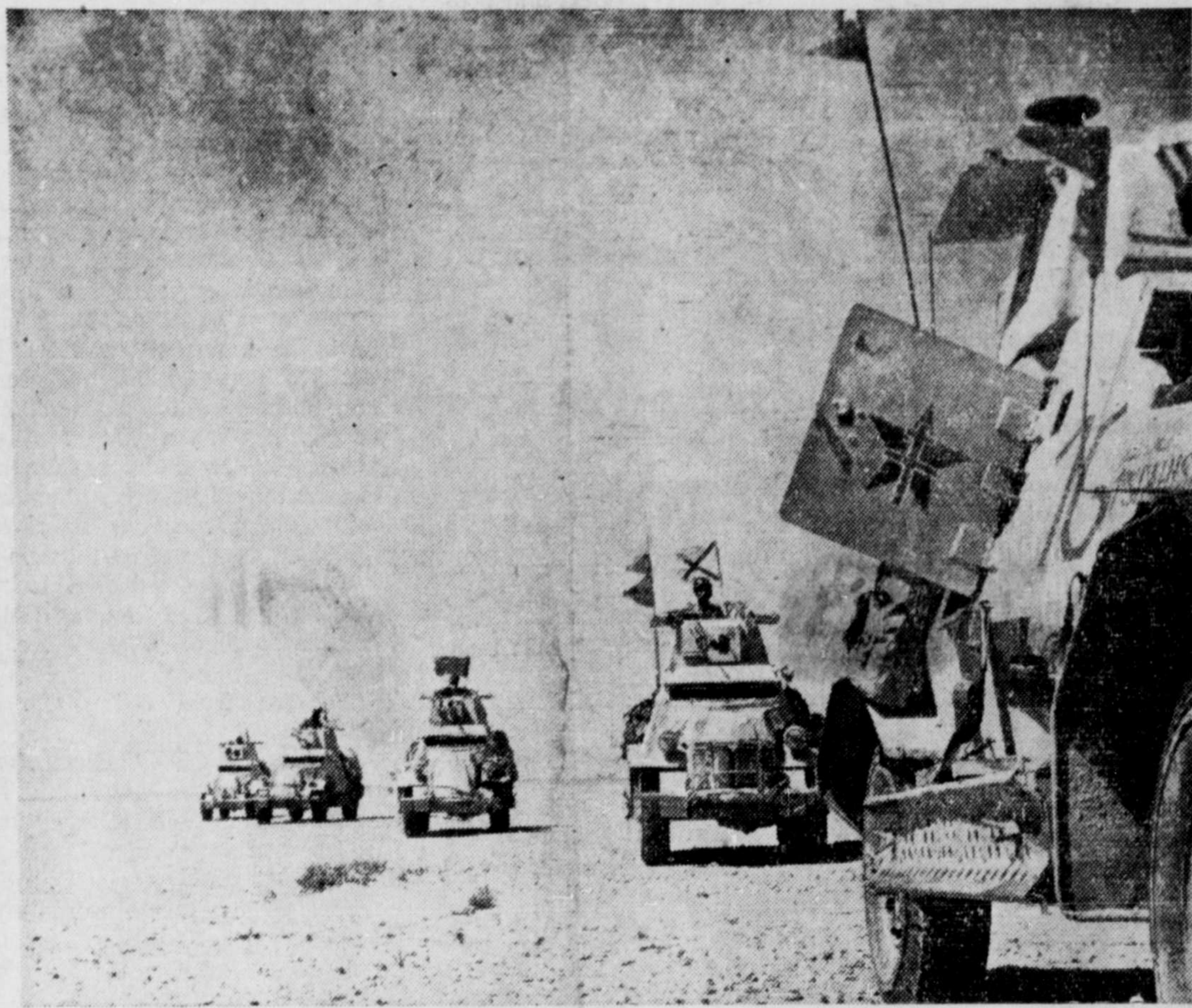

Allied Air Forces Whittling Away at Italian Resistance

Pantelleria, Lampedusa and Sicily Are Feeling Weight of Blows—Landing Party Accomplishes Mission

ALLIED HEADQUARTERS IN NORTH AFRICA, June 10 (CP)—Allied air forces, steadily whittling away at Axis resistance on Mediterranean outposts, have executed new air assaults on bomb-scarred Pantelleria and Sicily in connection with a scouting raid by British commandos against Lampedusa, it was announced today.

FEELING IS DIFFERENT

Whole Allied Spirit is for Offensive Now—Big Fleet in Pacific

ANNAPOLIS, Md., June 10 (CP)—Secretary of the Navy Frank Knox declared yesterday "secret information to us says that feeling in Tokyo and Berlin is akin to ours after Pearl Harbor. The choice of place and time for striking now is ours." He recalled, in his graduation address to midshipmen of the naval academy, that, after the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor, "our enemies in the Far East were winning victory after victory. Britain was a beleaguered island and waiting for the blow. Initiative was all theirs—today in contrast to that former day the initiative is all ours."

PLAYGROUND CONFERENCE

Gyro Club and City Council Committees to Get Together Soon

The civic and playground committees of the Prince Rupert Gyro Club will be meeting a special committee of the city council soon to go into the playground situation with a view to making arrangements for necessary improvements and repairs preparatory to the Gyro Club instituting its summer program of supervised activities on the grounds. The Gyro Club is planning to spend several hundred dollars on the supervised activities and is seeking to have the city undertake the necessary repair work on the grounds. At yesterday's Gyro luncheon, Frank Skinner reported on the condition of the grounds, outlining the repairs and improvements required and giving details of the proposed summer program. Mayor W. M. Watts could make no undertaking on behalf of the city council as far as expenditures were concerned but gave assurance that the members of the council were sympathetic. He was of the opinion that the military authorities would make good the damage it had occasioned to the grounds. He urged an early conference between representatives of the Gyro Club and the committee of the city council.

The Gyro Club received a letter from Capt. Bone of the freighter Fort Turtle expressing thanks for the gift of library books. There was a letter from Lieut. Orme Stuart, a member of the club, who is serving abroad with the Navy. W. D. Lambie was appointed delegate to represent the club at a district conference to be held shortly in Vancouver.

Canada's Strategic Position Post-War Aviation; Future Envisioned By T.C. Official

WINNIPEG, June 10—"In the post-war years aviation will play an increasingly important part in both the nation's internal economy and in its foreign policy because we in Canada cannot, even if we would, escape the challenge of our strategic geography," said W. F. English, assistant vice-president, TransCanada Air Lines, in an address to members of the Winnipeg Kiwanis Club at a luncheon Tuesday.

REFUSAL TO FISH

Vancouver Union Official Expresses Dissatisfaction Over Prices For Salmon

VANCOUVER, June 10 (CP)—W. T. Burgess, secretary of the United Fishermen's Federal Union, said that British Columbia salmon fishermen may refuse to operate boats when the sockeye season opens on July 1 due to dissatisfaction over the price ceiling set by the War-time Prices and Trade Board.

"We are prepared if necessary, to send a representative delegation to Ottawa by plane to solicit the aid of British Columbia members of the federal House in assuring uninterrupted and maximum fish production," Burgess said.

AGREEMENT ON LOGGING

Conciliation Board Report on Logging Dispute

OTTAWA, June 10 (CP)—Labor Minister Mitchell today announced Conciliation Board in majority report has recommended collective labor agreement of one year's duration be entered into by four Queen Charlotte Island logging companies and their employees, agreement to be subject to termination on 30 days' notice by either party after one year term ends.

New Fire Truck Is Now In Use

Final tests for the new fire engine recently purchased by the city were completed yesterday to the satisfaction of the fire department. The truck was driven to Seal Cove where the tests were made with harbor water.

Fire Chief H. T. Lock, in commenting on the fine performance of the truck, said that, under rigid test, it had delivered everything that its capacity called for and still had a good margin of reserve. The truck is now ready for active duty with the department.

CHINESE WINNING

Are Continuing to Smash Japanese Defences in Hunan Province

CHUNGKING, June 9 (CP)—Chinese dispatches reported yesterday that General Chiang Kai Shek's forces had smashed the Japanese defence line southeast of Hwajung, key to the Chinese rice-producing region around Lake Tungding in northern Hunan Province.

Canada Is Integral There was every possibility, he continued, that the most favorable route between Europe and Eastern Asia would prove to be the northern route across Canada.

In the domestic field where changes would come more quickly than in most countries, Mr. English foresaw these developments in the immediate postwar period: Improved main line transcontinental service, with larger and faster equipment and fewer stops; A secondary transcontinental service, with larger equipment than today's feeding into the faster service;

A considerable extension of branch lines, covering many communities not now served by air; An increase in services operated into remote areas.

In the foreign field, immediately after the war, he expected, service to Europe via the North Atlantic; service to the far east through the Alaska gateway; to the British West Indies, to Latin America, to Australia and New Zealand by way of Hawaii, intensive exploration and possible development of an airway down the Mackenzie River and of an airway through Churchill directed to both Europe and Asiatic Russia.

He did not hazard a guess as to who should operate these services. That was a matter for the council table. Canada, however, was in a good bargaining position.

establishment of air routes after the war.

Much more than any other form of transportation, he pointed out, air transportation was tied in with such vital matters as national security and international policy. All important air fields and navigational facilities throughout the world were nationalized or controlled by a central government. "Any consideration of world air routes of the future must have its background in today's uncertainty as to developments in international relations and the fact that governments today do and will likely continue to exercise a very definite control over both military and civil aviation."

Avenues of destruction today, he concluded, the airways in future should be a potent agency to break down barriers of extreme and selfish nationalism and bring about peace and good understanding.

ROMMEL IN FRANCE LONDON—Marshal Erwin Rommel, former commander-in-chief of Axis forces in North Africa, is reported to have been placed in charge of German defences on the Mediterranean coast of France.

AUSTRALIAN TIDE TURNED MELBOURNE—Premier John Curtin said that enemy pressure upon Australia was now being thrown back on Japan. A defensive policy was giving way to offensive. Curtin expressed the belief that Australia was no longer in danger of invasion although there still might be raids.

OUT OF BOUNDS LOS ANGELES—Following recent disorders a dozen communities around Los Angeles have been declared out of bounds to service men.

RECRUITING VETERANS STOCKHOLM—At the demand of Germany, Finland has started recruiting of veterans who have already served in the war and been discharged.

HOUSING IN EDMONTON OTTAWA—Two hundred and fifty wartime housing houses are to be built at Edmonton at a cost of more than \$1,000,000.

BEER FOR SERVICE MEN OTTAWA—Hon. Colin Gibson, minister of national revenue, said yesterday that arrangements had been made for service men to get a "fair amount" of beer, one gallon a month being mentioned.

TO DRIVE TO ASIA TORONTO—Speaking before the annual convention of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association yesterday, Hon. J. A. McKinnon, minister of trade and commerce, predicted that, after the war, there would be motor-ing over the Alaska Highway to Bering Straits and thence to Asia and the Orient after crossing 100 miles of sea to Siberia. The Alaska Highway would be a "contribution to international friendship and understanding."

FISHING CLOSING

Official Announcement at Seattle By International Fisheries Commission

SEATTLE, June 10 (CP)—The International Fisheries Commission here announced today that halibut fishing areas one and two will be closed to halibut fishing at midnight, June 20.

Area 1 includes all waters southeast of Willapa Bay and Cape Shoalwater on the Washington coast, and Area 2 includes the waters north from there to Glacier Bay, Alaska, and Cape Spencer Light.

Vessels fishing other species with set lines may retain under permit one pound of halibut to each seven pounds of other fish after the closure becomes effective.

NEW GOV'T APPROVED

Relations of Canada, Spain and Sister Republics Unchanged Following Revolution in Argentina

OTTAWA, June 10—There will be no change in relations of Canada and the Argentina following the taking over of the government of the South American republic by General Pedro Ramirez, it was announced yesterday.

MADRID, June 10 (CP)—The Spanish Foreign Office announced today that official recognition had been accorded to the new Argentine government of General Pedro Ramirez.

Neighbors Approve BUENOS AIRES, June 10—Four of five South American Republics bordering on Argentina have officially recognized the new Ramirez government. They are Brazil, Paraguay, Bolivia and Chile. Approval of Uruguay is expected soon.

GERMAN PRODUCTION CUT LONDON—Largely due to Allied bombing, German industrial production is today 80 to 85 per cent less than it was a year ago, it is declared here.

JAPS SCARED TURTLES Diamond Island, 140 miles south of Rangoon, was a haven for giant turtles until occupied by the Japanese.

High Price For Halibut

The high price of 27c per pound was paid on the Prince Rupert Exchange today for Canadian halibut. Yesterday 24c per pound was paid in Vancouver. It was stated this morning that the average for halibut in Prince Rupert so far this season had averaged higher than in Vancouver and some boats which had marketed in Vancouver would have benefitted financially if they had sold in Prince Rupert instead.

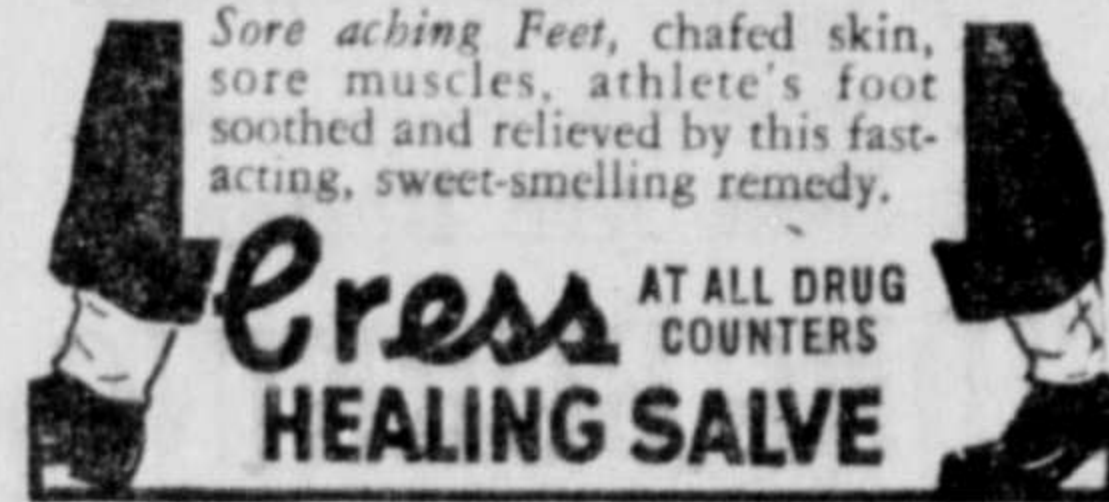

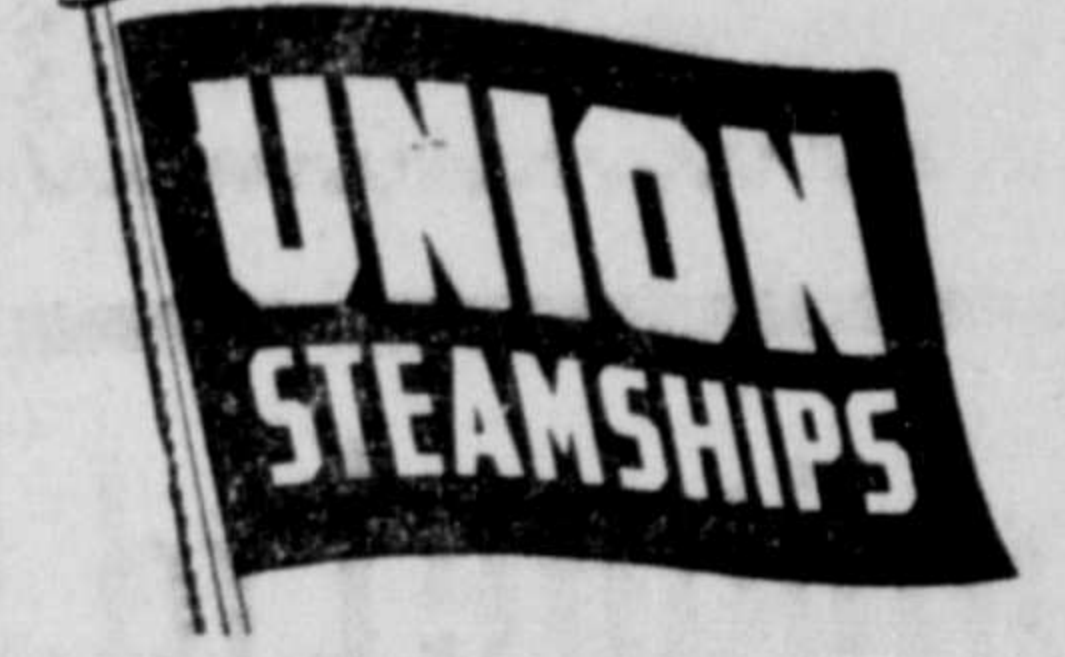

**Voided Meat Coupons in Ration Cards**  
 If the Spare "A" Meat Coupons in your temporary Ration Card are voided by horizontal black ink lines, you must secure new valid Coupons in order to purchase meat. The only temporary Ration Cards to which new meat Coupons will be attached are those whose life extends beyond May 27, 1943. Applications should be made to Local Ration Boards, and must be accompanied by present Ration Cards.

**Lost Ration Books**  
 If you find a lost Ration Book you should mail it at once to your Local Ration Board. When you turn in the found Ration Book be sure to state that you found it.

**Damaged or Destroyed Ration Books**  
 If you lose your Ration Book, or damage it so that it is no longer fit for use, you should report the fact to your Local Ration Board at once. In such cases arrangements are made to issue a temporary Ration Card good for 30 days, pending investigation and issuance of a new book.

**Meat Allowance for Medical Cases**  
 Extra meat rations will be provided for diabetics or coeliac cases only on the recommendation of a doctor. Applications, along with doctor's certificate, should be sent to the nearest branch of the Ration Administration. Diabetics who have already surrendered to the Ration Administration their ration books need not present a second certificate from a doctor when applying for extra meat rations, providing the amount required is not in excess of the maximum allowed.

**Meat Ration Charts**  
 Be sure to take your Meat Coupon Value Chart with you when you buy meat. It saves time . . . makes buying easier. If you have not received one, or have lost your copy of this chart, apply to your Local Ration Board for another.  
 Merchants requiring additional Meat Coupon Value or Wholesale Meat Value Charts may also secure these from their Local Ration Board.

**Play Fair With Your Grocer— for your own sake.**  
 Housewives are urged to see that the correct Coupons—and the right number of them—are taken by the delivery boy for any rationed commodities she buys and has delivered to her home. **MOOSE JAW**

The most extensive search for oil and gas ever made in Saskatchewan is now under way and it is estimated that between 30 and 50 wells will be drilled this summer, Hon. W. F. Kerr, minister of natural resources, said recently. Some of the greatest activity centres around the area south of Regina and Moose Jaw, the minister said. Expenditures already incurred in the search exceeded the \$1,000,000 mark some time ago and are continuing on an increasing scale.

A complete survey of all male high school and collegiate students over 14 years of age in Saskatchewan is now under way in an effort to determine how much help will be available from that source this summer. Results of the survey will be compiled by the staff under W. W. Dawson, supervisor of farm labor requirements.
